Timbermen Coming.

A marked stimulus to the lumber industry of the northwest has been created by the San Francisco calamity, says the Telegram, and while it cannot be said that the prices of all grades of lumber have advanced, the price of lumber in the stump is going up steadily, and speculators from all parts of the country are contesting for its possession.

At present there are scores of timbermen in Portland and others are coming in daily. The price of timber, which has heretofore been considered high at a thousand feet in the stump, has risen within the past few days to \$1.50 and holders are not inclined to dispose of their interests even at that figure.

"There is great demand for lumber of all kinds in San Francisco," said Charles R. McCormick, of San Francisco, "but in the face of the disaster that has befallen our city and the consequent money shortage, by mutual consent, as it were, the lumbermen of the Pacific Coast have virtually agreed not to raise the price of their product, and we do not anticipate higher figures than now rule. The managers of the steamship lines, operating on the coast, at a recent meeting also agreed not to raise the shipping rates on lumber and building material, so the San Francisco sufferers will not be compelled to pay exorbitant prices."

"While the prices of lumber may not be raised by the lumbermen themselves," said Fred D. Smith, of Elmira, N. Y., who is in the market for Oregon timber, "the shortage may work out the end, as the demand will soon become so strong that buyers will begin bidding for material."

"So far as timber is concerned, we anticipate an increase in the price on stumpage, and properties will change hands rapidly within the next few weeks. The country at large, outside of California, looks to the northwest for the bulk of its future lumber supply, and this alone will in time bring about a great demand for timber."

The price of logs has been increased from \$8 to \$10 a thousand feet on the Columbia river within the week, and there is an immense profit in timber in the stump even at \$1.50 a thousand. Men familiar with the timber and lumber industry say that logs can be delivered into the Columbia river from the territory tapped from any of its tributaries, at about \$4 per thousand feet.

A Gusher.

A. T. Gruett, who visited what is known as Sulphur Springs, some twenty-five miles south of this city and in Lane, last Sunday, has quite an interesting report to make of the spring. It appears that many years ago there was a common pitcher pump pipe sunk into the spring and cemented there. For years the spring gave forth just enough water to flow out of the pipe freely. Since the disastrous earthquake at San Francisco the spring is no longer a "flower," but a "gusher."

It now spurts up some four or six inches above the top of the pipe and

has continued to do so ever since the morning of the big quake. The spring is located on the farm of Frank Williams and many people go there for their summer outing.—Corvallis Gazette.

TONOPAH AND TIDEWATER.

Railroad that will Tap New Bullfrog, Goldfield, Tonopah Bonanza Gold Section.

California's Death Valley and the new Tonopah, Goldfield and Bullfrog mining region of Nevada are on the eve of being introduced to the advantages of civilization by the Tonopah & Tidewater railroad.

This broad gauge, up-to-date railroad is being built from Ludlow, California, on the Santa Fe, through and past the Amargosa valley that lies just south of Death Valley on to Bullfrog in the heart of the new bonanza gold mining section of Nevada. As the plans and prospects indicate this road will be completed to Bullfrog by the first of July and will then be pushed on to Goldfield and Tonopah. Before the road reaches Bullfrog and the precious metal region it will tap the mammoth Lila C. borax mine in the Amargosa valley. This mine has had development work done on it for several years, which has disclosed a very large body of quartz bearing borax (colemanite) of high quality. This mine will supersede the Barate mine (near Daguerre, California) and help supply the constantly increasing borax demand. So far no shipments of ore have been made from this mine, but as soon as the railroad is complete, a large amount of borax will be at once rushed out.

The Tonopah & Tidewater railroad will at once relieve the Lila C. mine, tap all the mines in the Death Valley and Bullfrog vicinity and the extension to Goldfield and Tonopah will give the rest of this mining region a speedy and most economic outlet for its ores, and allow the country to obtain needed supplies at reasonable rates instead of at the almost prohibitive prices of the present.

In the old days they use 20-mule teams to transport the products of the region and to bring in supplies, but the greater demands and growing needs have made such transportation means totally inadequate. The invention of the 20-mule team solved the transportation problem of the early days and developed the region as far as such means could.

As those days demanded 20-mule teams, so today demands the Tonopah & Tidewater railroad to carry out copper, lead, borax, silver and gold. The entire effect of this new railroad on mining industries and the opening and developing of Death and Amargosa Valleys and the Bullfrog, Goldfield and Tonopah mining section is difficult to estimate; but it will not be small. It means a general and thorough development of this newest part of the United States, and will add materially to the prosperity of the whole country. The Great American Desert is doomed. Already towns are springing up and the region will become a big producer with the new transportation facility.
