THEY HAD EGGS

And They Did not Care Where They Distributed Them

Rev. Homer M. Street furnishes the Oregonian with an account of sundry personal experiences of his at and near Olex, Ore., as follows:

"On the night of May 22, the Rev. Homer M. Street, who has been charged with championing the cause of the saloonmen, met with some strong prohibition logic at Olex. It was the first prohibition logic he had run across that he was unable to handle. It was the logic of the Dark Ages; the logic of a people who do not believe in free speech or free press; the logic of a people who do not believe in the personal freedom of the citizens of a free republic to do as they please in regard to their own appetite and their own money; it was the logic of brute force—the only logic of prohibition. The prohibitionists of Olex showed their narrow-mindedness by refusing to hear both sides of a question of national interest. They awaited in ambush on the outside and treated the speaker to a fusillade of eggs. They pelted him on the way to the hotel, and the next morning the front of the Hotel Olex was yellow and besmeared with eggs. As Mr. Street labored with sponge and water a good portion of the night he had a smile of victory on his face. He here has positive proof of the truthfulness of his oft-repeated assertion that 'Prohibition is a revival of the spirit of intolerance of the church of the Dark Ages.' The women of Olex showed their unfitness for the right of suffrage by refusing to hear both sides of a question which confronts the voters of Oregon. There was not a woman at the lecture.

"Supposing that he was in no danger in daylight, Mr. Street made known his intention of walking across country to the railroad the next morning. When within about a mile and a half of Milkato, in a lonely spot, where there is not a house in sight for many miles around, he saw three men on horseback ahead of him, standing and watching him as though awaiting his arrival. Something in their appearance caused him to suspect that they meant evil and he looked for a rock. Presently he saw one about the size of a goose egg. Not wishing for them to see him pick it up, he dropped a parcel he was carrying and picked up both parcel and rock at the same time. The men had tied their horses and approached him. One of them carried a rope, and the leader, who had a knife in his hand, said: 'Tie him, boys, and I'll mutilate him. It will be a long time before he speaks against prohibition again.'

"As the man with the knife turned to see if the others were going to obey him, Mr. Street struck him a blow with the rock over his ear and in quick succession dealt the second man a similar blow. They both fell as though shot and the third man ran away. As they made no attempt to follow him, Mr. Street thinks they certainly must have only intended to frighten him; but they mistook the man. He knows that he is on the side of right, and cannot be frightened nor driven from his purpose."

STRAWBERRY SITUATION.

Light Crop Is Reported on Account of March Freeze.

The Hood River Glacier says that berries are coming in slowly, owing to the cool weather, and the demand far exceeds the supply. This has kept the market firm, and prices are expected to hold up well. Berries are still billed out at \$3.25, and only about 500 crates per day are coming in.

Reports are general of a light crop. The March freeze hurt all berries that had started to grow prior to the freeze, many reporting only half a crop. The White Salmon crop is hurt probably
