Straight Marquis of Queensberry rules are to govern the go, which means that the principals are to fight out of clinches, necessarily protecting themselves at all times. Tim Hurst will be the referee, and has been engaged to separate the contestants should they refuse to break.

Lovers of boxing are looking forward to the fight with a great deal of interest, as it is an open question whether Terry McGovern will be able to fight in any semblance of his old form. He has not been taking very good care of himself lately, while Britt has not deteriorated except by lack of practice. It is admitted that the Californian is the cleverest lightweight in the ring today, as far as boxing is concerned. He made Battling Nelson look like a novice, when they fought, simply by means of his wonderful foot work and remarkable ability to land and get away. But the Dane was able to stand his punches and Britt found it hard, that dreaded left of Nelson's from landing in 20 rounds. Nelson had one chance and seized it, and therein lies the tale. Britt is a clever boxer, but so was McGovern. His friends say that he is still a good man, but very few are confident enough to expect Terry to defeat Nelson in ten rounds.
