General Hop Report.

Little if anything new has developed the past week in the hop market, trading generally having ruled quiet, the absence of stock to work upon having been the principal cause. About the only offerings on the local market consist of low grade California hops, which are held at 11@12c, and an occasional lot of Oregon at 14@15c. We hear of one lot of very poor Oregon hops having sold at 13 1/2c. On the Pacific coast there has been some business reported from Sonoma of low grades at around 10c, and a sale of Sacramento hops is also reported at 7 1/2c. No business has been reported in Oregon or Washington, as available stocks in those states are very limited. The little inquiry shown in this state last week appears to have subsided, and we do not hear of any new business the past few days.

Hop Conditions in England.

(Kentish Observer, April 26.)

Messrs. Wild, Neams & Co., London, report: There is no alteration to report; trade continues without animation; values remain unaltered.

Messrs. W. H. and H. LeMay, London, report: The market has opened after the holidays with some enquiry for good copper hops, stocks of which are small.

Messrs. Manager & Henley, London, report: There is a steady enquiry for useful copper hops with a moderate business doing, chiefly for actual requirements. Prices remain without change.

The Exchange and Hop Warehouses, Limited, London, report: There is very little business passing at present, but the demand is expected to increase shortly for the best of the hops left upon the market. Present sales are chiefly for middle class hops for immediate use at low prices.

Worcester Hop Market.

Since the holidays trade has been limited to minor transactions for immediate consumption, and only 11 pockets passed the public scales last week. Stocks in first hands are now reduced to very narrow limits, and there is consequently no disposition to force sales in the present state of the market.—J. H. Meredith & Co.

Notes.

Cooperstown Journal, May 3d, says: In the local market during the past week, transactions include sales of 200 to 300 bales from 6 to 10c, the ruling price being 8 to 10c. One dealer reports 12c as having been paid. Growers are complaining considerable about winter-killed hills this spring, yet it is said it is a little too early to make safe prediction as to the extent of the injury the vine has sustained during the winter.

The Cobblekill Index, May 3d, says: The local market is dull, growers refusing to sell at present prices. We hear of 10 cents being offered and refused. Two causes for the firmer market are given: First, the destruction of large quantities of hops at San Francisco, as previously noted; second, the reports that many roots, particularly in the older yards, are winter-killed. Some large growers report the winter loss in some yards as being 50 to 75 per cent.

The Schoharie Republican, May 3d, says: Growers are pushing along work in the yards, plowing and grubbing being now under way. The roots are in good condition as a rule. Owing to the low prices there is no new acreage set out, although here and there a new yard set last year will come into bearing this season. To offset this increase there are occasional yards being plowed up.

Experiment in Municipal Ownership.

Houston, Tex., May 17.—An election is being held here today to decide whether or not the city shall buy the present plant of the Houston Waterworks company, which has been offered the city for \$900,700. Of this sum \$434,700 must be paid in cash and \$467,000 must be assumed of the outstanding bonds of the waterworks company. If today's election should result in favor of this proposition, another election will have to be held to determine whether or not the city shall lease bonds to cover the amount necessary to acquire the waterworks plant. It is planned to have the second election soon after the first, in case the second election should become necessary. In that case it will probably be held within 60 days. Mayor Rice as well as the commissioners favor the plan and are of the opinion that it would be much better to purchase the plant of the present waterworks company than to establish a new municipal plant. The citizens are divided on the proposition of municipal ownership of the waterworks and the result of the election is awaited with considerable interest.

End of a Checkered Life.

Vienna, May 17.—Since the death a few days ago in this city of Herr Otto some highly interesting facts have come to light, which show that the deceased had lived a remarkably checkered life. Once a poorly paid book-keeper's clerk, he was induced, against his principles, to invest in a lottery ticket at the instance of his landlady, who assured him that she had dreamed so vividly of a certain number that it was bound to win. And, true enough, the number drew a prize of considerable magnitude. With his winnings Herr Otto bought some premium bonds one of which gained the following year another big prize. He was now a comparatively well to do man, yet contrived to live in his old bare room, for which he voluntarily paid double rent.

About three years afterwards, Herr

Otto was persuaded to sink most of his capital in an invention which started with every promise, but another, cheaper invention followed almost immediately in its wake. The business came to grief and Herr Otto was ruined. Again the fickle jade smiled upon him. He invented himself a small but useful machine which brought him a large revenue. Once more he risked his capital in a venture, but it failed also, and for years he lived in great poverty. One day, when writing his reminiscences, he came across an old, forgotten premium bond. The next day he offered it for sale to a broker, who informed him that the number had come out two years ago with a prize of \$50,000. So, after all, Herr Otto, who had reached a great age, was saved from the poor house. He died a bachelor and left his entire fortune to his landlady.
