The Daniel Webster Won.

The judges of the debate at the university last evening proclaimed the speakers for the Websterian Literary society victors over the Philodorian, proved conclusively the negative of the representatives. The winners had question "that the United States should establish a system of merchant marine subsidies." The announcement of the decision was greeted with cheers and yells that were reminiscent of a football game. The affirmative was supported by H. L. Parcel, George B. Simpson, and Ronald C. Glover, of the Philodorian society while the negative was maintained by C. H. McKnight, John E. Reichen, and A. K. Carlson, of the Websterian society.

To the defenders of the old Philodorian literary society, it must have been an awful shock, to be taken in by Webster's flock. The judges were: John H. McNary, Peter D'Arcy, and George O. Goodall, all of this city.

Seth Pomeroy's 200th Birthday.

Northampton, Mass., May 19.—Seth Pomeroy Chapter of the Sons of the American Revolution is celebrating today the 200th anniversary of the birthday of the Revolutionary hero after whom the chapter is named. This is the second observance by the chapter of the birthdays of men of national fame who were citizens of Northampton. The first celebration was in the form of a prostration to the high school, with appropriate ceremonies, of a portrait of Governor Caleb Strong, whose birthday anniversary came soon after the organization of the chapter.

Gen. Seth Pomeroy was the first of an eminent trio from Northampton who followed each other closely as large figures on the stage of public action and were, in part, contemporaries. Caleb Strong was the third, and his marriage to Sarah Hooker, daughter of the Northampton minister, took place the year Gen. Pomeroy died. That was in 1777, when Caleb Strong was 32 years old. The middle member of this illustrious trio was Major Joseph Hawley. Gen. Pomeroy and Major Hawley were together in war, were together in the service of the state as members of the committee of correspondence and the provincial congress, and were two of three members of the committee which presented the case of the town in the final hearing of the profound religious controversy that resulted in the disavowal of Jonathan Edwards from the pastorate of the church at Northampton in 1750. In that year Caleb Strong was five years old, and when he became a young man he studied law in the office of Major Hawley. Making his start under the wise direction of that great leader, Caleb Strong, as member of the Continental Congress, as United States senator, and as governor of Massachusetts for 11 terms, carried the fame of Northampton well into the early part of the last century, dying in 1819.

The first ancestor of Gen. Seth Pomeroy in Northampton was Medad Pomeroy, a blacksmith, who was high in the esteem of the people, and was elected to many public offices. The

record of the early years of Gen. Pomeroy, who was born in 1706, is meager, but he appears to have followed the ancestral occupation of blacksmithing. He had some prominence in town affairs before he entered upon his military career, but the more complete record of his personal history begins with the year 1743, when he was 37 years old and was named captain of the Hampshire troops by a committee of three who had been appointed by the governor to suggest the names of officers for a Hampshire county company to be raised for service in King George's French and Indian war. This committee must have been of rare competence, for it chose for the county's military leader a man of essentially military quality, from whom the mother country was to receive distinguished service, and whose name was to stand high in the first records of the new nation.

Gen. Pomeroy's military record is a matter of history. Pomeroy advanced to the rank of major before the famous expedition against Louisburg in 1747 and became colonel during the fourth French and Indian war. When the Revolution broke out it found Pomeroy the commander of the Massachusetts troops with the rank of general. He took part in many important battles and fought with bravery in the Battle of Bunker Hill. After that battle Pomeroy was offered by Gen. Washington the rank of brigadier general, but was compelled by ill health to refuse. Two years later he was persuaded by Gen. Washington to re-enter the service but was unable to withstand the hardships of campaign life, and died of pleurisy at Peekskill, N. Y., February 17, 1777. His body lies at Peekskill, where a monument in his honor was erected a few years ago.
