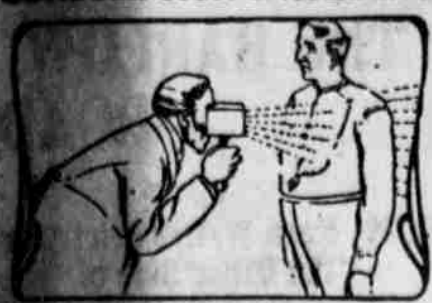

Horseflesh as Food.

Berlin, May 17.—The recently formed German Society for the Protection of Horses seems to be something of a misnomer. Its chairman, Major General Zobel, announced at a public meeting held at the Berlin town hall that the chief object of the society was to remove the existing prejudice against the consumption of horseflesh. "Kill 'em and eat 'em," he advocated in fact. It was further announced that a horseflesh supper would be given shortly, to which all persons interested in the movement were cordially invited. The delicate subject of sausages was not touched upon by the gallant general, but the hippis feast, he said, would show conclusively that suitably prepared flesh of properly treated, not overworked horses, made a very wholesome and succulent "remove." The removal of the prejudice, in this case, involves the removal of the horse, too. There have been, for many years, butcher shops in various cities of Germany that made a specialty of horseflesh, but the number of people who, knowingly, consumed horseflesh has, heretofore, been quite small. It is hoped by the example and agitation of this new organization to convert the people in general.

To Discuss Temperance Problem.

Scranton, Pa., May 16.—Hundreds of delegates to the annual convention of the Catholic Total Abstinence union, which opened here today, assembled in St. Peter's Cathedral this morning and attended pontifical high mass, which was celebrated by the Right Rev. M. J. Hoban. After mass the delegates marched to the Knights of Columbus hall, where the sessions of the convention will be held. At the hall the delegates were welcomed by the Right Rev. M. J. Hoban and Mayor J. Benjamin Dimmock. A short business session followed. This evening the delegates will be the guests of the local Catholic organizations at a banquet which will be held in the banquet hall of the Knights of Columbus.

Tomorrow will be the principal day of the convention. At the morning session various amendments to the constitution will be considered and voted on, while in the afternoon session the officers for the ensuing year will be elected.
