**Shipping Sheep for Profit.**  
A dispatch from Pendleton Thursday says: Before the end of May over 100 carloads of sheep will be shipped from Pendleton over the Washington & Columbia River and Northern Pacific railroads. The first large shipment will be that of the Hunter Bros., who are taking 12,000 lambs to Everts, Mich., where they expect to range them for a year or so, and then market the animals on the Atlantic seaboard or in Chicago. Fifteen carloads will be started Sunday by the Hunter Company, and Pope & Howard will ship 15 carloads on the 18th. These animals will be fed for the market at Medina, N. D.

The largest individual shipment of sheep will start from Pendleton on the 25th. Fifty carloads in all will leave the yards for points in Wisconsin. Ray Bros. are shipping 25 cars on this consignment, and Tubbs, of Ladysmith, Wis. is shipping 25 carloads.

Heretofore Umatilla sheepmen have been selling their stock to Eastern buyers, who take them to feeding grounds near the Eastern markets, and clear a handsome profit. Hunter Bros. have been making a study of conditions for the past year, and concluded that they would save the buyer's profit on sheep by taking them East, ranging the herds near some convenient market and selling at times when the market is favorable, thus realizing growers' and buyers' profits combined.

Saturday 4000 head of sheep will be dipped near Pendleton, preparatory to being shipped by Hunter Bros.

**Shuffle Mixes Thirteen Babies.**

While their mothers were at supper last night a woman in charge of the improvised nursery bathed the infants and dressed them in new clothes, provided by the relief committee. She had just completed her task when the mothers came back. They thought they had lost their children, and there was a bedlam of lamentation until they had sorted over the babies, and all were identified and claimed.

**Minnesota's Anniversary.**  
St. Paul, Minn., May 11.—Nearly 2000 old settlers from all parts of the state are assembled in this city to take part in the celebration of the 47th anniversary of the admission of Minnesota to the Union. There will be a parade in the afternoon, and a large meeting in the evening, with addresses and telling of reminiscent stories by some of the oldest settlers.

**New Tuberculosis Antitoxin.**  
Paris, May 12.—It has just been announced that Dr. Piogey of this city and Don Lino Velasquez, a Spanish scientist, have discovered a new tuberculosis antitoxin, the composition and mode of preparation of which they have decided to keep secret until all doubts as to its efficiency have been removed. The discoverers declare that the antitoxin is harmless to human being and animals, but prevents the development of the Koch bacilli.  
After experimenting on themselves and finding that the inoculation did not produce pain, local inflammation or febrile reaction, they inoculated 30 patients, suffering from different forms of tuberculosis, and an improvement was always noticed, particularly in the cases of osteo periostitis and lupus. Dr. Piogey and his colleague, who have hopes of effecting complete cures, will communicate the results of their experiments and observations to the scientific world.
