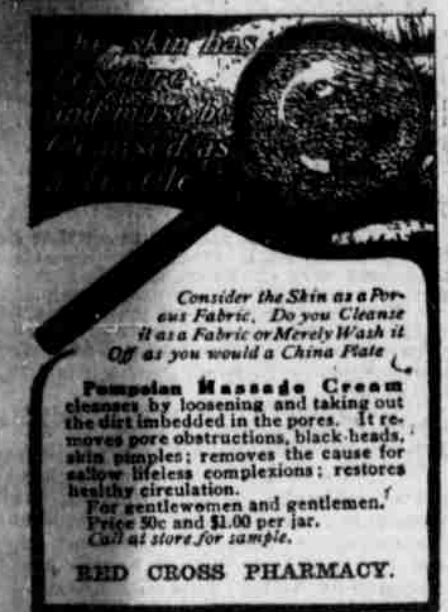

HOUNDS AFTER SMITH

**He Has Made a Clean Escape,
or Else Is Dead or Dying
in the Underbrush**

Tom Word, sheriff of Multnomah
county, has procured a pack of trained
hounds from Spokane, which have had
experience in former man hunts, and
which arrived at Woodburn this morn-
ing. At 1 o'clock eight men will begin
the hunt, and will let the hounds loose at
the point where the outlaw is supposed
to have been shot at Friday. Deputy
Sheriff Weeden, of Multnomah county
is at Woodburn and will assist in the
search for the outlaw. It is thought
the dogs will have no difficulty in fol-
lowing the scent, as the ground is still
sufficiently moist for them to pick up
the trail. Sheriff Culver states that all
kinds of rumors concerning the whereabouts
of Smith are afloat at Wood-
burn, and that it is difficult to trace
the reliable from the unreliable. Un-
less something tangible develops soon
Sheriff Culver thinks he will call off
the hunt.

However, the dogs will be kept on
the hunt for several days, and the out-
law will be searched for thoroughly.
The hat of the desperado is at hand
and, after the dogs have been given a
whiff, it is believed that there will be
something doing.

Some Come Home.

Deputy Sheriff Esch, Louis Folsom
and Lute Savage returned Sunday from
the scene of the man hunt. It is their
belief that many of those who went to
search for the outlaw, Smith, will re-
turn to their homes, and let the posse,
under the direction of Sheriff Culver,
do the systematic work.

CAPTAIN HENDERSON'S FUNERAL

The remains of the late Captain O.
D. Henderson were buried with military
honors at Belle Passi cemetery Sunday
at 2 o'clock. This young man met an
unfortunate death at the hands of the
outlaw, Smith, early Saturday morn-
ing, while out with a party hunting
down the murderer, almost in sight of
his own home at Woodburn.

Henderson was a harnessmaker, one
of the most popular and beloved men
in the community. He was a Mason
and a member of the Presbyterian
church; was 38 years old and leaves a
widow to mourn his death.

He served with distinction in the
Philippines as an officer of the Second
Oregon. He won a captain's commis-
sion and was buried with military hon-
ors, receiving also the Masonic funeral
rites.

His funeral was the largest ever held
in the county. Nearly all the officers
of the Oregon National guard, the mili-
tary band, and a carload of soldiers
from Portland were in attendance.

Eulogies were delivered by Revs. An-
derson, Williamson and Leech, the lat-
ter paying a most eloquent tribute to
the dead soldier. Col. Jackson also
paid him a high tribute of respect.

No man ever passed out of this life
more highly respected and more univer-
sally beloved by all who knew him
than Captain O. D. Henderson, of
Woodburn.

More than 200 carriages were in the
funeral procession, and probably 1000
persons were on the ground when the
procession arrived.

The floral offerings were simply in-
describable, there being a wagon load of
them. A number of Masons went down
from here, and, in addition to the Ma-
sonic rites, the Woodmen of the World
paid their tribute of respect.

Attended the Funeral.

About 15 men from Company M, O.
N. G., of this city, attended the fune-
ral of their comrade-in-arms, Captain
Henderson, of Woodburn, who was shot
by the outlaw, Smith, Captain Murphy
and Lieutenants Holman and Abrahams
were also in attendance.

Sheriff J. W. Shaver.

Sheriff J. W. Shaver, of Clackamas
county, died this morning at 1 o'clock
at the Salem hospital, from gunshot
wounds received while undertaking to
arrest the now triple murderer, Smith.
The details of his shooting have been
given. There was no hope entertained
of his recovery from the first.

Sheriff Shaver was a man universally
liked, and whose death will be sincerely
mourned by personal and political
friends alike. He was 51 years of age
and though the funeral arrangements
have not yet been completed, it is
probable the interment will take place
in Portland with the Odd Fellows
conducting the ceremonies. Two sis-
ters and four brothers survive him.
Three of the latter now residing in
Portland.

A Suffrage Note.

The suffragists are sending out num-
berless arguments in favor of the en-
franchisement of women, quoting large-
ly from Susan B. Anthony and others
who are qualified by experience to
speak with authority. The following is
from an address delivered by Miss An-
thony, whose influence is not lessened
by her departure from the sphere of
mortal activity.

"When women vote, they will make
a new balance of power that must be
weighed and measured and calculated
in its effect upon every social and moral
question which goes to the arbitra-
ment of the ballot box. Who can doubt
that when the representative women of
thought and culture who are today the
moral backbone of our nation, sit in
counsel with the best men of the coun-
try, higher conditions will be the re-
sult?"

"There are grave questions of moral
as well as of material interest in which
women are most deeply concerned.
Denied the ballot, the legitimate means
with which to exert their influence
and, as a rule, being lovers of peace
they have recourse to prayers and
tears, those potent weapons of women
and children, and when they fail, must
tamely submit to wrong, or rise in re-
bellion against the powers that be."
