"The Gay Deceiver" at The Grand Opera House last night was a decided success. It was alive from the curtain raising until it fell at the end of the play. There was not an idle moment in it, and every one of those moments was filled with laughter. There was no lachrymose scenes; no sorrow and soul-harrowing conditions, but just good, jolly fun from beginning to end.

It is sometimes hard to write up the details of a play, just as it is for a cartoonist to portray an individual who has no distinguishing features, and this is one of those cases. The company is so well balanced that it is difficult to say anything about them without saying a great deal. Mr. Willard as Lysander Lyon showed himself a great actor, and Henry Blanchard as Lysander's Uncle was natural, artistic, perfect.

It was a largely a man's play, the ladies not being brought to the front in it. Yet their parts were well taken, and played for all there was in them. Marion Dunn as "Nellie Golden Gate" was as pretty a piece of femininity as one would care to see on the stage—or off; and Adelaide Harland, a different type of the beautiful, captured the audience from the time the curtain lifted, and each are artists. Little Eleanor Everett as "Tootsy, Wootsy" was a decided success, and all the others were right up to the work. Between curtains were two songs, one by Miss Harland that woke the house up, and another by Mr. John Lenard, who has a magnificent bass voice, and who was recalled. His song alone was worth the price of admission—and then some.

Tonight it is that most beautiful of all Irish plays, "Kathleen Mavourneen," and theater lovers who miss it will miss a splendid play, put up by an evenly balanced company and talented lot of players. Take the horse editor's word for it, and go.
