THE NEW REPUBLICAN ORGANIZATION

The Marion county Republican central committee has been organized with Captain Chas. Murphy, chairman, and Frank Meredith, secretary.

For state central committee Frank Waters was chosen. Congressional committee was left for selection by Prof. Hawley.

The Salem city chairmanship was a square contest between the friends of Lou Gerner and Robt. Downing. Downing won out; J. G. Graham, secretary.

All these officers hold for two years and the men elected are all of the anti-Cramer faction, supporting the regular Republican city organization.

The triumph of the Cramer faction in getting control of the Salem city council was short-lived, as they have not defeat ever since.

The new organization represents the clean and progressive elements of the Republican party, and will give general satisfaction to the taxpayers.

SENATORIAL DIRECT VOTE

House Favors It, and Also a Longer Term for Representatives.

The house of representatives, following the usual custom, is quite certain to act favorably on the report of its committee recommending an amendment to the constitution of the United States providing for the election of senators by direct vote of the people, instead of by the legislature as now. As it will require a two-thirds vote of both branches of congress to submit the amendment we suppose that it will die in the senate. It is not customary for the senate committee to even report this amendment when it is sent up to them. It is a change, however, which the country is determined to effect, and if the defiance of the people is continued much longer by the senate it is morally certain that a constitutional convention will be called by the legislatures of two-thirds of the states. will be the friend of that, if anything, which will finally induce the senate to give way.

In drafting the amendment the committee of the present house has added a feature which is new in our political discussion. It proposes to make the term of office of representatives four years instead of two. There is a good deal of reason in this. It is believed that stronger men will seek the office for one thing. There are many citizens of the class which ought to dominate congress who positively refuse to engage in the hurly-burly of an election every two years. The stronger the candidates the more independent they will be of houses and corporate influences. It will not pay any competent man to go to congress for a single term, nor will it pay any district to change its members every two years. In so large a body as the house of representatives it requires at least two years to acquire the confidence of the colleagues, without which no member can have influence or perform useful service. By this arrangement the terms of the congressmen would be continuous with that of the President chosen at the same time, and the successful party would be given a reasonable time in which to develop its policy and demonstrate the results. We are also of the opinion that the public generally would prefer to be relieved from the turmoil of biennial national elections, and be free to devote its whole attention to state and local problems. Further discussion may disclose objections to extending the terms of representatives, but it certainly has many considerations in its favor—San Francisco Chronicle.

London's Underground Electric Roads

The Underground Electric Railways company, London, England, proposes increasing its borrowing powers by \$25,000,000. The last report, for June 30, showed that \$47,241,500 had been spent on railway construction, power houses, etc., while the amount received through shares and loans was \$51,100,000. It is nearly 18 months since any fresh capital was raised. The loan capital consists of \$15,000,000 in 5 per cent profit sharing notes and \$3,500,000 in 4 1/2 per cent debentures. The proposed increase will make the total \$51,500,000. At the opening of the Baker Street Waterloo railway division on March 10 Edgar Speyer expressed the expectation that the whole of the London Underground Electric Railways system would be in operation by the spring of 1937.

New Auto Speed Found.

Paris, April 25.—A new rival to Lancia is the dare-devil Ute has sprung up in Italy, and he will pilot one of the new 125 horse power Utes in the French Club's Grand Prix contest. Two of the cars will be piloted by Lancia and Nazzari. Dr. Wedeloch, who will be at the wheel of the third, is the new dare-devil. He is one of the directors of the Fiat Company, and was a witness of the last Vanderbilt race. The doctor has invariably taken part in the Monte Carlo hill climb. In one of these contests he dashed by Coudray with one wheel over the edge of a cliff, winning the climb.

MEMORIAL DAY IN THE SOUTH

Good Comrades of the Lost Cause Meet but not to Complain

Atlanta, Ga., April 26.—Throughout the state of Georgia, Memorial Day was observed today by the Confederate societies and the people in general. The thoughts of the Southern people have been directed more than usual of late to such things, because of the recent Wheeler Memorial and the reunion of the Blue and the Gray. The result was that a great deal more interest in the observance of Memorial Day was shown this year than ever before.

The Memorial Day exercises in this city will take place at the Grand opera house this afternoon. Judge Marcus Beck of the supreme court will be the orator of the day, and the Rev. T. P. Cleveland will be chaplain. The exercises will be in charge of the ladies of the Memorial association and representatives of the various chapters in this city will take part in the exercises. The parade this afternoon was in charge of Chief W. R. Joyner of the fire department, who was selected marshal of the day. Major J. Van Holt Nash was his chief of staff. The parade was formed in front of the Grand opera house and marched to Oakland where the Confederate graves were decorated.

Atlanta, Ga., April 26.—The Hon. Pleasant A. Stewart of Savannah will be the chief orator at the Memorial celebration here this afternoon. The exercises will be in charge of the Ladies' Bereavement Chapter of the Daughters of the Confederacy.

Barnesville, Ga., April 26.—Memorial Day will be celebrated here in the usual manner. There will be a meeting under the auspices of the Daughters of the Confederacy in the afternoon of the Gordon Institute, and General R. M. Howard, a well-known Confederate veteran of Columbus, Ga., has consented to deliver the principal oration. After the exercises a parade will be formed, which will march to the cemetery to decorate the Confederate and Federal graves with flowers.

Macon, Ga., April 26.—Under the auspices of the Sidney Lender Chapter of the Daughters of the Confederacy exercises in honor of Memorial Day will be held here this afternoon, with Major Walter Harris of this city as the principal orator. After the exercises the local camps of the Confederate Veterans and Sons of Veterans, as well as the local military companies, will march to the cemetery to decorate the graves of the Confederate and Union soldiers.

Washington, Ga., April 26.—The Hon. Hooper Alexander of Atlanta will be the orator at the Memorial Day exercises which will take place here this afternoon under the auspices of the Ladies' Memorial association.

Farmville, Va., April 26.—This afternoon Memorial Day exercises will be held here under the auspices of the Daughters of the Confederacy, with Captain W. A. Davis as the principal orator.

Jacksonville, Fla., April 26.—Although the ranking officers of the Florida division, United Confederate Veterans, and many of the leading members of the local camps are in attendance at the general Confederate reunion in New Orleans, Memorial Day will be celebrated here as usual. There will be a memorial meeting this afternoon and after that the graves of the Confederate soldiers will be decorated.

Birmingham, Ala., April 26.—Owing to the fact that many of the members of the local camp of the United Confederate Veterans have gone to New Orleans to attend the general Confederate reunion, the observance of Memorial Day by the local veterans has been postponed until June 2.

Montgomery, Ala., April 26.—Major John G. Harris will be the principal orator at the Memorial Day exercises which will be held at Oakwood cemetery under the auspices of the Ladies' Memorial association this afternoon. Judge A. D. Sayre will preside and Father T. J. Eaton will act as chaplain for the occasion. Judge J. M. Carmichael will act as grand marshal of the parade.
