Jefferson Statue for Washington.

Washington, D. C., May 19.—Arrangements have at last been made to obtain sculptors' designs for the statue of Thomas Jefferson which, by authority of congress, is to be erected in one of the public parks here. The commission charged with the work consists of Secretary Root and the chairman of the house and senate committees on library, and a report has been made to the house by Secretary Root that Augustus St. Gaudens has been obtained as sculptor, and that as soon as Mr. Gaudens' health permits a model will be prepared and submitted to congress. The delay has been due to the death of Secretary Hay, the former chairman of the commission. Haste will now be made to have the statue finished.

Authorization by congress of the expenditure of \$100,000 for a Jefferson statue is the result of long agitation by the admirers of the Monticello sage. The appropriation was provided for in the sundry civil appropriation act, approved April 28, 1904. Senators Bacon of Georgia and Daniel of Virginia, especially urged the appropriation. The argument was made that the government had never given proper recognition to Jefferson by a suitable memorial. A statue of Jefferson now stands in the rotunda of the capitol, but it was presented to the government by a private individual, Commodore Uriah P. Levy, who bought the Jefferson home at Monticello.

The statue was executed by David D'Angers, and is regarded as a masterpiece. It was placed at one time in the White House grounds, but was later removed to the capitol.

If he is desirous of leading a better life, it is a most trying ordeal for him. If he has little desire for a better life, the conditions sweep him back like a flood, into dishonesty, or further crime. A discharged convict needs first of all, an opportunity. How can he be given a chance in the face of the fact that society frowns on him, and that individuals have so little faith in him? Who will trust him, and help him to make a man of himself? a chance to prove to the world that he is a man? In some instances a discharged convict finds a benefactor, who helps him to steady employment, a friend who trust him, and by that confidence appeals successfully to the best within him, so that from the wreck of the past, he rises to nobility; genuine manhood.
