ELECTION DATES TO REMEMBER.

Canvassing votes for nominating state and district candidates May 5.

Last day for filing nominating petitions for county offices May 19.

Last day for filing certificates of nomination May 5.

General election June 4.

THE STRENUOUS PRIMARY.

The direct primary in which the candidate must reach out to come in contact with every voter—is too much for many of the aspirants.

THEY DO NOT REACH OUT BROADLY ENOUGH, AND THEY GET LEFT.

There are the newspapers—the circulars—the handbills—the leaders.

The money does not go around. The candidate is stranded before he gets half way around.

THE MOST EXPERIENCED CAMPAIGNERS GOT LEFT.

In some instances new, untired, unexperienced men got immense pluralities.

One defect of the direct primary law is that **IT IS HELD AT THE TIME THE FARMER IS BUSIEST WITH SPRING WORK.**

It should be set three or four weeks earlier, to give the farmers a chance to vote.

With a late spring, and fine weather on primary day, there would be almost no farm vote cast.

Another change in the strenuous primary that would be beneficial would be to allow petitioners to sign but once for the same office—**PREVENTING MULTIPLICITY OF CANDIDATES.**

There may be other amendments to suggest that would improve the new law—but enough for the present. It will probably not be amendable.

TEACHING THE BOYS.

While the question of turning our common schools into cooking schools for the girls, and gymnasiums for the boys; while so much attention is being paid to the physical life, is there not danger that moral ethics are being neglected.
