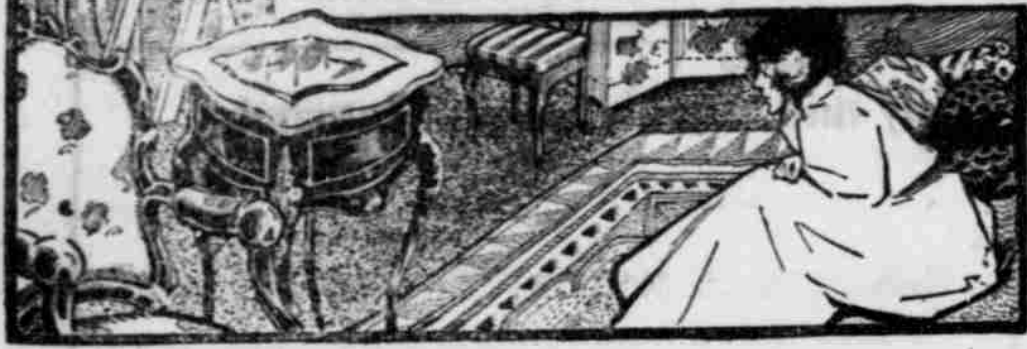

Mr. Griggs, her husband, is a member of the I. O. O. F., and the local lodge has been giving special attention to Mrs. Griggs since her arrival in the city.

WOMANS CLUB RECEIVES

The reception given on Saturday afternoon by the Woman's Club to the visiting club women, Mrs. Mary C. C. Bradford, of Colorado, and Miss Laura Clay, of Kentucky, was a most enjoyable occasion. Several rooms of the beautiful home of Mrs. T. T. Geer were thrown open, and she received the guests.

After a short time given to the routine business of the club, Mrs. Bradford was requested to make some remarks. She said: In an old Hindu legend it is related of Buddha that when he was ready to lay off his mortal body, his followers asked if he would come again. "After many ages," he replied, "in a land not yet discovered and to a people yet unborn." "How wilt thou come," they said. "In the forms of many women, and they shall go up and down the land, carrying blessing and wisdom with them." Mrs. Bradford liked to think the legend was symbolized by the work of women, especially the women of the General Federation of Women's Club, who at this time seem to be especially the light bringers.

Reforms in response to the appeals of the general federation in the line of child protective legislation had been first accomplished in Colorado, and with more speed and ease than elsewhere, because there the women have the ballot. The child's work was, when a need was seen to supply it by voluntary effort, and when the women had found a workable method to go to the authorities, municipal or state, and say: "We have proven the enterprise to be a factor in the welfare of the community. This being so, it is your duty to maintain it." And the city or state rarely refuses to do so. This had been done in the case of the traveling libraries, the free employment bureau of the Women's Club of Denver, and other enterprises.

She touched upon the letter sent to all federated clubs by the industrial advisor committee of the general federation, in which such experts as Jane Addams, Florence Kelly and others urged the duty of endorsing the principle of equal suffrage for women, as a necessary step in their industrial advancement, and their needed protection by the law.

Miss Clay was then called upon and she took as the text of her remarks the beauty of the spirit of the motto of federation—Unity in Diversity. She said such a ground of unity could be found in the purposes of women apparently so opposed as the suffragists and the anti-suffragists. For, however true it might have been 50 or 60 years ago, that women took no interest in public affairs, yet now intelligent women of all shades of opinion felt it a duty and a right to concern themselves about large public interests. Through the new power of organization women are able to effect much in directing public measures. Women who call themselves opposed to the ballot for women differed from the suffragists mainly in the means by which they wished to attain practically the same ends, for they desired to bring to bear what they called "influence," through the instrumentality of cumbrous, expensive and constantly changing organizations; whereas the suffragists were aiming to become once for all equally privileged members of the already established organization of government, with its machinery carried on at public expense, and to which women are now paying dues in the shape of taxes, while they are denied a voice in directing its affairs.

After the remarks of the two visitors delicious ices, cakes and coffee were served, and a delightful hour was spent in a general conversation on the objects which occupy the attention of the clubs, and on the results which have rewarded their efforts.

When she learned that she was to be sent to the asylum, Mrs. Ames declared that "it had been ordained from the beginning that she was to go to the asylum." She said that "the Lord would provide for her while she was in Salem."—Oregon Journal.
