SALEM PUBLIC SCHOOLS.

The Salem Board of Education meets this evening to elect teachers for the coming year.

falcations, no jobs, frauds, or thieveries in Marion county since the county has been entirely in the hands of the Republicans.

The Marion county legislative ticket is composed of active business men, capable lawmakers, and public-spirited citizens. They are all men above the average in ability and capacity to do things.

Hon. Tom Kay and Dr. J. N. Smith for senators, for representatives Hon. Jesse Settlemyer, Hon. Jerome Simmons and Hon. Frank Davey have each seen service in the legislature, and could not have been nominated again had their records not been pretty fair.

Hon. J. Frank Miller for joint senator, is a fine business man. For representative Geo. F. Rodgers is a man of affairs, who has built up a large business. Lloyd Reynolds has seen extended service on the state board of horticulture and has demonstrated his ability as a progressive fruit grower.

These men have all been prominent and active in public affairs, in party, church and lodge, in every relation that tests manhood and citizenship. They are loyal and devoted Republicans.

Those who believe in the ascendancy of Republican principles, in the election of United States Senators by the direct vote of the people, in the policies of Roosevelt, and the government of the state and nation at the hands of the Republican party should vote the whole ticket.

MANHOOD SUFFRAGE.

While there is a campaign on to secure suffrage for women, let us consider WHAT IS THE STATUS OF SUFFRAGE FOR MEN IN THE STATE OF OREGON?

In the first place fees for the naturalization of foreigners are abnormally high. They are so high that very few persons of foreign birth or parentage go to the trouble or expense to renounce their allegiance to a foreign government. It is not desired to have their vote.

The operation of this system is creating constantly a larger number of non-voters, a class who take no part in elections, who are aliens to the whole political system under which they live. THE LAWS SHOULD MAKE IT EASY FOR SUCH CITIZENS TO BECOME VOTERS INSTEAD OF DIFFICULT.

Next comes a cumbersome and expensive and troublesome registration law, under which even the permanent resident landowner must be continually getting his name entered on the records at the county seat in order to vote. HE SIMPLY WILL NOT TAKE THE TROUBLE TO REGISTER. This registration law has operated to shut out many men, who formerly voted, from taking part in the elections. The provisions requiring production of citizenship papers to register works a hardship on thousands of good citizens who have lost or mislaid their papers. YOU MUST BELONG TO A 25 PER CENT PARTY TO GO TO A PRIMARY.

Many of the conscientious voters refuse to label themselves either Republicans or Democrats, and do not register and ACTING ON THE PRINCIPLE OF RESISTING AN UNJUST POLITICAL SYSTEM they neither register nor vote. The Oregon constitution and the Australian ballot law PUT FURTHER BARRIERS IN THE WAY OF MANHOOD SUFFRAGE. The provision requiring a man to register and vote in the precinct where he has his residence MULTIPLIES THE NON-VOTING CLASS.

The requirement of six free-holders to sign up for the unregistered voter is another invention inimical to manhood suffrage. It is open to abuse and further adds to the non-voters.

Each of these separate laws cuts off a different class of voters and operates to increase the stay-at-home vote. LAWS SO CONTRIVED CRIPPLE AND SHACKLE MANHOOD SUFFRAGE, ARE UNAMERICAN AND A DISGRACE TO OREGON.

Is it any wonder that with all these complicated restrictive legislative inventions, that about one-half the manhood suffrage in Oregon is suppressed, annihilated and obliterated?

It is ridiculous to ask a permanent resident land owner to go to the court house every election and register the fact that he is a voter. A resident land owner, who is a legal voter SHOULD NOT HAVE TO RECORD THE FACT OF HIS CITIZENSHIP MORE THAN ONCE, just as he records the deed to his land only once.

Why should there not be political apathy in Oregon, when so many obstacles are put in the way of manhood suffrage all along the route to the ballot box? The legislative nostrum vender will

not stop with the present doubly-expensive and shackled ball-and-chain Oregon boot ballot restricting scheme. They have tried to enact a property qualification and poll tax restrictions. Such a law was attempted to be enforced in Salem for a number of years but was finally knocked out in the supreme court.

WHY SHOULD ANY MAN BE KEPT FROM VOTING? WHAT ARE WE TRYING TO GIVE THE BALLOT TO WOMEN FOR, WHEN WE ARE TAKING IT AWAY FROM MEN?

Examination of the election returns since these complicated laws were enacted in Oregon will show that with increasing population there has been a constant decreasing number of voters. THESE LAWS HAVE DRIVEN ONE-FOURTH OR ONE-THIRD OF THE VOTERS FROM THE POLLS.

These legislative quacks, these politico-legal nostrum venders, these manhood suffrage suppressors, keep up their work of making it difficult to get the voters to express themselves, until they produce complete disgust of their inventions and cause a revolution. To hold a general election now costs \$60,000. Registration and the primary election costs as much more.

In Linn county the recent primary election cost over \$1.00 per voter. Elections have become more expensive than the legislature.

As manhood suffrage has been restricted the cost of elections has increased.

With abolition of conventions interest in elections has decreased. As interest decreases expense of elections increases.

DRAG THE ROADS MORE.

It is to be regretted that not more use is made of the split log drags in our county.

After a rain the split log drag will do more to smooth up a dirt road and let the water off it than any other contrivance. Two hundred split-log drags costing this county \$500, and used on the dirt roads intelligently, would do more to make them travelable than any other investment.

In a drive of 45 miles yesterday in this county, almost entirely over dirt roads, we were surprised not to encounter a single split log drag. We only saw two drags in the whole trip and they were lying by the roadside.

With all the talk about government roads, and convict-built roads, and state highways, and Tuttle law roads, let us not forget our common dirt roads.

This split log drag is a simple contraption but capable of producing great results.

It looks big to see five or six men up on a great road-scraper drawn by eight or ten horses. And some such work is beneficial. But it eats up money at a great rate. The split log drag used for half the money would accomplish more for the actual practical use of the roads—especially the common dirt roads.

Why not try it? Try it thoroughly. Try it everlastingly. Other counties are using the drag almost exclusively.

Lesson of the Late War.

London, May 19.—The British military authorities are seriously considering the suggestion of instructing the soldiers of the British army in the elements of "first aid to the injured." A strong appeal, based on the observations during the Russo-Japanese war, has been made, to bring about some much needed reform in the hospital service of the army and the plan has been warmly supported by many high medical authorities.

At the recent 35th congress of the German Association of Surgeons, held in Berlin, several interesting details were discussed relating to war surgery. It is generally recognized that modern conditions of war are rendering it more and more difficult for military surgeons to pursue their duties connected with first aid. It is said that the most efficient services rendered during the Manchurian campaign were those performed by means of field hospitals erected along the line of communication in the rear of the fighting lines. Reports laid before the congress by various authorities were unanimous in declaring that wounds

resulting from shells were usually fatal. On the conclusion of the various Manchurian actions it was not uncommon for one doctor to attend to 120 or more cases.

It is stated that 70 per cent of the soldiers wounded at Mukden had recovered and again resumed duty within three months of the action. This, of course, was owing to the comparatively hygienic effects of the unusually small projectiles used by the hostile armies. Dr. Schaefer, who obtained considerable experience in Manchuria, states that no less than 2000 wounded were treated in one field hospital, and only ten of these required to undergo operations. It appears to be unanimously agreed by medical authorities throughout the world that the system of first aid instruction now imparted to soldiers has been responsible for saving an enormous number of lives. Formerly many of the wounded were quietly permitted to bleed to death when even an elementary knowledge of anatomy and extemporized surgical appliances would have enabled their comrades to save them.
