WITHYCOMBE NAMES THE NEW STATE CHAIRMAN

Republican Candidate for Gov- ernor Refuses to Bow Down to Any More Machine Rule

All the Bosses and Managers Were Dis- appointed by the Results of the State Committee Meeting--New Pol- icies to the Front

Portland, April 20.—As the result of
a two days' conference of the Repub-
lican state central committee and candi-
dates and party leaders, G. A. West-
gate of the Albany Herald becomes the
new state chairman of the Republican
party, and all efforts of the old ma-
chine leaders to take charge of the
coming Republican campaign were set
aside. The indications are that, while
Jonathan Bourne will work in perfect
harmony with the state committee and
work for the rest of the ticket, he will
conduct his own campaign for the
United States senate.

Westgate was not the choice of
Frank C. Baker, as the latter gentle-
man is quoted as saying that no man
who is an avowed candidate for collec-
tor of customs or any other federal of-
fice should be put in to manage the
campaign. Secretary Bryson said that
the honor was not sought by Mr. West-
gate, and that he would probably fore-
go his candidacy until after the June
election. He was not the candidate
of the Baker machine, as Mr. Baker
declined to suggest anyone for the
place. He made a friendly call on the
committee appointed to select a chair-
man.

It is also evident that the new chair-
man is not the choice of the Matthews-
Patterson machine. Dr. Withycombe
took on himself the responsibility of
naming his own chairman, and so re-
quested Chairman Waters to state
when making the report of the com-
mittee, and he did so state, that Mr.
Westgate was the selection of Can-
didate Withycombe, on whom the brunt
of the state campaign would fall, and
that the committee had deferred to
him in this selection. Dr. Withycombe
has made his campaign from the be-
ginning without knuckling down to the
bosses of the party and will so con-
tinue to do until after the election and
while he is governor. He will be gov-
ernor in fact, and not in name or the-
ory, if he is elected.

Close reading of the proceedings at
Portland will show that the new chair-
man of the state central committee
was not the choice of Jonathan Bourne
the Republican nominee for the U. S.
senate. He had a candidate—in fact
several of them—and they were reject-
ed one after the other, and his lieuten-
ants did not relish the choice of West-
gate, and the chances are that Mr.
Bourne will maintain his own head-
quarters, and while doing all in his
power for the whole Republican tick-
et, he will make his own campaign in
addition in his own way. For divers
and sundry reasons it is apparent to
anyone of political penetration that it
is better for the whole ticket that this
should be so, and that the fight for the
governorship should be put to the front
and made the paramount issue, instead
of subordinating the whole state tick-
et to the fate of statement No. 1.

As the matter stands there is a new
deal and a clean deal, and the whole
campaign is cut loose from the old
Portland machine, and will be made in
the interest of the whole ticket and
not in the interest of a faction or ring
or to bolster up the fortunes of any
Portland boss or set of bosses.

The result of the day's struggle
Saturday was a clean knock-out for
both the Mitchell and the Simon ma-
chines. The Republican party itself is
in the saddle and will continue to be
so long as Withycombe leads the fight
in this state.

G. A. Westgate, of Linn county, pro-
prietary of the Albany Herald was elect-
ed chairman of the Republican state
central committee this afternoon. Mr.
Westgate's name was agreed upon as
a compromise at a caucus of state can-
didates this afternoon. He was ad-
vanced by Dr. Withycombe, candidate
for governor. He was not the selec-
tion of Jonathan Bourne, but the new

material candidate acquiesced in his
election. The committee ratified the
recommendation of the candidate with-
out opposition. Several names were
discussed by the candidates in caucus
among whom were John B. David, Ed-
ward Newbegin, R. R. Hoge, G. A.
Steel, G. W. Stapleton and F. E. Reed.
The appointment of a secretary was
left to Chairman Westgate. The new
chairman will open headquarters in
Portland within a few days.

Friday night, after a conference
among candidates, the name of George
A. Steel was practically agreed upon.
It was common rumor this morning
that Steel would be the man. He was
formerly a strong Simon man, but this
appears to make no difference.

