READ WHAT COMES

Major Miller Tells of Conditions of Labor and Capital

"Major Miller, a Pennsylvania millionaire, whose fortune grew out of coal and steel mined and manufactured by men whom God intended should enjoy equal rights and privileges with Major Miller, has just broken the record for high-priced banquets. In barbaric splendor and cost, it far exceeded the hundred-thousand-dollar dinner which the Equitable policy-holders provided for Jimmy Hyde and a few friends. The cost of Major Miller's banquet was sufficient to provide food for thousands of starving people who eke out a miserable existence in the great cities of the East. Properly distributed, it would have been sufficient to grant to hundreds of striking miners the small increase they ask in wages.

"It is this wanton waste of riches, not by an economic system that is all wrong that accelerates the speed of the nation toward a social revolution, and the time is not far distant when at some of these banquets the Major Millers, drunk with the wine of financial success and power, will be startled by the appearance of handwriting on the wall that will be appalling in its significance. Perhaps it might be termed a redeeming feature in the nature of John D. Rockefeller that he never flaunts his great wealth in the faces of those whom he has robbed. In avoiding publicity of this nature, he, of course, exhibits an intelligence that is lacking in some of his fellow-millionaires, who seem to delight in shaking the red rag of affluence and power at the underfed and mistreated 'bull' of common labor. Misery and starvation are ever present in the tenement districts of New York, as well as other large cities and within a radius of a few miles of

the scene of that sybaritic feast of Major Miller's it is a certainty that the gaunt specter of famine awaiting its victim hovered over many cradles.

"On the pinched, waif-like face of the tenement-house mother, watching the departure of the last flickering spark of life of the baby who perished for want of proper food and nourishment, the lovelight gleams just as strong as on that of the mother who can bring to the bedside of her darling every necessity, convenience and luxury, that the most exacting specialist can demand. These conditions are growing worse instead of better, but a fact that bodes no good for the Major Millers, the Jimmy Hydes and the men 'higher up' is that the teeming millions who are eking out a bare existence from the crumbs which fall from the rich man's table are becoming sullen over the existence of such conditions.

"Fuel is being added to the flame by the steady addition to the list of converts to socialism of wealthy men who are at last realizing the awful injustice of a system which permits some of the people to revel in luxury while others equally worthy are confronted with semi-starvation all their lives."—The Oregonian.

The above editorial appeared in the Morning Oregonian of March 29, 1906, in the third column, editorial page, under the head, "Promoting Growth of Socialism." No comment is necessary. The editorial is self-explanatory, but for the benefit of those who have never read Socialist literature I wish to call attention to it by paragraphs. The article is here given, complete, as it appeared in the Oregonian.

It will be noticed in the first paragraph the editor says "Major Miller, a Pennsylvania millionaire, whose fortune grew out of coal and steel mined and manufactured by men whom God intended should enjoy equal rights and privileges with Major Miller." No sentence or paragraph ever written by socialist, no difference how zealous for his cause, could be stronger approval or endorsement of socialism than those words. The socialist tells you that labor produces all things and should receive all the products—not a part. The men who "mined and manufactured" began the process and completed it and Major Miller did absolutely nothing, yet in a few short years he is enabled to give a banquet—one supper—that cost more than a quarter of a million dollars, while the "men whom God intended should enjoy equal rights and privileges with Major Miller" are "eking out a bare existence from the

crumbs which fall from the rich man's table." Capital has never produced a dollar of wealth on earth and never will. It is only an instrument in the hands of individuals used for the sole purpose of robbing the laborer of the products of his toil. We cry day by day for capital to develop our industries and natural resources, because we are yet children and do not understand the first principles of industrial economics. It is not capital we want, nor capitalists; it is co-operative power of labor, the energy of industry—that we want and need, and until we learn this true lesson we will never have legislation in behalf of the laborer, and until our legislation is in behalf of labor it had as well not exist, in fact should not.

Laborers long ago passed that stage—if it ever existed—where it is necessary to have a burly boss drive them ten to twelve hours a day and then take from them the products of their toil. Labor builds the mill, manufactures the machinery, puts it in place, cuts the logs and hauls them to the mill, cuts them into lumber, then carries the product to market, sells and delivers it to the purchaser and brings back the money, accounting for it to a penny and for all this effort receives less than one-fourth the final returns. Then you wonder why laborers do not own their own homes. Capital does absolutely nothing and gets more than three-fourths, and do you wonder that the capitalists give banquets that cost a quarter of a million? All this takes place among "men whom God intended should enjoy equal rights and privileges."

Has the child born in a hovel equal privileges with the one whose inheritance of his birth is fifty million dollars? If a few men have absolute possession and title to all the means of producing wealth is it not a fact that they are the absolute masters of those who have nothing, and is it not also a fact that at birth the rich man's child inherits absolute mastery over the children of poverty? Do you desire that your children should be the inherent slaves of a master class? You have children and it is your duty to think of their welfare and if this editorial, in a paper of the standing of the Oregonian, is not of sufficient weight to convince you that capitalism is wrong and at least induce you to study socialism, then you are unworthy your children.

Read the last paragraph of this editorial and ponder over it. Think of the "awful injustice of a system which permits some of the people to revel in luxury while others equally worthy and with equal rights to a living are confronted with semi-starvation all their lives."

What could be more insane or horrible than the perpetration of such a system—capitalism—in a land where more is produced each year than the people can consume while "teeming millions are eking out a bare existence from the crumbs that fall from the rich man's table" in a land where the absolute power of government is in the hands of those who are eating the crumbs?

Think of the insanity of a people who for the sake of party ties will vote themselves into slavery and positively refuse to read literature that

promises them the rights which God intended they should enjoy. Think of a people "eking out a bare existence from the crumbs which fall from the rich man's table" and refusing to study socialism which promises them every comfort of life, and this too when socialism as an economic plan has the endorsement of the intellect of all nations and is fought by none but monarchs, millionaires and people who have never studied it—who never read a line of socialist literature.

In the second paragraph the editor says: "It is the wanton wastes of riches got by an economic system that is all wrong that accelerates the speed of this nation toward a social revolution." How could language be couched in terms more expressive? This "wanton waste of riches" comes only by reason of underpaid and underfed labor and none feel its awful sting but the millions of wage slaves whose lives are spent in the production of wealth that is absorbed and wasted by those who do no labor. Yes, the social revolution is coming. It is hoped and believed by all socialists that it will be a peaceful revolution, but starving men who look upon the "pinched and wan" faces of their little ones who lie down in Death's cold embrace through the lack of care and which the can't give them, sometimes refuse to reason. Yes, the social revolution is coming. Let us hope it will be peaceful; but it is coming.

Slaves! Why sit ye silently mourning over the body of your departed babe? Why shed the bitter tears of despair for the loved one whose soul is gone to the home of eternal love and whose body you must bury in the Potter's field because the capitalist owns the land and allows no other. Arise assert your manhood, throw off your shackles. The world is yours by right of divine inheritance. You have other loved ones to protect. Do not let the same fate befall them.

Why sit ye in tears and despair while the capitalists revel in luxury. The power is yours and you have only to assert it. Be men.
