SOCIALIST MEETING LAST NIGHT

The Socialists of this city held an enthusiastic meeting in the council rooms last evening. The occasion was the presence of the Socialist candidate for governor, C. W. Barzee, who made a short address, asking the comrades to vote the ticket straight from top to bottom. Barzee said he feared a half-baked Socialist more than any one else and he blamed them for the election of many an old party candidate.

The main address of the evening was made by A. M. Paul, the Socialist candidate for congress in the second district, who made an address most pleasing to the comrades.

"Is not the wealth aggregating into the hands of the few, and is not the republic well nigh destroyed?" asked the orator. He deplored the present system through which the aristocratic few have appropriated to themselves all the labor-saving machinery and the workmen as well. The rich ride the soft cushion in the Pullman, while the poor is forced to ride the beams. "We are taxed to support the nobility of this country, and taxed to buy titles of European nobles." As an example he cited the case of Miss Anna Gould, "who bought a French count who has of no account." More than our sires of the Revolution we have the right to rebel against excessive taxation was the declaration arrived at by the speaker in a long chain of reasoning. To the question of the two parties, he stated there was no difference between the Democrats and the Republicans. The two great parties are capital and labor. Where do you stand? Socialism, according to the speaker, was not a pipe dream, an idle fancy of the imagination of a few cranks, but the ultimate triumph of our economical system.

He referred to the times of financial depression as "financial thumb screws" through which the laboring men were forced to come to time and bow down to the money power. Protection and free trade and reciprocity was "tommy rot." The people fail to realize the condition in which they really are, but a great revolution is imminent and one which will probably be effected by means of the ballot.
