BACK FROM THE QUAKE

J. H. Darling, of Oregon City, is in town today. He has just returned from the earthquake belt. His wife and daughter had narrow escapes from death at San Jose. The house in which they were sleeping collapsed, and seven of the inmates were killed. Mr. Darling was in San Francisco several times and covered the devastated district thoroughly. He saw many bodies still lying unburied, and states that the sanitary conditions will grow worse rather than better. He estimates, from personal observation, the loss of life in San Francisco alone at 4500. San Jose and Santa Rosa had greater loss of life proportionately than did San Francisco. In San Jose his property was destroyed. Not a brick or stone building in that city was left standing.

Mr. Darling is connected with a large California real estate firm, and says that his firm expects to handle large quantities of Oregon real estate this year. He has within the past month prepared 80,000 acres of Oregon lands for Eastern buyers, two colonies having been located by the Swedish consul. His firm estimates that as a result of the earthquake they will this year turn over 50,000 acres in small holdings to Eastern and California people who would otherwise have located in California.

ARGUE CASE TODAY

Suit of F. J. Eldridge Against Hoefler and Zorn Argued Today

The equity suit brought by F. J. Eldridge against Hoefler & Zorn is being argued today before Judge Burnett. This is one of the most important suits ever in the courts of this county. The plaintiff asks for a decree declaring a deed to about 500 acres of land, belonging to the Eldridge estate, and in the name of Hoefler & Zorn, to be mortgage only, and to be allowed to redeem the premises on payment of the original amount of the alleged mortgage. The property has been in the hands of Hoefler & Zorn for about ten years, the deeds having been executed by David M. Keene. It is alleged that the latter held possession of the land only as trustee, and had no authority to deed the same.
