BE LOYAL TO HOME INDUSTRIES

Eastern Oregon Flour Is Sold in Salem Instead of the Home Made Goods

As a rule there is nobody so loyal to a town or an institution as the women of that community or institution. They will work for their own concern and rattle for its improvement as no man can. At the same time it is probably also the fact that women are more often misled in these same matters than anyone else under the sun. Their loyalty and generous nature at times makes them an easy prey for the designing business man. Salem is probably no exception to this rule, and there has recently occurred in our midst a piece of business enterprise, which fully illustrates this matter.

Reference is made to the fact that a few weeks ago our town was overrun with agents and solicitors for staple a commodity as flour, from an Eastern Oregon mill. These solicitors went to every kitchen and with good persuasion induced the housekeepers to try their product in their bread making experiences. It is claimed that 1300 sacks of this outside flour was thus sold within a few days in our city.

This to start with means sending \$1800 out of Salem for an article which is just as well made in our own community. The purpose of this writer is to call the attention to Salem women housekeepers, in fact, heads of families, to the injustice of this proceeding. These outsiders pay no taxes here, they pay no insurance, they don't contribute to our churches, they don't help the band, they don't help charity, and in fact they do nothing to help our community. It is good enterprise on the part of these outsiders but not for Salem. Let every Salemite decide now and forever to patronize every home product possible, and become a committee of one to solicit business for every home product article.

We want to invoke the shibboleth "made in Salem." Scores of our best people go out of their way, and sometimes pay a little extra to patronize Salem producers. Let us help this cause along, and let us begin with the staff of life.

The following article from a trade paper hits the mill question squarely: "The value of a flour mill to an agricultural community is so well understood that it is very common for bonuses to be offered or other inducements held out for their erection. We never hear of a bonus being offered for a grocery or any other form of village activity; but farmers and business men well understand the value of the flour mill.

"The experience of scores of towns will show that the flour mill is the greatest single factor in the prosperity of the average agricultural community. It creates a home market for the most important products of the farm. The money stays in the community. If any one will figure the amount of cash that a mill puts into circulation and the amount of business it draws to the town, it will easily be seen why communities with mills often flourish, while neighboring communities without a mill languish. In fact, scores of towns in this country have been built around a mill as a nucleus. Nothing draws the farmers' trade like a flour mill. One generally buys in the market where he sells, and the farmer trades in the town where he takes his grain to mill.

"The only wonder is that the business men of so many towns do not more heartily support an industry which means so much to them. The storekeepers are the chief offenders. Evidently in the case cited above the home mill had not received fair treatment.

ment from the business men of the community. No doubt the latter had sold flour made outside; probably because they wanted something which the other stores did not have. It is not particularly creditable to a community to have been on the point of losing its mill because of non-support; but it speaks well for their good sense that they did not let it go. The passing of the mill in small agricultural communities has often meant the death of the town.

The following is from a correspondent of another prominent trade paper touching the same subject:

"All I know about the big miller is what I have seen of him in our town—a town of 12,000 inhabitants, where competition is very keen. Not long ago I noticed two big millers had come to our town trying to sell flour. The first one was one of the biggest millers in the world. He went from door to door, telling the women of the 'extra quality' of his flour; and he actually took orders for single sacks of flour, which, of course, he turned over to the stores at which he wanted to sell. Just think of it! A miller who grinds thousands of sacks of flour daily, having to go from door to door peddling his flour by single sacks. The other one, somewhat smaller than the first, also went around from door to door. He was armed with two-pound samples of his flour, which he distributed among the housewives. He too, must sing a song and take orders for single sacks which he must turn over to his dealers, just to please them. What an expense! Just think of it! Is the big miller's business really so rotten as all that? Furthermore, the wholesale price they received from the dealers, was at a basis where it would require more than ten mills to make one cent."

ATTORNEY EXCUSES MITCHELL

A Most Peculiar Letter From a Prosecutor, But Generally Endorsed

Probably the most remarkable letter ever written by an officer of the law is this of John Manning district attorney of Multnomah county, appearing in the Telegram last night.

District Attorney John Manning has addressed a letter to Kenneth MacIntosh, prosecuting attorney for King county, Washington, in which he virtually says the killing of Edmund Creffield, the Holy Roller "prophet," at the hands of George Mitchell, is justifiable. The letter informs the Washington prosecutor of the record of shame made by Creffield in Oregon, and makes the proposition that the district attorney of Multnomah county be permitted to go before the grand jury or on the witness stand in the trial on behalf of Mitchell.

No more valuable witness for the defense could be asked by Mitchell than Manning. In his capacity of district attorney, Manning investigated the character and practices of Creffield, and the disclosures which were laid before the officer were revolting. Many of the details which District Attorney Manning learned were not used in the prosecution of Creffield, as there was sufficient other evidence to send the Holy Roller to the penitentiary.

Unwritten Law Justifies Mitchell.

If Manning's offer is accepted by the authorities at Seattle, however, he can unfold a tale of outrage to the grand jury which should convince that body that Mitchell was justified by unwritten law at least, in his extermination of Creffield. Manning's information is extensive and of such character that it cannot be described in the public prints but it should have great weight with the grand jury of King county. Furthermore, the belief is prevalent that should Manning testify, the officers at Seattle will not only release Mitchell but will recommend him for a Carnegie medal as a hero. Mr. Manning's letter follows:

"Portland, Or., May 8.—Kenneth MacIntosh, Prosecuting Attorney, Seattle, Wash.—Dear Sir: I notice by the press that there was a man killed in your city the other day by name Creffield, by religion, Holy Roller, so I have ten to say to you that I have had a great deal to do with this man Creffield, in his life-time, and the outrageous crimes committed by this brute, in this state, on simple-minded girls and women were many. I had him arrested for the crime of adultery, committed with Mrs. Starr, sister of George Mitchell, the man who killed him. He was convicted, sentenced, and served a

term of two years in the penitentiary at Salem, Or.

"Creffield broke up many families in Oregon by leading them astray on his fake religion. I investigated many, many charges against him while he was on his Holy Rolling tour of Oregon, the character of which were perfectly awful, in so far as being low, degenerate and brutal, and if permitted, I would like an opportunity to testify before the grand jury, before Mitchell is indicted, or the trial court, as to the low, degenerate character of this man, and the outrages and brutalities practiced by him, in Oregon, upon ignorant and unsophisticated girls.

"Our officers chased this man all over the state of Oregon, and finally found him hidden under the floor in a house at Corvallis, Or., he having ruined the family and broken up the home.

"Now, Mr. MacIntosh, I do not want you to understand that I would not uphold the majesty of the law, but when a man infringes upon the common decency of society to the extent that this man did, and there is no statute under which he could be prosecuted, and he has so grossly debauched families, I think the taking of the law into one's own hands, under such circumstances to mete out summary justice is almost excusable.
