## ABOUT RATE BILL

The proposed amendment known as  
the Long amendment and introduced  
by the senator from Kansas, which  
amendment it has been claimed was  
agreed upon at the White House con-  
ference, provided not only for appeal  
after the commission had fixed the  
rate, but explicitly conferred upon the  
circuit court the authority to issue an  
order suspending the rate. Several  
senators who have been regarded as  
eminent constitutional lawyers and  
who have also been regarded as hostile  
to rate legislation have insisted that  
provisions such as is contained in the  
Long amendment were necessary to the  
life of the proposed measure. But  
several weeks ago Senator Bailey cre-  
ated quite a stir among these consti-  
tutional lawyers. While admitting  
that the railroad had the right to ap-  
peal he flatly declared that congress  
had power to deny to the inferior United  
States courts the right to suspend  
the order of the interstate commerce  
commission pending the final decision  
in cases arising under the proposed  
law. In Senator Bailey's memorable  
speech, delivered April 10, he under-  
took to sustain his contention and, ev-  
en in the opinion of many who hereto-  
fore took issue with him, succeeded.

Senator Bailey pointed out that con-  
gress has exercised the power to  
abridge the rights of the courts to  
punish for contempt or to issue writs  
of mandamus, asserting that the courts  
have no inherent power and that "it  
is the duty of the federal courts not  
to make the law for congress, but to  
obey the law that congress makes for

them." He added: "If congress has  
the right to restrict the power to pun-  
ish for contempt, in God's name has  
it not the right to limit the power of  
injunction which has been so greatly  
abused by so many federal judges?"

Referring to "those utterings of re-  
cent years which seem to proceed on  
the theory that there should be no re-  
strictions upon the judiciary," Mr.  
Bailey said: "This is the first govern-  
ment that ever conferred upon the ju-  
diciary the power to annul legislation.  
God knows that ought to be enough  
power to confer upon any nine men;  
we are ninety, they are nine. I would  
not encroach upon that power; I would  
hold myself unworthy if I permitted  
them to encroach upon mine." Referring  
to Mr. Knox's quotations from the  
text books on jurisprudence, he said  
that "the senator never forgets that  
they were discussing the law as it  
is, and that it is as it is because  
congress will it so," the point being  
that the legislative branch of the gov-  
ernment is supreme in the law making  
and court regulating function. "Hap-  
pily the senator from Pennsylvania re-  
duces the whole question to our point  
when he says congress can say when,  
but not how, the judicial power shall  
speak." And Mr. Bailey declared  
that he was quite willing to accept  
that view.—Commoner.

## In the Senate Thirty-Two Years Ago

In his speech against the railway  
rate bill Mr. Foraker said that condi-  
tions might be worse. Mr. Tillman re-  
marked, "Well, the people are squeal-  
ing." Mr. Foraker retorted, "If the  
senator had been here during the  
Cleveland administration he would  
have heard them squealing long and  
loud."

The people have "squealed" at var-  
ious times on this railroad rate ques-  
tion, and they have for many years,  
even long prior to the Cleveland ad-  
ministration, had good reasons for  
"squealing."

They are just now debating this  
question in the United States senate  
as though it were some new proposi-  
tion, yet 32 years ago—in 1874—the  
United States senate, complying with  
what was then, as now, known as  
"popular clamor," appointed a com-  
mittee to investigate. This committee  
was known as "the committee on  
transportation routes" and was com-  
posed of these senators: William Win-  
dom of Minnesota, John Sherman of  
Ohio, Roscoe Conkling of New York,  
H. G. Davis of West Virginia, T. M.  
Norwood of Georgia, J. W. Johnson of  
Virginia, John H. Mitchell of Oregon,  
and S. B. Conover of Florida.

This committee held session during  
the summer of 1874 and made a report  
from which the following extract is  
taken:

"In the matter of taxation there are  
today four men, representing the four  
great trunk lines between Chicago and  
New York, who possess, and who not  
unfrequently exercise, powers which  
the congress of the United States  
would not venture to exert. They may  
at any time, and for any reason satis-  
factory to themselves, by a single  
stroke of the pen, reduce the value of  
property in this country by hundreds  
of millions of dollars. An additional  
charge of five cents per bushel, on the  
transportation of cereals, would have

been equivalent to a tax of \$45,000,  
000 on the crop of 1873. No congress  
would dare to exercise so vast a power  
except upon a necessity of the most  
imperative nature, and yet these gen-  
tlemen exercise it whenever it suits  
their supreme will and pleasure, with-  
out explanation or apology. With the  
rapid and inevitable progress of com-  
bination and consolidation, these colos-  
sal organizations are daily becoming  
stronger and more imperious. The  
day is not distant, if it has not already  
arrived, when it will be the duty of  
the statesmen to inquire whether there  
is less danger in leaving the property  
and industrial interests of the people  
thus wholly at the mercy of a few men  
who recognize no responsibility but  
to their stockholders, and no principle  
of action but personal and corporate  
aggrandizement, than in adding some-  
what to the power and patronage of a  
government directly responsible to the  
people, and entirely under their con-  
trol."

So it seems the people were "squeal-  
ing" 32 years ago. Thirty-two years  
ago a committee composed of such dis-  
tinguished Republicans, as William  
Windom, John Sherman and Roscoe  
Conkling declared that four men rep-  
resenting the four great trunk lines

between Chicago and New York pos-  
sessed, and not infrequently exercised,  
powers which the congress of the United  
States would not venture to exert.  
Has the situation improved since Sen-  
ators Windom, Sherman and Conkling  
subscribed to this startling statement  
coming as it did from public men in a  
free government?

The evils of which Messrs. Windom,  
Sherman and Conkling complained  
were infinitesimal when compared with  
the evils of today. The power held  
by the monopolists of that day was  
small compared with the power held  
by the monopolists of the present time.

Thirty-two years ago the situation  
was so grave that these distinguished  
Americans suggested the inquiry  
"whether there is less danger in leav-  
ing the property and industrial inter-  
ests of the people wholly at the mercy  
of a few men who recognize no respon-  
sibility but to their stockholders, and  
no principle of action but personal and  
corporate aggrandizement, than in ad-  
ding somewhat to the power and pat-  
ronage of a government directly respon-  
sible to the people and entirely un-  
der their control." Yet no remedy has  
been provided, and every effort to give  
the people relief has been vigorously  
resisted by the representatives of these  
special interests.—Commoner.