Then a change suddenly came over
the situation. The tall form of I. L.
Patterson, collector of customs, ap-
peared in the throng, and several times
thereafter reappeared, from the direc-
tion of Jack Matthews' office, so the
story goes.

Jim Kyle and W. E. Burke, who
played a big part in engineering Jona-
than Bourne's campaign, appeared, and
word got out that there was opposition
to Steel, who sent word to the com-
mittee that he would not accept the
place unless he had the unqualified con-
sent of the other candidates on the
state ticket and the undivided support
of the state committee. It is said that
Bourne changed his mind regarding
Steel, but this is denied by his lieuten-
ants. He could not procure the undi-
vided support of the committee, ac-
cording to all reports, and the outlook
at the time of adjournment was that
he would not be the man.

An hour later the committee met this
morning, with Temporary Chairman F.
B. Tongue presiding. The following
counties were represented:

Malheur, W. H. Pullen; Marion, E.
Hofer, proxy; Sherman, B. F. Pike;
Union, W. J. Church; Washington, E.
B. Tongue; Wheeler, W. W. Steiwer;
Douglas, A. C. Marsters.

When Chairman Tongue announced
permanent organization as the order of
business, F. W. Waters moved that a
committee of three be appointed to
confer with the candidates on a perma-
nent chairman and report to the com-
mittee at 2 o'clock. This carried, and
the chairman appointed Waters, West-
gate and Marsters.

The committee then adjourned, but
reconvened to hear some remarks by
Marsters on the advisability of tak-
ing action on resolutions and plat-
form. He moved for a committee of
five, and the chairman appointed Dun-
away, Steiwer, Fox, Banks and Church
with instructions to report at 2 o'clock.

The organization of the Republican

state central committee evoked quite
a tempest in the political teapot. After
the committee's brief session yesterday
afternoon the program makers got to-
gether and practically agreed that
George A. Steel, the party's nominee
for state treasurer, should have the
chairmanship. The proposal seemed to
meet with general approval and the oc-
casional objection that the chairman
should not be also a candidate receiv-
ed scant consideration. Steel has been
state chairman half a dozen times and
was national committeeman for eight
years. His past experience was one of
the strong arguments used in his fav-
or.

But when the wirepullers foregath-
ered Friday in the lobby of the Im-
perial hotel, a marked change of senti-
ment had occurred. The word went
around that Steel wouldn't do at all.
Steel himself declared emphatically
that he did not desire to be state chair-
man and would not accept the office ex-
cept at the united request of all the
other candidates on the state ticket. It
soon became apparent that the candi-
dates were not entirely unanimous in
desiring Steel as chairman and the
state makers began casting about for a
new man.

Bourne and Withycombe were natu-
rally allowed a large voice in naming
the chairman, as each of them will
have a hard fight on his hands in the
June election and each is therefore
deeply interested in securing an ene-
getic head for the state committee.
Jack Matthews also took a hand in the
game and from his room on an upper
floor he strove to pull the wires so as
to name as chairman some one who
would be subservient to his schemes.
Ike Patterson was kept busy button-
holing the members of the committee
and carrying reports of his progress
to Matthews.

It was plainly apparent today, as it
has been in the organization of the
county central committee, that Jack
Matthews is making a desperate effort
to regain his lost influence in local
politics. His attempts have been unav-
ailing, for the feeling against him is
bitter, even among many of those who
were formerly his close associates.

The fact that Westgate has been made
chairman of the state central commit-
tee would naturally weigh in his favor
at Washington. Jack Matthews stepped
from the state chairmanship into the
office of United States marshal, and
Westgate might reasonably expect
equal good fortune. It is true that the
state chairman is a much less impor-
tant factor in state politics under the
direct primary law than under the old
system, but he is at least a conspicu-
ous figurehead.

competition in ship building between
the navy yards of the government and
private contractors has stimulated the
industry to a considerable extent.

Louisiana, the competition has served

sels are being built. One of the re-
markable demonstrations in building
this year is that of the British ship
Dreadnought, which was laid down at
Portsmouth, England, last October
and was recently launched, and work on
which has advanced so far that it is
