

## ABOUT OREGON POLITICS

### What Republicans Think of the Ticket and the Primary Plan of Nomination

One of the most disconcerting features of this campaign, to the Democrats, is the unanimity displayed by Republican leaders in supporting the ticket and predicting its success. The members of the minority party have been banking upon the belief that a warm primary fight would disrupt the Republican party and leave a very large portion of its members ready to vote for the Democratic opponents of the Republican nominees. Contrary to their expectations, the direct primary nominations have left no more sore spots than did the convention nominations. In fact, the indications of soreness are much less than under the convention system, for there is now no opportunity to charge defeat against a faction or combination. Every day there are increased evidences of loyalty to the ticket. Republican newspapers all over the state are in line for the Republican nominees, and Republican speakers are tendering their services.

**W. L. Toose's Prediction.**  
Concerning the political situation Walter L. Toose had the following to say when in Portland yesterday.

"I regard the Republican state, congressional and county tickets recently nominated as composed of a higher type of our citizenship than any ticket that has heretofore been offered to the Republican voters of the state. I am certain that Jonathan Bourne, Jr., the Republican nominee for the United States senate, will be elected by an overwhelming majority. Hon. James Withycombe will be elected as the next governor of Oregon by a majority of not less than 10,000. Everything indicates, in my judgment, a great Republican victory all along the line. I shall vigorously campaign throughout the state and advocate the support of the Republican ticket from top to bottom. Republicans cannot afford in any manner whatever to encourage Democratic candidates for office, either in the

county, district or state. There is, in my judgment, no reason why any candidate who has been defeated for office should in any way oppose the successful nominee. In view of my 20 years of fidelity and loyalty to the principles of the Republican party during all the campaigns in this state, it is scarcely necessary for me to say that I shall loyally stand by the Republican ticket from top to bottom, and exhaust every effort in securing a sweeping victory throughout the state."

Mr. Toose will be one of the principal speakers at a Republican rally at Oregon City Thursday evening.

#### Baker County Local.

"If conditions in Baker county are an indication of the feeling over the state, the Republican ticket will win without the loss of a single candidate," says J. N. Hart of Baker City, Republican nominee for state senator. "There are no evidences of disaffection such as prevailed four years ago, but on the other hand the members of the party feel that the state candidates are clean, able men, nominated in the direct primary after a fair contest, and are entitled to the support of all Republicans. Of course, there will be some Republicans who will scratch the ticket, but the number will not be large enough to affect the result. This is a Republican year. Republicans feel that there has been too much dissension in the party and that this is a good opportunity to lay aside all factionalism and stand together for the whole ticket."

#### Line of Success.

"It's a cinch," is the opinion of L. L. Patterson, who has just been up to Salem on a visit to his boyards. "There is no doubt about the Republican ticket being elected from top to bottom. In some respects Governor Chamberlain is stronger than he was four years ago, but in other respects he is weaker. He will get some Republican votes, but will also lose some Democratic votes. A man can't serve four years as governor without making enemies in his own party. Then there is no such dissatisfaction with the ticket as there was four years ago. It looks to me like a cinch."

#### Big Republican Rally.

A big Republican rally will be held at Salem tonight, at which ex-Governor Geer will preside and deliver an introductory address, and nearly all the state candidates will be present. The following committees have charge of the meeting:

#### Governor Chamberlain's Campaign.

Governor Chamberlain will come down from Salem this evening and leave tonight for eastern Oregon, where he will deliver several addresses. He will speak at Haines on May 10 at 8 p. m.; Ontario, May 11 at 2 p. m.; at Sumpter, May 12 at 1:30 p. m.; at Baker City the same day at 8 p. m.; at Union, May 14 at 1:30 p. m., and at La Grande May 15 at 8 p. m. It is probable that he will then make a speaking tour of Morrow and Sherman counties and return to Western Oregon. He expects to close his campaign at Penitence on the Saturday before the election.

Senator Gearin has not decided whether he will return to Oregon during this campaign. If important matters of legislation will permit he will come in time to make one or two addresses before election.

#### Takes No Action as Yet.

The Municipal association has taken no action yet toward the endorsement of candidates for office, and may not do so, though it is expected that a meeting to consider the matter will be held some day early next week. There is some talk of letting all endorsements stand as they were made before the primaries and make no new ones, but it is not certain that this plan will be followed.

The Democratic state central committee will meet in the state headquarters in the New Lange hotel on Washington street at 2 o'clock this afternoon for the purpose of organizing and planning a campaign.

#### Pioneers' Annual Meeting.

The Pioneers' Association will hold its annual meeting this year in the grove at J. A. Hunt's residence on Saturday June 16, when there will be a basket dinner and a fine program, including speeches by Governor Chamberlain, ex-Governor Geer and other prominent public men. The Victor Point band has been engaged for the occasion and there will be singing and music and other enjoyable features. This association was organized only last year, but it has 150 members, fully representative of that whole section of country. The hospitality of the Walde Hills people is known far and wide, and those who attended their reunion will be entertained royally. A general invitation is extended.
