Lincoln County Schools.

Trouble is brewing in Lincoln county. It appears that the county court has failed to levy the tax for school purposes, aggregating \$6 per capita for children of school age, and also the special 10-cent library tax. REPUBLICAN CANDIDATES ARE ACTIVE

Campaign Mass Meetings at Corvallis and Salem This Week

Professor Hawley Had a Rousing Meeting at Jefferson Friday Evening

The Republican state campaign opens at Corvallis Tuesday evening with a mass meeting, at which all the Republican state candidates are to speak. It is Dr. Withycombe's home and he will be given a fine send-off.

Salem Wednesday Night.

The Republican state candidates will open the campaign in Marion county at the Armory, Salem, Wednesday night, Ex-Governor Gear to preside, and make an address and introduce the speakers.

Hawley at Jefferson.

Hon. W. C. Hawley opened his campaign in this part of the state at Jefferson Friday evening with one of the best and most enthusiastic meetings ever held in that place. Several Republicans from Albany, among them Frank J. Miller, Republican candidate for joint senator, and J. S. Van Winkle, county chairman, went down to attend the meeting. The opera house, in which the meeting was held, had been beautifully decorated by the ladies; flags, bunting and greenery, with choice cut flowers, were used in the decorations, while pictures of Grant, Lincoln, McKinley and Roosevelt occupied prominent places in the front of the auditorium.

Ex-Governor J. H. Fletcher presided and introduced the speakers in his happiest vein. Mr. Miller was the first on the program, and though he was not prepared for a campaign address he made a short speech that was well received and left a good impression. The enthusiasm of the crowd when he appeared was very flattering and indicated perfect satisfaction with the nomination made in this district for joint senator.

A storm of cheers greeted Mr. Hawley when he was presented to the audience. He is well known to the Jefferson people, and none there were but had heard him often, and they showed their appreciation at his appearance. Mr. Hawley spoke for fully an hour and 20 minutes, and his excellent style and diction, his masterful handling of his subject matter—the demands of the hour and the public questions in which the entire country, and especially Oregon, is at this time interested—won for him the warmest appreciation of his audience. His address showed a careful study of the public questions. He discussed in a plain and matter-of-fact way the rate question, foreign immigration, revision of the tariff, the Panama canal, government ownership of locks, involving the reduction of rates on all products of western Oregon, and the opening and improvement of coast harbors. These matters were discussed in the convincing way peculiar to the speaker, and the impression soon grew that the Republican candidate for congress was not a follower, but a leader, a man who understood the questions before the American people, and who could tell in an able and particularly pleasant manner what he knew.

Mr. Hawley interspersed his address with wit and humor, and all his own, and while his campaign is made for the purpose of securing for himself the support of the Republicans, he made an earnest and effective plea for the support of the entire Republican ticket as a requisite to the continuation of the prosperity of the country under Republican rule. He showed a degree of ability as a campaign orator that surprised even his friends, and no one who heard him doubts for a moment his ability to hold his own in any company of brassy men.

Mr. Hawley leaves this week for Tillamook, where he will hold five meetings, involving 40 miles of travel every day during the week, an activity that would be impossible for a less robust man.

A Don Quixote Celebration.

Madrid, May 7.—The ter-centenary celebration in honor of the first publication of Cervantes' "Don Quixote" in the year 1606 began here today. The plan to hold such a celebration was suggested by some of the literary men of Spain and the government took up the suggestion and gave it the warmest and most enthusiastic support. For months the preparations for the festivities have been going on and the celebration promises to be one of unusual brilliancy. It will last three days and will embrace an interesting program. Hundreds of celebrated writers in all parts of the world, artists and dramatists, have been invited and every European and South and Central American country will be represented at the various exercises in honor of the author of Don Quixote.

Only the first part of Don Quixote was published in 1606, while the second part followed ten years later. Cervantes, the author of the famous book, died in 1616. It may be safely said that there is probably not another work in any language which has become as widely known as the story of Don Quixote, the knight errant of La Mancha. It has been translated into nearly every modern language and is considered one of the great classics of the Spanish literature.

The program of the celebration includes a grand state performance at the Royal theater, a parade and flower corso, a cavalcade artistically designed with equipments of the days of Don Quixote and other exhibitions. The city is filled with thousands of visitors from all parts of Europe and the city is handsomely decorated in honor of the fest.

Simplicity in Church Music.

Omaha, Neb., May 7.—For the first time in the history of the Roman Catholic church in the diocese of Omaha the musical part of the services in the various churches yesterday was of the most primitive simplicity. In accordance with an order of Bishop Scannell the music at services yesterday was confined to nearly all Roman Catholic churches of the diocese to congregational singing and male voices. No vocal or instrumental solos were heard and no instruments excepting the organ which played the accompaniment to the congregational singing. The order of Bishop Scannell was issued in conformity with the wishes of Pope Pius who is strongly opposed to all display and brilliancy in the music or singing at the regular church services. He strongly favors a return to the simple forms of worship and has repeatedly expressed himself against vocal and instrumental solos or anything of a musical nature that would detract the attention of the congregations from their devotions. It is expected that the example established in this diocese will gradually be imitated throughout the country.
