SHOCKS FELT AT SALEM

Perceptible earthquake shocks were felt at Salem at 4:40 this morning by reputable a citizen as Hon. John H. Albert, who says he felt the earth give way vertically, and the tremor was busy in a north and south direction. Examination of the seismograph at the Willamette University shows that a movement was recorded. It taxed the instrument beyond its capacity. Mr. Albert says a low rumbling was heard, like distant thunder, and he has no doubt it was an earthquake, as he has felt many. He says it could not be mistaken for any rumblings of discontent among the farmers over the Tuttle act, and phenomena connected with that would only be heard just before the primaries, anyway.

R. M. RAU TALKS OF FRISCO

"One peculiarly noticeable feature in connection with the relief work is the lack of appreciation on the part of many of the poorer people. They are supplied with more and better food than they have been accustomed to, yet they complain, while, on the other hand, the wealthier citizens, who lost everything they had in the disaster, accept whatever is given them with a smile and a 'thank you' that are touching.

"The relief committee is continually besieged with imposters and grafters who work every conceivable scheme to secure money and transportation to which they are not entitled. The most deserving sufferers are those who hold back, and have to work for food, clothing and money thrust upon them, and who demand of the privilege of obligating themselves in one way or another to repay whatever sums are advanced to them at some time in the future.

"So great is the demand for money that one man came to the Oregon Relief Committee and offered to sell a certified draft for \$750 for \$50, and another tried to sell a \$350 diamond pin for \$25. These are only two cases among hundreds. As an example of the fortitude and philosophical spirit displayed by the people of stricken San Francisco I only need cite one incident which I witnessed while on duty under Major Torney in the Red Cross work:

Discovered a Piano.

"I was delivering a quantity of clothing and provisions near Golden Gate Park with an automobile, when my attention was arrested by the strains of a piano coming from the once beautiful but now desolated resort. "The sound was so unusual and unexpected under the circumstances that I stopped the machine and listened. No less than 50 homeless were singing the spirited ragtime ballad, 'A Picnic for Two.' On investigation I found that the refugees had discovered a piano which had been rescued from the wreck, and a young woman was playing the air, surrounded by a huge throng of choristers on the green park sward."

Prompt Business Methods.

Notwithstanding the requests of San Francisco creditors to their patrons that they should remit in postoffice money orders, and that bank drafts could not be cashed, the drafts of the Capital National Bank, of this city, has sold exchange from the day of the earthquake, and the same has been cashed at the First National Bank in Oakland. This is the first and only bank in the Northwest to have this record.

Want to Boss the Job.

San Francisco, May 1.—The plan to place relief measures at Oakland in charge of the regular army is meeting opposition from Oakland officials and committees, who claim the army officers are unfamiliar with conditions and unable to cope with the problem of caring for a large refugee colony. It is a bitter fight and much bad feeling is anticipated.

Bread on the Water.

Henry Ottenheimer yesterday received a letter from his folks in San Francisco, enclosing a card taken from a loaf of bread by them. The card gave the name and address of Mrs. L. K. Page, Salem, Oregon, as the person who baked the bread. This striking coincidence serves to show not only how effective the work of the relief committees has been, but shows how small the world is after all.

LEAGUE ELECTS OFFICERS

Epworthians Hold a District Convention at Silverton That Lasts Nearly a Week

Silverton, Or., May 1.—The district convention of the Epworth League, which has been in session for nearly a week in the Methodist church, has concluded its work. There were 108 delegates in attendance, besides a large number of others, who were not registered as delegates. Two of the principal addresses Saturday were by Rev. Paul Rader and Dr. J. H. Coleman, president of Willamette University.

Sunday's program began with a sunrise prayer meeting, and there was a continuous succession of meetings until evening. Rev. W. T. Kerr conducted a love feast at 9:30 and at 10:30 Dr. Coleman delivered the main address of the forenoon. The afternoon rally was led by Professor C. O. Boyer, and this was followed by the administration of the sacrament.

An enthusiastic league meeting at 8:30 was followed by a song service led by the pastor, Rev. A. D. Wagner, and after the installation of officers, Rev. W. H. Heppie delivered a sermon to a crowded house. Although the church building has been greatly enlarged during the winter, it was taxed to its utmost capacity, and many had to go away. Crocker, Portland; second vice-president, Miss Frances Belknap; third vice-president, Miss Lucy Moreom, Woodburn; fourth vice-president, Miss Letha Reinhart, Silverton; corresponding secretary, H. K. Krum, Sunnyside; recording secretary, Miss Edith Landon, Woodburn; treasurer, Miss Mildred Simmons, Salem; junior league superintendent, Mrs. Lena Sweetland, Portland; executive committee, Dr. B. F. Rowland, Miss Kate Wilson, Woodburn; C. J. Littler, Albany.

Laying the Corner Stone.

The exercises for the laying of the corner stone for the Kimball Theological College were held this afternoon. A large number of alumni, students and friends of the University were in attendance. The exercises began by singing "All Hail the Power of Jesus' Name."

Rev. Robert Booth followed with a prayer, and Rev. T. L. Jones, of Amity, gave the scripture reading. President Coleman followed with a short address.

He stated that at present no members of the faculty had been appointed except Dr. Kimball, but that it was the intention to make the college the equal of any in the West.

Among the documents that will be placed in the box for the corner stone are: The Methodist hymn book, the church discipline, a history of the founding of the institution, various religious periodicals, a list of the trustees of the University, of the official state visitors, a list of conference visitors, of the faculties and students of the various colleges, the Daily Capital Journal and other daily Salem and Portland papers, the names of the architect and contractors.

The inscription on the corner stone reads thus: "Kimball College of Theology. Building donated, A. D. 1906, by Luella Dunlop Kimball."

After singing a hymn the exercises closed with the benediction, pronounced by Rev. W. H. Selleck, of the M. E. church.
