General Hop Report.

Waterville Market: We fail yet to learn that the recent hard freeze damaged the growing hop vine to any extent. Some growers even report that the cold weather was a good thing to check the rapid growth, as the vine was getting ahead of the tyers. The newest and best conditioned yards are certainly doing well but some others show the vine as very uneven and not at all promising. In this part of the hop growing region we do not learn that there are many yards in the killed-out condition reported in other sections.

New York market, N. Y. Journal and Bulletin, May 25: There appears to be an easier local market for hops owing principally to a lack of demand, but the stock in first hands is the lightest in years, and with an active market for beer the outlook for higher prices for hops is considered good. At the moment spot quotations are slightly lower, as noted below, but brewers would be unable to buy below the outside quotations. Advances from the coast are few and far between and indicate an easier tendency. The upstate markets are slow. News from abroad indicates backward conditions in England, while the continental crops are progressing favorably.

Waterville Hop Review: Few if any new features have developed on the local market the past week, as practically no business has been transacted. Holders of stock show more disposition to sell, but concession in price would have to be made to move any good. There is certainly a weak undertone to the market and selling prices are off about 2c per pound from the high level of a fortnight ago. Offerings, however, are very limited as stocks in growers' hands are very low. On the Pacific coast choice remaining lots can be bought today at 11c, with no transactions reported. Upstate markets are also weaker on account of absence of demand. Reports are still coming in of winter killed yards, but the damage seems to be confined to the old yards as new yards are reported in excellent condition. Reports from the Pacific coast continue to report the growing crop as presenting a fine appearance. English and continental advices still report the crops backward caused by unreasonable weather.

SWALLOWED A DIAMOND.

Omaha Jeweler Must Become Shylock to Recover Diamond.

Omaha, May 31.—Like Shylock, and his pound of flesh, Tinley L. Coombs has been placed by the courts in the dilemma of not being able to claim his property awarded by the judge, except at the risk of killing a woman. In this instance the pound of flesh is a \$300 diamond in the appendix of a self-confessed shop lifter.

Mae Thomas swallowed the diamond Saturday in the retail store of T. L. Coombs & Co., jewelers. From a tray of diamonds on the counter the woman removed the handsome stone and concealed it in her mouth. To avoid being found with the diamond on her person when searched, she swallowed it. Fearful appendicitis, the Thomas woman confessed this to the police, who confirmed the story by taking an X-ray photograph.

"The diamond is yours," said the police judge to the jeweler yesterday. "Take it, but if you resort to a surgical operation against the prisoner's will, and she dies, you can be held for murder."

Surgeons say the diamond cannot be removed without an operation, as the X-ray showed it to be lodged. About the only chance Coombs has of recovering it is that the Thomas woman will develop an attack of appendicitis. Symptoms have already been noted.

Stayton Is Booming.

E. D. Alexander, editor of the Stayton Mail, and W. L. Freres were in the city yesterday afternoon, renewing acquaintances. Mr. Alexander states that the little town of Stayton is experiencing unusual prosperity. "The woolen mills are expecting their new machinery, and within 60 days it is probable that it will be installed. We have several buildings and residences in course of construction, and with more in view. A. D. Gardner has recently purchased 1000 cords of balm wood, and will soon begin the erection of an excelsior plant. The Lee Brown & Son sawmill is running at full blast. In fact the town is moving ahead," said he. Editor Alexander is an enthusiastic booster for the town of his adoption, and is a genial gentleman.

The Railroad's Big Stick.

In "The Way of a Railroad with a Town" in the June McClure's, Mr. Ray Stannard Baker shows how a common carrier holds up an entire section of country and says whether this industry or that shall prosper, or whether this class or the other shall be utterly driven out of business. Mr. Baker spent a long time studying his material for this article in Danville, Virginia, which is tapped by only one railroad, the Southern, and which on this account is quite at the mercy of

the rate-makers. A comparison is forcefully drawn between the conditions here and those in the city of Lynchburg, 66 miles away, which has plenty of railroad competition. Mr. Baker states facts which, which unless backed up by statistics, might well arouse incredulity. For instance, fertilizer is shipped from Chicago to Danville at \$5.80 a ton, whereas if it went 66 miles further to Lynchburg, the rate would be only \$4.40. Horses shipped from the West can be delivered at Richmond, 141 miles further, at so much less freight than Danville shippers have been known to book their stock all the way through, and then remove it by stealth from the cars as they stood in the Danville freight yard. The tragedy of all this lies in the fact that Danville has contributed hundreds of thousands of dollars to railroad companies for competition, and is still paying interest on part of this money. Mr. Baker tells how tobacco-growers are barely able to struggle along, while certain favored exporters are given rates which are like finding money. The story of the contest between the railroad and the anti-railroad parties in the town is of absorbing interest. Every one who wants to understand the big stick powers of the railroad should read this sane and forcible article.

Favor National Arbitration.

Mohonk Lake, N. Y., May 30.—The Lake Mohonk conference on international arbitration opened its twelfth annual meeting here today. Ex-Assistant Secretary of State John W. Foster, who had also been the president of the eighth and ninth conferences, opened the conference, and will preside over its meetings.
