BURIED PLUNDER IN COLORADO

Treasure is Unearthed in Old Shaft by Some Prospectors

Fairplay (Colo.) special to Denver Post: Buried plunder aggregating in value \$18,000 was uncovered by two prospectors, Sullivan Davis and Holmes Robbins, in an abandoned shaft about three miles from town on the Horseshoe road. The treasure is for the most part in gold-dust, although some is paper money.

The discoverers were very reticent about their find and have little to say concerning their good fortune. They had been employed in a mine at Horseshoe, but had obtained a copy of a map purporting to show where the treasure was hidden in some manner and at once commenced the search for it. Six weeks of ceaseless work was finally rewarded by success. A hole was found that answered the description and two days later, after removing the snow, ice and debris, three large cans were uncovered that contained the gold.

The men kept their find a secret for a while, but their finances were very low and the necessity for obtaining funds at once led them to attempt to pass some of the paper money. A local merchant, L. Cohen, supposed it to be counterfeit and threatened prosecution, and the men exhibited their find and freed themselves from suspicion.

The treasure was undoubtedly buried by the Reynolds gang of outlaws, a gang of bushwhacking confederates that infested this country in the fall of 1863. A succession of robberies culminated in the holdup of a stage coach at Elkhorn ranch, near what is now the town of Como. The indignant residents rose up in protest and organized two posses to run them down. The outlaws, eleven in number, were headed off at the head of Geneva gulch and a battle ensued, during the progress of which all but two of the robbers were killed or captured.

The two who escaped were Jim Bunnell and Jim Reynolds, the leader of the gang. Reynolds died soon after. Bunnell fled in this direction and is supposed to have cached the treasure. Afraid to come back to the scene of his crime he drew a map of the locality where the treasure was hidden from memory and sent it to Hank Seymour, a cousin of his who lived at Fairplay.

Seymour was unable to find the shaft where the dust was buried, but a copy of the map led to its discovery, thus substantiating the story told by Detective Dave Cook of Denver in his "Hands Up," a narrative of early day outlawry which he had a hand in suppressing. Reynolds hid his share of the money, some \$22,000, between Geneva gulch and Deer creek, for which locality Messrs. Davis and Robbins have started. They have strong hopes of finding the balance of the treasure. The Deer creek treasure is, according to Dave Cook's story, buried under the edge of a peculiarly shaped rock, which is pointed out by a knife blade broken off in a tree. Many searched for this, but a forest fire swept that country soon after the breaking up of the marauders and the fact of the country has been changed beyond recognition, all the landmarks being obliterated.

MARK TWAIN'S BUSY WINTER.

A Cold Prevented Him From Taking Part in the May Day Moving.

This being moving day, Mark Twain had arranged to move. But a cold, which increased his tendency to bronchitis, caused his family to insist on his keeping to his house and room. He will not take part, therefore, in New York's special way of celebrating May day.

By Saturday he hopes to be able to start with his family for Dublin, N. H. where he has again taken a house for the summer. There he plans to work two hours a day and do what he pleases with the others.

"I shall dictate two hours a day on my autobiography," he told callers, through his secretary, "and that autobiography is the only work I expect to do for the rest of my life."

His busy winter began in November by planning a third party to overthrow all bosses. Then he denounced King Leopold for the Congo cruelties; got out his book on "Editorial Wild Out"; was entertained by the president at the White house; went through a dinner in honor of his birthday and made a speech on "How to Be Seventy."

With Sarah Bernhardt he gave help at the meeting to aid Hebrew sufferers from the disturbances in Russia; received a crown of hay at the Mark Twain celebration of illustrators; addressed the Women's University club; sent a letter to the Russian reform meeting; was the guest of the Players' club; made a speech for Booker T. Washington's negro work; another for the blind; another for the Young Men's Christian association, and another in support of assistance to the distressed residents of San Francisco.

He was the most popular man in New York all winter, sought after as a power in all good causes, from correcting abuses in the Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals to agitating against modern slave trading in Africa.

"I had a busy winter," he said yesterday, "and I enjoyed it all."—New York Herald.

SHEPHERD WAS DEMENTED.

Why He Did Not Throw Up His Hands When Taken for Murderer.

A dispatch from Pendleton, Ore., May 18, says: No new developments have been added to the mystery surrounding the story of the burned car and man at Foster yesterday. Wm. Wilson the soldier who was in charge of the car, is now in the county jail here. The body of John Connelly, the demented shepherd, who was shot by mistake is at a local undertaking establishment awaiting the discovery of his relatives.

The stranger who escaped through the sagebrush the other side of Echo, and whose flight resulted in the death of Connelly, has not as yet been found by the officers, who are on his track, and who have hopes of soon finding him and bringing him to the county jail in Pendleton. Until this stranger has been found, or until Wilson is induced to talk, no one will know the real cause of the fire which cost the life of the unknown man, or who that man was. It may be that even then the information will be meager, as Wilson, at least, does not seem to be very anxious to talk or to tell the same story twice when he does.

It has been found that Connelly was a demented shepherd, and that he was not armed at the time of his death. His queer actions when accosted by the sheriff's posse are responsible for his having been shot. Connelly was in Pendleton for some time, and while there showed that he was mentally unbalanced. He told several people here that he had a brother in Salem named Thomas Connelly, and that he had been guard for President Roosevelt at the time he made his trip to the coast some years ago. Inquiry, however, both at Salem and at Portland, has failed to locate no brother.
