SALEM BEATS EUGENE

Once again the Willamettes took the Eugene collegians into camp. This time it was in a baseball contest of the most exciting kind, and when the smoke of battle had cleared away the Salem boys sang the victory song to the tune of 7 to 6.

Says "The Sunday Register": "The college baseball season was opened at Recreation park yesterday by Oregon and Willamette universities, resulting in a score of 7 to 6 in favor of Willamette."

It was Oregon's first game and the boys were a little unsteady, the record of the first two innings on their part being five errors, allowing two hits, two stolen bases and four runs. They took a brace in the third, allowing no more. But in the fourth, Willamette again scored by a base on balls, a stolen base and a passed ball.

Oregon was unable to score up to the fifth inning, when by an error three hits and three stolen bases, three Oregonians crossed the rubber. Oregon stock immediately went up and when Hurd replaced Beck in the fifth, it commenced to look as if there was still a chance, but it was a forlorn hope, and the game closed by the score of 7 to 6.

SCHOOL BOARD MEETS

Report From the City Superintendent as to Needs of the Future

The Salem board of education met Saturday night; all present but W. H. Byrd.

The janitor of the Park school was ordered to erect a new flagstaff for that building.

The school census was adopted, and shows 1343 boys and 1532 girls of school age. This is a total of 2875 against 2812 last year. Total registered in school 1786 on April 30th. High school 221.

The finances of the district are getting into better shape. There are a number of call notes out drawing six per cent. Some of the board thought a popular loan would get this money at a lower rate on interest. As the popular loan notes are non-taxable, the assessor would have no right to list them. The present plan of assessing all notes and mortgages at full value is making it almost impossible to borrow money at private loans that are taxable. Whether the school district should float a popular loan would depend some on the extent to which the present system of assessing is carried.

City Supt. Powers' Report.

City Superintendent J. M. Powers made a regular monthly report, which was adopted and placed on file. It is as follows:

"I hand you herewith my report covering statistics of enrollment, attendance, etc., for the month ending April 30, 1906. As compared with the corresponding month last year the report shows an increase in the total registration of four, in the total remaining at the end of the month of 49, in the average daily attendance of 32, in the average number belonging 59.

"A comparison of the same items relating to the high school shows an increase in the total registration of 54, in the total remaining at the end of the month of 58, in the average daily attendance of 59, and average number belonging of 62.

"I take this opportunity to report to the board that the increased enrollment at the beginning of next year, and the consequent increase of classes will necessitate the employment of an additional teacher in the high school. No high school teacher can handle more than six classes daily, and do good work in them all, and few teachers can secure the best results with more than 30 students in a class.

"The principal of the high school now teaches six classes. He should not have over five classes. The history teacher now has six classes, containing 115 students. Next year there will be 200 students in this department and an additional class. The teacher of English now has six classes enrolling 200 students, whereas next year there will be seven classes in this department with at least 225 students enrolled. The science teacher now has six classes, with laboratory work in three of them, and field work in all of them, which makes his work equivalent to nine classes daily. It will be necessary to relieve him of at least a third of this work. There are 200 students enrolled in this department. The Latin teacher has six classes this year, enrolling 120 students, and an algebra class with 30 students. Next year there will be eight classes in this department, enrolling 160 students. The German teacher has four classes this year with 100 students and three algebra classes with 75 students. Next year there will be six classes in the German department, which will then supply full work for one teacher. There is no class in book keeping this year, because each teacher was carrying full work without this subject. There is, however, a strong demand for this study in the high school, and this demand should be met next year. These estimates are all made upon a conservative increase in the attendance next year, and after all assignments have been made, there will be at least six classes more than we have in the high school this year. The city of Eugene, with an enrollment in its high school

about equal to that of the high school this year, employs six school teachers in addition to its principal, and this school has no laboratories. I therefore recommend that in the election of teachers high school next year, one teacher be employed to teach mathematics and science.

"The principal of the East school informs me that the old building is rotten and unsafe. This leaves the building open to destruction in case of fire. The East school is purchased on or before June 1st, and the building is to be removed. The city of Eugene, with an enrollment in its high school about equal to that of the high school this year, employs six school teachers in addition to its principal, and this school has no laboratories. I therefore recommend that in the election of teachers high school next year, one teacher be employed to teach mathematics and science.

Removal Notice. On or before June 1st, 1906, the city of Eugene will remove its high school building to 1815 Commercial street, next door to Baker's grocery store, and the present location. Old and new are invited to see my school and business at the new school. FRANK J. CHENEY, The Board.
