SURVEY
SALEM TO
EUGENE

Cutting Out the Pattern for
the New Electric Road to
Southern Neighbor

Surveyors of the Oregon Electric Railway company came down from Portland and commenced the survey of the long contemplated railway line from Salem to Eugene. At the same time, work on the bridge at Wilsonville, or Boone's Ferry, was started. From this on work will be continued until the line is completed all the way from Portland to this city and it is probable that the line will be built on to Roseburg. The company has enough steel rail purchased to complete the road from Portland to Salem, 2000 tons of which are already enroute from the east. Orders will be immediately placed for enough steel to bring the line to Eugene and operations will be commenced on the Salem-Eugene stretch as soon as the survey is completed and adopted.

Messrs. W. W. Montgomery, L. J. Morris, G. L. Mayer and S. D. Sinkler have arrived from Philadelphia, while Mr. I. W. Anderson of Walla Walla and A. Welch of Salem are also here. The gentlemen from Philadelphia are among those heavily interested in the Oregon Electric Railway company, and they are here for the purpose of looking over the local territory, particularly that section through which the proposed line from here to Springfield will traverse. This line will be built just as soon as the franchise is granted and the material can be brought here for the work. These gentlemen are well pleased with the outlook for railroad business in Oregon, especially as regards the possibilities in the Willamette valley.—Eugene Register.

Importance of the Triple Con-
vention to Be Held at
North Bend

The Marshfield Coast Mail of May 15 has an able editorial on the importance of Coos Bay to the Willamette valley. It says:

The triple meeting at North Bend on the 23rd and 24th of this month will furnish a rare opportunity for the people of Coos Bay and Coos county to get in touch with the people of the interior of the state, the Willamette, Umpqua and Rogue river valleys, eastern and southeastern Oregon. As a matter of fact, those sections, if they only knew it, are vitally interested in the development of the seaport of Coos Bay, and the building of a system of railroads radiating from this point. Such a system, with a very little more assistance in getting, will make them entirely independent of the money lending, cent per cent pawnshop near the mouth of the Willamette.

At one time the residents of the Willamette valley had great hopes that the railroad to Yaquina Bay would emancipate them and for a few months they did feel the benefit of an outlet and inlet dependent of Portland, the Columbia river and the Southern Pacific railroad. Thousands of tons of wheat found its way out, and thousands of tons of miscellaneous freight found its way in.

way in through that gateway. Then mysterious things happened, and the Yaquina railroad has since been used only for the transportation of summer vacationists between the valley and the seashore. In the meantime, it has become well understood that Yaquina bay can never become a seaport accessible to deep draught vessels; that the government will never blast a ship channel through the miles of rocky ledges that guard the entrance to that inlet, in which, by the way, the diminutive General Wright could not turn around without a line to the dock.

Now let the great valleys of Oregon understand that all that was once hoped for in the case of Yaquina is easily obtainable at Coos Bay; that a very reasonable appropriation from the government will make of Coos Bay a harbor accessible to the largest ships that float; that strictly within the lines of most conservative truth, Coos Bay can easily be made a better and incomparably more accessible harbor than the Columbia river can ever be. Let them be shown that when the whole influence of the state of Oregon is expended in getting the largest possible appropriation for the Columbia river a gigantic mistake is being made. Let them be convinced that the interests of every part of Oregon except the northwest corner lies with the development of Coos Bay.

If Portland be well represented at the coming meeting, let us give her delegations a warm welcome—and do our best to disabuse their minds of the idea that the crying need of Coos Bay, without which we are slowly sinking in the Slough of Despond, is that sort of closer relations contemplated in their dream of selling us their goods, but buying none of ours.

In short, let us meet these delegates from the interior of the state in a spirit of manly self-reliance and full confidence that we have more to offer than we ask in exchange.

Prof. Petrie's Discoveries.

Boston, May 18.—The Rev. Dr. William Copley Winslow, a noted archaeologist of this city, has received an extensive communication from Prof. Flinders Petrie, the well known Egyptologist, containing some highly interesting details of his recent discoveries near Cairo, Egypt. According to the state-

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ments of Prof. Petrie he has discovered the remains of the temple of Onias at Tel-El-Yahu-dieh, eighteen miles north of Cairo, and he has brought to light evidences of the presence of Hyksos, or shepherd kings, in the Delta, thereby solving an interesting puzzle on this point. Prof. Petrie also states that he has, in all probability, identified the treasure city of Rameses, built by the Israelites in bondage thousands of years before the time of Christ. The construction of the city is referred to in the first chapter of the Book of Exodus.

The mounds of Tel-El-Yahu-dieh were visited and described in 1825 by Lieutenant, the French engineer and explorer. Subsequently Greville Chester, Hayter Lewis, Brugsch Bay and others examine or excavated the site. In 1887, for the Egypt exploration fund, Prof. Naville made determined efforts to disclose the secrets of the mounds, but did not succeed.

Prof. Petrie, in his communication to Dr. Winslow, says: "Our discovery of the actual town and temple of Onias is beyond a doubt. It is a very clear case of all the requirements being satisfied as to date, place, conditions and buildings. Besides the temple site and city, we have a remarkable historical subject here in clearing the Hyksos cemetery and the great fort of the Hyksos. The tombs contain remains of the Hyksos, and we have got at this place remains of Khyam, Apepi II., and Shkhanra, who were probably all Hyksos."
