A NEW O. R. & N. TRAIN.

Upper Columbia River Given Service That Is Appreciated.

The new local upper Columbia river train put on by the Oregon Railway & Navigation Company May 20th will do much toward attracting tourists to points along the river between Portland and The Dalles. The new train, leaving Portland, as it does, at 8:15 a. m., and arriving at Portland at 6 p. m. the same day, gives an opportunity to spend the day at some of the delightful places along the upper Columbia river, and permits them to return home the same day.

The train is made up of baggage car and coaches, and stops at all points in both directions so as to accommodate local travel as much as possible. The lightness of the train, however, permits it to run at a high rate of speed between stations, so that, even with the stops, good time is made.

There are many beautiful places along the river, such as Rooster Rock, Leavenworth, Multnomah Falls, Bonneville, at which a day's outing and picnic can be enjoyed to the uttermost, and this new service makes it possible to enjoy such outings, whereas, in the past, when the service has been performed by the heavy through trains, it has been impossible to do this.

On the Southern passengers, in waiting at Biggs, which is on the main line, are taken to The Dalles by the train, where they await the train for Portland, coming in on No. 1, as at present, or taking the local, as they may desire.

ODDFELLOWS MEET IN PORTLAND

Grand Lodge Session Begins Tonight With Rebekahs, Muscovites and Grand Encampment

Last night's Telegram says:

What promises to be the biggest session of Oddfellows ever held here begins in Portland tomorrow night at 8 o'clock, and adjourns Thursday night at—well, nobody knows what time it will adjourn, because the closing ceremonies come under the jurisdiction of the Muscovites, or the Nobles of the Mystic Shrine of Good Fellowship, who aren't very particular how late they sit up on occasions like this.

It will not only be the biggest session in point of numbers; it will also be unique. There will be plenty of excitement and amusement between the business sessions of the grand encampment and the grand lodge and the Muscovites to keep the delegates in good spirits and perfect humor, but this year they will not have the elaborate entertainments and costly excursions of former occasions. Nobody is better qualified to tell why than W. H. Hobson, grand master of the grand lodge.

"We just couldn't this year," he said, "when our brothers in San Francisco have lost everything they had. It would hardly seem right, and then again—we haven't the money."

"Oh, no, the Oddfellows aren't bankrupt, because they are members of the most prosperous order in this prosperous state of Oregon in the prosperous year of 1906. It's another reason altogether. We sent all the spare cash we had on hand for the aid of those in San Francisco."

"When the lodge members in Oregon heard how destitute those in California were, and how they had to stand in line for hours at a time just to get a little piece of bread, it touched them. They opened their treasuries and sent every available cent down there. They'd do it again under the same conditions. I don't remember how much we forwarded, but it was well up in the thousands, and it certainly helped down there. The consequence is, we can't very well entertain this year and have the expensive excursions we used to have."

A Quadruple Affair.

Four separate bodies will be represented in this convention, which is really a quadruple affair. They are the grand encampment, the grand lodge, the Rebekah assembly and the Muscovites. Tomorrow night the grand encampment, composed of the patriarchs of Oregon, will respond to the call of their grand patriarch, Claude Gatch, of Salem, and will initiate proceedings. They assemble in Artisan's hall, in the Abington building. The session of the grand encampment lasts but one night; then comes the grand lodge.

The grand lodge is really the first legislative body of Oddfellows in Oregon, and through it all business is transacted. This year the grand lodge has not many important things to attend to, so it will be in session only two nights, Wednesday and Thursday. One of the principal things it will do, however, will be to appropriate money for a big addition to the Oddfellows' home on East Thirty-second street, which is overcrowded.

There is not the slightest doubt that the grand lodge will appropriate \$10,000 for this annex. It plans to make the home known everywhere for the way it cares for old Oddfellows.

I. O. O. F. Delegates.

The delegates from Chemeketa lodge No. 1, I. O. F., who will attend the session of the grand lodge in Portland are: I. A. Manning, Amos Vass, A. M. Clough, Charles McNary and O. E. Fuller. The session of the grand lodge convenes tomorrow morning at 10 o'clock.

The Salem Rebekah lodge No. 1 has chosen Mrs. Duncan Ross and Mrs. Adair as its delegates.

Long Creek is to have an electric light plant.

Mrs. Mary Ramsey Wood, of Hillsboro, has celebrated her 119th birthday.

The Polk County Mill & Lumber Company has been organized with a capital stock of \$5000.

A. W. Roy, an O. R. & N. brakeman, was knocked from his train by a mail car at Wilbur, 30 miles east of Pendleton, Sunday night and was seriously hurt.

The O. R. & N. is pushing work on the oil storage tank at Heppner, and 50 men are employed. It is expected to be finished within a month or six weeks.

The Ward Lumber Company, of Forest Grove, will remove its large plant to Banks, Oregon, nine miles north of Portland. The new location is in a fine timber belt.

Harry Thompson, the 7-year-old son of the owner of Thompson falls, near Gearhart, was accidentally shot and killed Saturday by his older brother. They were shooting wild pigeons.

The school board of the Eugene high school made a ruling at their last meeting that will have the effect of practically doing away with all athletics in the school. The resolutions adopted say that they cannot compete with other teams outside of Eugene. Acts of incubination is the reason for this.
