

WOMEN WORKING FOR CAUSE

Making a Strong Campaign, and Opposition Making a Quiet Determined Fight

By omitting the word "male," and adding these: "It is expressly provided hereby that no one shall be denied the right to vote on account of sex," the pro-woman suffragists hope to amend the Constitution of Oregon extending the right to vote to all women over the age of 21 years. The proposed amendment has second place on the legislative division of the ballot to be voted on in June, and is one of the first that will catch the voter's eye.

The measure, if carried, will also purge the Constitution of the relics of the ante-bellum days, by striking out the phrase, "Every white male citizen," which, in the days when the Constitution was adopted, excluded the negro from suffrage.

Of all amendments pending before the people the woman suffrage measure is attracting the most attention, and speculation is rife as to the issue. Those back of the measure are making a hot campaign from the woman's suffrage headquarters in the Stearns building, on funds supplied, in good measure, by the National Woman's Suffrage Association.

The enemies of the amendment are working entirely, and hope to enlist the opposition largely of the business interests of the state. The foes of local option are also opposed to the bill. Following is the full text of the proposed amendment:

Section 2, of Article II, of the Constitution of the State of Oregon, shall be and hereby is amended to read as follows:

Section 2. In all elections not otherwise provided for by this constitution every citizen of the United States, of the age of 21 years and upward, who shall have resided in the state during the six months immediately preceding such election, and every person of foreign birth of the age of 21 years and upward who shall have resided in this state during the six months immediately preceding such election, and shall have declared his intention to become a citizen of the United States one year preceding such election, conformably to the laws of the United States on the subject of naturalization, shall be entitled to vote at all elections authorized by law; it is expressly provided hereby that no one shall be denied the right to vote on account of sex. Additional qualifications of registration and precinct residence may be required by law.

CORVALLIS WINS SUIT.

By the Middle of June, It Is Expected, Rock Creek Will Feed City Mains.

The city of Corvallis won its case in the suit brought by a sawmill owner to restrain the taking of water from Rock Creek for the municipal water system, now nearly completed. The case was before Judge Harris in the circuit court, and was argued at Eugene last Saturday.

The court refused to issue an order of temporary injunction, and dismissed the motion therefor "without prejudice to plaintiffs to make another application for a preliminary order of injunction in case the defendants should fail diligently to acquire whatever rights the plaintiffs may have in the waters of Rock Creek, sought to be condemned and appropriated by the city of Corvallis for its water system."

The decision gives immense satisfaction in Corvallis, as it opens the way to the final steps in the completion of the new water system, which is expected.

Hearst's First Blast for Moyer and Haywood
(New York Evening Journal, March 24.)

Every citizen in the United States is interested in the case of Moyer and Haywood, now "on trial" in the state of Idaho—a case fully dealt with in our news columns today.

These two men are labor leaders of the highest standing of recognized character and integrity.

They have been practically kidnapped out of the state of Colorado into Idaho, and they are to be tried for their lives on the sworn "confession" of an alleged accomplice and a confessed murderer named Orchard.

The accusation against the men grows out of the troubles between the miners and mine owners that have disturbed Colorado and, to a lesser degree, Idaho, for some time past.

The details of this long struggle would fill all the pages of this newspaper many times over.

These details will be discussed editorially and in the news columns as this case of national interest progresses.

Suffice it now to say that the cause of the trouble was the failure of the state legislature to pass a law demanded by popular vote and making mandatory a constitutional amendment in favor of the eight-hour law.

Barefaced violation of law and impertinent insult to the will of the people expressed at the ballot box on the part of the mine owners and their servile legislators were at the bottom of the trouble.

Upon this anarchistic overthrow of popular government there followed strikes and violence.

In all cases where proof was forthcoming it was shown that the violence and murder originated with the hired thugs and detectives of the Mine Owners' association. It is a long and shameful story of piratical capital seeking to rule, regardless of the popular vote. Carroll D. Wright, the President's representative, and certainly not prejudiced on the labor side, reveals amazing criminal action on the part of the mine owners. (See pages 189 and 190 of the United States government report on "Labor Troubles in Colorado," by Carroll D. Wright.)

As a climax comes this Moyer-Haywood case, which we invite the public to consider today.

It is a case of national importance. It affects the welfare and safety of every man in this land.

It is believed, by those best informed, to represent the effort of criminally organized capital to hang two or three men under the cloak of prostituted law, in order to frighten union men out of the mining districts.

We present today the first news dispatch that our special correspondent, Mr. Driscoll, sends for publication.

We find from his investigation: First—That the general opinion of the west declares the innocence of the accused men.

Second—That the governor of Idaho, into whose power the labor leaders were brought by special train paid for by railroads, positively announces his belief in the accused men's guilt in advance of any trial.

This governor knows absolutely nothing about the facts, except that corporations that make such governors as he want the men convicted and hanged.

He professes to accept against honorable men, trusted heads of great unions, the alleged "confession" of a miserable creature who is probably a paid agent of the mine owners, and who accuses himself of thirty murders, while accusing men of high reputation of a shameful crime.

In the meantime the prisoners are being visited daily in their cell by detectives in the hope of securing a confession. At the same time Moyer is ordered to have a physician attend him.
