Baltimore Cathedral Centenary.

Baltimore, Md., April 30.—The two days celebration which began here yesterday in honor of the 100th anniversary of the laying of the cornerstone of the old Baltimore cathedral has attracted to this city a larger gathering of prelates of the Roman Catholic church than any event since the last plenary council which was held here in 1884. Bishops, archbishops and other high dignitaries of the church from all parts of the country met here for the purpose of taking part in this celebration, which today has entered upon its second day. Naturally, the magnificent old cathedral, now fully completed and thoroughly renovated and redecorated for this occasion, forms the central scene of the celebration. The Baltimore cathedral is the second oldest cathedral in this country. The oldest one, that of St. Augustine, Florida, was built by the Spaniards.

The official church celebration took place yesterday and was one of the most magnificent and gorgeous spectacles ever seen in this city. It began with a procession of 12 archbishops, a hundred or more bishop, monsignors, abbots and other high dignitaries of the church, and hundreds of minor members of the clergy. The procession marched around the cathedral grounds and finally entered the cathedral, where a pontifical high mass was celebrated, with Archbishop Farley of New York officiating. Archbishop Ryan of Philadelphia preached the sermon. The cathedral was crowded to suffocation. At the vesper service Archbishop Messmer of Milwaukee officiated and Archbishop

Ireland of St. Paul preached the sermon.

The social part of the celebration is taking place today. During the day there are a large number of receptions held in honor of the visiting prelates and in the evening there will be a large meeting at the Lyceum. There all the visitors and the members of the local clergy will gather at a reception. Secretary of the Navy Charles J. Bonaparte will deliver the principal address.

The cornerstone of the Baltimore cathedral was laid by Bishop Carroll on July 7, 1806. Baltimore had at that time a population of only about 30,000 and the Catholic community numbered scarcely more than 5000. Archbishop Carroll was appointed first bishop of Baltimore by Pope Pius VII and was consecrated on August 15, 1790, in the chapel attached to Lulworth castle, Dorsetshire, England. He was the oldest in the United States, embraced the whole country. The consecrating priest was the Right Rev. Dr. Walmesley, vicar apostolic of the London district.

The site selected for the cathedral was purchased from Governor Howard of Revolutionary fame, whose equestrian statue adorns Mount Vernon Place. The architect of the cathedral was Benjamin Henry Latrobe, many times mayor of Baltimore. Mr. Latrobe also designed the capitol at Washington. The granite of which the cathedral was built was brought from the quarries of Eliott City in cars drawn by oxen. The work of construction proceeded slowly until 1812, when it was interrupted by the war with England. After the war the work was resumed and carried on until the completion of the structure in 1821. On May 21, 1831, the edifice was dedicated by Archbishop Maréchal. About 50 years ago the portico was constructed by Archbishop Kenrick. The cathedral was consecrated on Ascension day, Thursday, May 23, 1876, by Archbishop Bayley. The sacristy was erected in 1879 and the building was enlarged and the new sanctuary added in 1888.
