Change in Street Car Schedule.
Effective Sunday, May 27, 1906.

The Citizens' Light & Traction Company announces the following change of schedule, for a number of reasons, the most important of which are:

First: A more frequent service or headway on lines running east, causing the Asylum line and Penitentiary line to alternate on parallel streets, and break time with the Yew Park line as well for a part of the distance.

Second: For the purpose of furnishing better power service to the cars.

Third: Because the new schedule tends to keep the cars more nearly on time.

Fourth: In order to provide definite and regular service after the arrival of the late train to the state institutions.
