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UNJUST LAWS CANNOT STAND.

There is a general feeling that the so-called local option law, passed in Oregon two years ago, is unfair, as it is so constructed as to force prohibition upon localities that do not want it, and there is a disposition, even among the conservative temperance people, that it should be righted. The law claims to be local option, but no locality is allowed to place itself on record except one way, i. e., in favor of prohibition. A wet precinct can be made dry by two dry ones, but a wet precinct cannot be made wet by two wet ones. The latter would be unfair and unjust, and, of course, the former is fully as unreasonable. It is a case of allowing two to annihilate one, and that is wrong in principle. Laws of this class may pass and work for a time, but anything that is unjust will in time be doomed. The American people will not stand for it.

A STRONG CAMPAIGN.

Reports come from every quarter that Dr. Withycombe, as a candidate for governor, is going ahead of all expectations. He is proving a good campaigner, and he seems to know state history to such an extent that he is equal to every occasion. He is keeping the campaign free from personalities, but does not fail to marshal his facts and issues in such a manner as to put to the blush all attempts of the opposition to make inroads. Dr. Withycombe's speeches are dignified and full of meat. They carry conviction, and even many Democrats volunteer support. The opposition has weakened from the start, and the admission is now freely made that there is no hope for the re-election of Governor Chamberlain.

The Cowardly Assassin.

(Oregonian.) A man's political character is a proper subject of discussion; and so is his private character, if he aspires to public place. But it is cowardly, despicable and infamous to make anonymous attacks; the more so, of course, if they are malicious and false, as are the attacks on Jonathan Bourne, printed and circulated by thousands, in the hope of defeating him for the United States senate.

Who are the cowardly assassins and assassins, who do this work and shield themselves under anonymity? Evidently they are persons who have money to back their malignity, on the one hand, and their selfish desire to open the senatorship to purchase, on the other. Circulars by tens of thousands cannot be printed and sent through the mails without money, and a good deal of it. What plutocrat, or group of plutocrats, is "putting up" for these anonymous defamations? They probably yet will be discovered, and branded with the infamy they deserve.

No creature is so despicable as he who uses the assassin's weapon of anonymous attack. Criticism of the political career of Jonathan Bourne, or of any other public man, is allowable, if done openly and decently; but even this should never be done by those who work in secrecy and concealment, afraid to avow themselves. Attacks on the personal and private character of public men by a malignant cowardice that conceals its own personality and utters calumnies from under cover, should be treated always with the contempt that such despicable work deserves. To an anonymous circular no right-minded person can pay any attention whatever; and if calumnious the work can only excite loathing towards those guilty of it.

Taking some of these libelous circulars to the investigating committee of the Municipal Association of Portland. Mr. Bourne requested an inquiry into the charges they contain. Several persons, believed to be the authors or promoters of the accusations, were called to come and testify, but all of them refused or declined. The committee had no power to compel the attendance of witnesses, and the enemies who are known to be among those who carry the dagger of libel and slander in the sheath of anonymity refused to appear. Cowardly scoundrels, always, are those who pursue the work of secret defamation. But as some of these men are known, they yet will probably have the advantage, in spite of all their efforts to secrecy, to tell in open court what they pretend to know.

To oppose a man in politics is one thing; to defame his personal character is another,—especially if it is done under the cover of a cowardly and malignant anonymity. Nothing that affects the character of men should be published anonymously. Fortunately human nature is so constituted that such publications usually defeat the purpose of those who utter them.

The Oregonian has opposed Mr. Bourne on many occasions heretofore. In former years, when the money question was supreme, it differed from him most widely. That was ten years ago, and it is past. The Oregonian never questioned the honesty of his motives, and it gave him credit for the courage of his convictions. That was more than it could say for many or most of the conspicuous men of the Republican party who were then juggling with the money question. That contention, however, belongs to the past. It never will be renewed. No more forever will the gold standard be questioned. Mr. Bourne was no more in error on the money question, and far more honest, than a large majority of the active Republican politicians of Oregon, among whom are those who are now making on him these cowardly attacks from ambush, in the hope of advantage to themselves through party disorganization.
