To Honor Gilmore's Memory.

New York, May 13.—A monster concert will be given in Madison Square Garden this evening in honor of the memory of Patrick Sarsfield Gilmore, the famous American bandmaster, whose death in 1892 left a great void in the ranks of American conductors. Anticipating a tremendous attendance the seating capacity of Madison Square Garden has been increased to about 12,000 by utilizing the large floor space of the hall, where collapsible chairs were placed. So great has been the demand for boxes and seats that there is every reason

to believe that the hall will be crowded in every part tonight.

When the plan was first proposed to give a concert in honor of Gilmore's memory, the suggestion was received everywhere with great enthusiasm. Few men in the musical profession have had as many admirers in all classes of society as Gilmore, who was, undoubtedly, the most popular bandmaster that ever lived in this country.

A Gilmore Memorial Concert Committee was formed, which organized at the residence of John D. Crimmins by the election of Thomas M. Mulry as president; General Thomas L. James and John R. Van Wormer as vice presidents; John D. Crimmins, treasurer; John P. Carter, secretary and director general, and Andrew McCormick, manager.

Many distinguished men, like President Roosevelt, Archbishop Farley, ex-President Grover Cleveland, Governor Frank W. Higgins, U. S. Senator Thos. M. Carter, the Hon. Seth Low, and many others, became members of the committee and worked faithfully to make the concert a financial success. The project was taken up by musicians everywhere with such enthusiasm that in a few days enough material was offered to give three monster concerts.

For the concert tonight a fine program has been prepared. Walter Damrosch, Victor Herbert and John Philip Sousa will be the conductors. A large orchestra, composed of members of the various orchestras and bands of this city will play selections under the direction of Mr. Sousa and a chorus of 1000 well trained voices, under the direction of Mr. Walter Damrosch will sing several numbers. Besides that there will be a number of solo by prominent singers and musicians.

Gilmore was born Christmas, 1829, in Ballygar, Ireland, and came to this country at the age of 19 years. In 1858 he brought Gilmore's band into existence. Fort Sumner had scarcely fallen before he attached his band to the Twenty-fourth Massachusetts Volunteers and later he reorganized all the state military bands under a commission from Governor Andrew. He served through the war and was appointed bandmaster general by Major General Banks. The close of the war brought his first musical event. At the inauguration of Governor Hahn in Lafayette Square, New Orleans, Gilmore conducted a chorus of 10,000 school children and an orchestra of 600 men. Accompanied by the booming of 36 cannons and the muckety of three complete regiments the children sang the "Star Spangled Banner" and other patriotic songs. His next big musical enterprise was the big Boston Musical Festival, which began on June 13, 1869. Then came the big Peace Jubilee in 1872, with a chorus of 20,000 voices and an orchestra of 2000 men. It was held in Boston and began on June 17, 1872, and continued 18 days. Boston showed its gratitude by presenting Gilmore with two gold medals and \$50,000.

In 1873 Gilmore attached his band to the Twenty-second regiment and began his series of 600 concerts in Gilmore's Garden, where Madison Square Garden now stands. In the Centennial year Gilmore went to Philadelphia where on the Fourth of July he gave a great national concert in Independence Square, in front of the building where the Declaration of Independence was signed, and then gave 60 concerts in the main building of the Exposition.

In 1876 he took his band to Europe and toured Great Britain, France, Germany, Belgium, and Holland with phenomenal success. After his return from Europe he played 14 seasons at Manhattan Beach, which greatly added to his popularity. His last great event was the quad-centennial concert given in City Hall Square, December 31, 1892. It was during that engagement that death by heart failure overtook him. His body rests in Calvary Cemetery.

German Sharpshooters' Festival.

Augusta, Ga., May 15.—The annual German Schuetzenfest of the German Sharpshooters of this state opened at the Schuetzenpark today and will last two days. The attendance is very large and some of the best shots in the state are here to take part in the contests. The festival is in the nature of a popular fest and the German-Americans of this city have made special efforts to provide amusement and pleasant entertainment for the thousands who have come here to attend the festival. The amusement program includes a concert this afternoon and a dance in the evening.
