Paul Jones Memorial.

Annapolis, Md., April 24.—The city is filled with thousands of visitors who have been attracted by the unusual naval spectacle which will take place today in connection with the removal of the body of Admiral Paul Jones from the temporary tomb in the academy grounds to a room in the memorial hall of Bancroft hall. It had been intended at first to deposit the body in the crypt in the basement of the new chapel building of the naval academy, but the latter could not be completed in time. Rather than postpone the date of the memorial ceremony the secretary of the navy decided to deposit the body temporarily in Bancroft hall and to have it transferred without ceremony to the crypt when the latter will be finished.

The French government had sent over a cruiser squadron to take part in the exercises and the French warships arrived here a few days ago. The squadron consisted of the flagship Marcellin, and the first class cruisers Admiral Aube and Conde. The squadron is under the command of Admiral Campion.

Admiral Campion, the members of his staff and the officers of the French cruisers were first received upon their arrival by Rear Admiral Bradford of the American cruiser squadron, consisting of the flagship Olympia, the Cleveland, Denver and Des Moines, and later by Rear Admiral Davis of the battleship division, consisting of the battleships Alabama (flagship), Iowa, Illinois and Massachusetts. Upon landing they were received by Superintendent Sands of the naval academy and his staff of officers. Yesterday Admiral Campion and the members of his staff were escorted to Washington, where they were entertained by President Roosevelt at luncheon in the White House. They returned last night and spent the night aboard their ships to be in readiness for the ceremonies today.

A special train from Washington, bearing President Roosevelt, Secretary Charles J. Bonaparte, the French ambassador, M. Jusserand, and other foreign dignitaries, a number of United States senators and members of the house of representatives, arrived here shortly after noon today. The distinguished guests were received at the station by Admiral Sands and the other officers of the naval academy and escorted to the official residence of the superintendent, where they were entertained at an informal luncheon. Shortly after 2 o'clock the President and the other distinguished guests were escorted by marines and the academy band to the Armory building, where the memorial exercises will be held.

The program of the exercises include addresses by President Roosevelt, Gen. Horace Porter, the former U. S. ambassador to France, whose efforts brought about the discovery of the remains of Admiral John Paul Jones, Mr. Jusserand, the French ambassador,

Governor Warfield of Maryland and Secretary Bonaparte, who will preside at the exercises. The French government will be represented by M. Jusserand, Rear Admiral Campion, his staff of five officers and twenty officers of the Marseilles, Captain Huguet, late naval aide de camp of former President Loubet, and seventeen officers of the Conde and Captain Lefevre and twenty other officers from the Admiral Aube.

At the conclusion of the exercises in the Armory, which will be witnessed by more than 5000 invited guests and other holders of tickets of admission, the body of Admiral Jones will be removed from its temporary resting place in the tomb of the academy grounds and carried to Bancroft hall, where it will remain until the permanent resting place in the crypt of the academy chapel will be completed. The body will be carried by petty officers of the American and French warships and marines of the two fleets will form the escort of honor. An admiral's salute will be fired during the transfer of the body.

The officers of the French squadron will return to Washington tomorrow morning and will be entertained at luncheon by Secretary of the Navy, Bonaparte. In the afternoon they will attend a cavalry and artillery drill at Fort Myer, and in the evening they will be the guests of M. Jusserand at a dinner given in their honor at the French embassy. On Thursday the officers will be taken to Mount Vernon on the Dolphin. They will return to their ships on the following day and will probably sail on Saturday.

Among those who have come here to attend the exercises in honor of Admiral Jones are representatives of many patriotic societies from all parts of the country.

MADE SOME MISTAKES

Balance of Power Plan Defeated Some Good Men

The Balance of Power plan of making a ticket by the organized church vote has been very successful in Marion county. The purpose of this plan is to consolidate the Christian voting population in favor of a set of candidates who are acceptable to the churches. The ticket sent out after recommendation by a committee and ratification by a convention of representatives of the various orthodox churches was accompanied by the following letter, and resulted in bringing out a large vote from the people who believe there should be a higher standard of morals and cleanliness in public office. This was accomplished by agreeing on a ticket and sending one to each member of each of the organizations represented, accompanied with the following letter:

Salem, Oregon, April 7, 1906.

Dear Sir: The enclosed is a ticket selected by the Anti-Saloon league of Salem for this county. We think the matter of state senators and representatives is vitally important. If you can conscientiously do so we wish you would make a point of recommending the candidates on this ticket, as we think they are all good men and the union of Christian voters would do much toward securing their nomination. Yours for the cause, Secretary.

Of course, no such plan will work perfectly, and some few men who were deserving of a better fate got defeated by the Balance of Power plan. Among the clean men who were defeated were A. N. Moores for representative and Fred McIntire for justice of the peace. Mr. Moores is a graduate of Willamette university and one of the alumni, and had recently contributed \$500 to the university funds, but he was not put on the ticket, while he was a total abstainer, and men were endorsed who were not. He feels that keenly, but the Balance of Power program of the Anti-Saloon league had to select men who could win, and who were supporting its other candidates. Fred McIntire is a well-known church worker and Sunday school official of the Central Congregational church, and was entitled to endorsement. But Daniel Webster was an ardent supporter of a church official who wanted a higher office and so he was given the preference, although Grand Army men are not, as a rule, over fastidious about their drinks.

A great injustice was done Fred McIntire, because he is a loyal Christian gentleman who helps support his mother and has not a blemish on his character, and the Balance of Power league was playing pure politics when it discarded him for Daniel Webster, a practical politician and man of great experience in the political game. But, as was said, not even the Balance of Power plan can prevent mistakes, and while its general purpose is to promote political purity, and select higher types of citizenship for all offices, it cannot avoid defeating some of the better young men who would be a great credit to any community. No cleaner or better young man could have been placed on the ticket than Fred McIntire, and the time will come when he will yet be recognized, and he will have the endorsement of the Balance of Power league.

Safety for Submarines.

Washington, D. C., April 25.—Special precautions are to be taken for the safety of the submarine boats. Not only will there be with them at their maneuvers a tender, equipped with a powerful derrick and booms for lifting the disabled submarine to the surface, but it is proposed to furnish each submarine with a floating signal, arranged with a spool of light wire carried on the outside of the submarine's shell and connected with the interior, so that in time of disaster the imprisoned persons may release the floating signal, which will appear on the surface of the water and indicates that the submarine is in distress. It has been pointed out by the experts that a submarine might really be unable to get to the surface, and that by the nature of the exercises no one would be aware of the fact until it was too late to render assistance. By the means of the floating signal, which, of course, could burn a light at night, in an emergency a sign could be given from the bottom, without observers being obliged to wait an extraordinarily long time for the reappearance of the submarine, in addition to which advantage the floating signal would indicate the location of the sunken boat.
