### PLANS OF THE G. A. R.

Wat Memorial Day Kept in More Solemn Manner.

According to plans announced by the joint memorial committee of the local G. A. R. posts at an adjourned meeting held yesterday afternoon, says the Oregonian of the 14th, Memorial day in Portland this year will be observed with more general and befitting regard for its solemnity than ever before. The committee is making an earnest endeavor to prevent the general public from observing the day as an ordinary holiday, to be celebrated with picnics, excursions, ball games and other sports, and during its meeting in Mulkey's hall adopted the following resolution, submitted by a committee composed of comrades D. J. Haynes of Lincoln-Garfield post; A. D. Borthwick of George Wright post, and Daniel Clark of Summer post, protesting against desecration of the holiday in the manner indicated:

#### Text of Resolutions.

"Resolved, that the Grand Army of the Republic reveres Memorial day and observes it in much the same spirit that a mother commemorates the anniversary of her dead child, viz., in sorrow and tears. It views, therefore, with regret and anguish of soul the inclination of the thoughtless to make it a day of revelry and joyous sport. It is not a day of gladness, like the Fourth of July, but rather a day of meditation and grief for the loss of 400,000 loyal lives in defense of the land that they loved and that we, by their sacrifices, are permitted to enjoy; therefore,

"We, the Memorial day committee of the Grand Army of the Republic, most respectfully protest against the desecration of this, to us, the holy day, by the playing of ball games, going on excursions and the like, and respectfully request that the day be devoted to teaching the children the sacrifices

our comrades of the Grand Army endured to perpetuate the institutions of this grand country of ours, believing that patriotism and good citizenship will be thereby the more firmly established in our midst."

The action of the committee was prompted by the published announcement of several large public picnics and excursions for the holiday.

#### Preparing Elaborate Program.

The program for Memorial day, in the preparation of which the joint committee is now engaged upon, is well along toward completion. The exercises will be along the usual lines, but will probably be a little more elaborate than usual. It has been determined to give the school children of the city a prominent place in them.

On the Thursday or Friday preceding Memorial day, Wednesday, May 30, speakers from the various G. A. R. posts of the city will be sent to every public and parochial school in the city desiring their presence, to deliver addresses to the pupils on the meaning and lessons of the holiday. Archbishop Christie has already requested that speakers visit all the parochial schools of the Catholic church.

At this time these speakers will request the children to bring to their respective school rooms on the afternoon of the day preceding the holiday bouquets of freshly cut flowers to be used in the decoration of the graves of veterans. They will be especially requested to bring the flowers tied in bouquets and not loose, as past experience have shown that loose flowers do not retain their freshness for any length of time.

#### Veterans Will Attend Church.

On the Sunday before Memorial day now generally known as Memorial Sunday, the members of the local G. A. R. posts and all visiting Grand Army men who happen to be in the city, will attend the evening services at the White Temple. Dr. J. Whitcombe Brougier will preach a special sermon, and good seats will be reserved for all veterans.

After the usual exercises on Memorial day, the graves of all war veterans buried in Portland cemeteries will be decorated. The annual memorial services will be held in Lone Fir cemetery at the foot of the Soldiers' monument.

The customary parade will be held, but who will be grand marshal of the day has not yet been decided. Neither has the Memorial day orator been selected. These and other details will be announced at the meetings of the joint committee next Sunday.

### AN INTERESTING LETTER.

Says Fire Started in San Jose Before the Quake.

The following extracts from a letter of a San Jose young lady to a friend in this city are of some interest and shows the way in which Californians accept the situation:

"We are gradually getting settled back into our old places, and beginning to look at life with some degree of confidence.

"San Jose is rather desolate looking to say the least, but we have learned our lesson—that is, that we must put up steel buildings, and have an adequate fire department. By the way, the big fire here started before the earthquake. People living near the scene were tossed out of bed by the quake, and they saw the fire, which had already made its way through a store and a two-story apartment house above it.

"Brick buildings will have to be replaced in a number of instances. A seven-story steel frame building is going up, and it is as straight as the day it was begun. On our block three people were killed, but we escaped.

"Lots of ridiculous things have happened along with the horrible. A lady rushed to her door in the Vendome, and next to her was an elderly Eastern couple. He jumped up and exclaimed: 'Mary, you just stay here, while I go down and see what in the thunder those fools are doing downstairs.' He had never felt an earthquake before.

"The new high school building was so badly wrecked that it had to be torn down. The normal school is condemned also, and we are all in the training school—both the 450 normal girls and boys, and the 400 grammar school pupils. Most of the classes are held out of doors under the trees. We enjoy this more than being in the school house.

"But San Jose will some day be again as beautiful as it was before, and if an earthquake should come, we will be so stout it won't matter."

Aurora, Or., May 17.—A musical and literary entertainment is being gotten up here by local talent for the benefit of the San Francisco sufferers. The chief promoter of the affair is James Miller, son of the local S. P. Agent here, who was in San Francisco at the time of the disaster.

Cherries are ripening fast in this section, and all kinds of fruit is way ahead of former years. The severe cold snap of two days in March had no appreciable effect on any of the fruit trees in Northern Marion county.

While here last week Secretary Dalrymple, of the Marion county Democratic central committee, made arrangements to have Governor Chamberlain speak one night the week preceding election. Chamberlain's publicity, showing how he has saved money for the taxpayers, has appealed to the farmers and ranchers, and created a favorable sentiment for him. A. H. Will and Mail Carrier Jake Kauffman, in a few hours the fore part of the week, caught 1020 large crawfish within two miles of the city. This is the record catch in this section. This season the crawfish are very plentiful, and every day a catch of 200 or upward is being made. For several years crawfish in Mill creek and Pudding river have been scarce, but this season they bite on anything, and fill the traps in a short time.

H. H. Palmer, our newspaper man, was out for bass the other evening, and had his usual good luck.

Hops in this section of the valley, the banner hop raising district of Oregon, are much further advanced this year than in former seasons. There is a large acreage, and all the yards are showing well. So far very few contracts for future delivery have been made, the growers all expressing a readiness to take their chances on the prevailing market prices when the crop is harvested.

Much rain has fallen in this section since Sunday, and the result is that all the growers have been benefited thousands of dollars. A high wind Monday and Tuesday did some damage to the hop vines that had not been trained on the overhead wires.
