knew when they passed. Arriving at
the school, properties were at once
transferred to the stage, and the hall
began to fill. At 7:30 the performance
began with two numbers by the school
band, which were well rendered and
thoroughly enjoyed. The program by
the Salem aggregation opened with a
flute solo by E. J. Engdahl, accompan-
