THE FILTHY POOL OF POLITICS

No Place for Women to Take a Plunge or Anything Else

Advocates of woman suffrage maintain that women, if given the ballot, will purify politics and enact laws that will regulate the saloon and the gambling house and be instrumental, when allied with the better element of men, in enacting laws that will make of "this state a glorious dwelling place."

To ascertain the workings of any plan or proposition, we must turn to states where such plan or proposition has been in operation, and has had a chance to prove its worth. The state of Wyoming was the first to adopt woman suffrage, which it did in 1869, 37 years ago. What has been the result after all these years? The political conditions are as bad almost as they are in Colorado. Every town in the state sports gambling houses, saloons and brothels, operated "wide open." Cheyenne, the capital, a city of 12,000 inhabitants, has 25 gambling halls and more saloons than stores. It does seem, that if there was any foundation for the claims of the suffragists that in the length of time Wyoming has been blessed(?) with woman suffrage, that they would have made some impression upon foul conditions that actually exist there. These conditions have, on the other hand, been gradually growing worse as the years roll by.

The same conditions exist in the other suffrage states, Colorado, Utah and Idaho, to a more or less extent. Each of these states has been afflicted with woman suffrage long enough to demonstrate that each is fast following in the footsteps of the other. In each there is no restriction placed upon the saloon, the gambling den or the brothel, but all flourish together. The same fine promises were made to the people of these states by the suffragists when the crusade for woman suffrage was made there, as the suffragists are

now making to the people of Oregon. Does any citizen of this state, whose all is invested here, whose home is here who is bringing up his sons and daughters here, want to see this state placed in the condition that the suffrage states are? If he does, now is the time for him to cast his ballot for woman suffrage. Women must either mix with the riff-raff of politics if they vote as their conscience dictates, or they must let others do their thinking for them. If the latter, then what good would suffrage be to them? It has been proven by time and experience that woman suffrage in theory and practice are diametrically opposed to each other. The suffragist theory has not and cannot be fulfilled. Human nature is the same all the world over. The good and the pure will not and cannot mix with the bad and the unclean. Experience has thus proven that the better woman element will not degrade herself by mixing with her less fortunate and fallen sister, but is glad to leave the stench of political life for the sanctity of her home and her family.

Sunday excursions to Newport on the C. & E. will begin June 10th or 17th, and run every Sunday thereafter, leaving Albany at 7:30 a. m., leave Corvallis at 8 a. m.

S. P. trains connect with the C. & E. at Albany and Corvallis for Yaquina and Newport. Trains on the C. & E. for Detroit will leave Albany at 7:30 a. m., enabling tourists to the Hot Springs to reach there the same day. Trains from and to Corvallis connect with all East Side trains on the S. P.

A BIG FIRE AT SCIO

Business Block Burned and Property Loss \$30,000

The city of Scio was the victim of a big fire Tuesday, which swept away the business portion of the city. The fire started in the confectionery store of Harrison Phillips, in the principal block of the city, destroying it. The stores of Edward C. Peery, Hibler, Gill & Co., office of Dr. A. G. Prill, the post-office, office of the Pacific States Telephone Co., all went down in the path of the flames. The fire attacked the bridge across Thomas creek, and this structure was somewhat damaged, but the flames there were soon under control. The Scio hotel, across the street from the burned block, and the planing mills, 200 yards away, also took fire, a high wind throwing the sparks a long distance. One man was severely hurt during the fire. J. H. Holland, a prominent farmer, was working on an awning in front of the hotel, when it suddenly gave way, throwing him to the ground and onto a pile of broken glass, cutting his legs terribly. The total loss of the fire is \$30,000, with very little insurance.

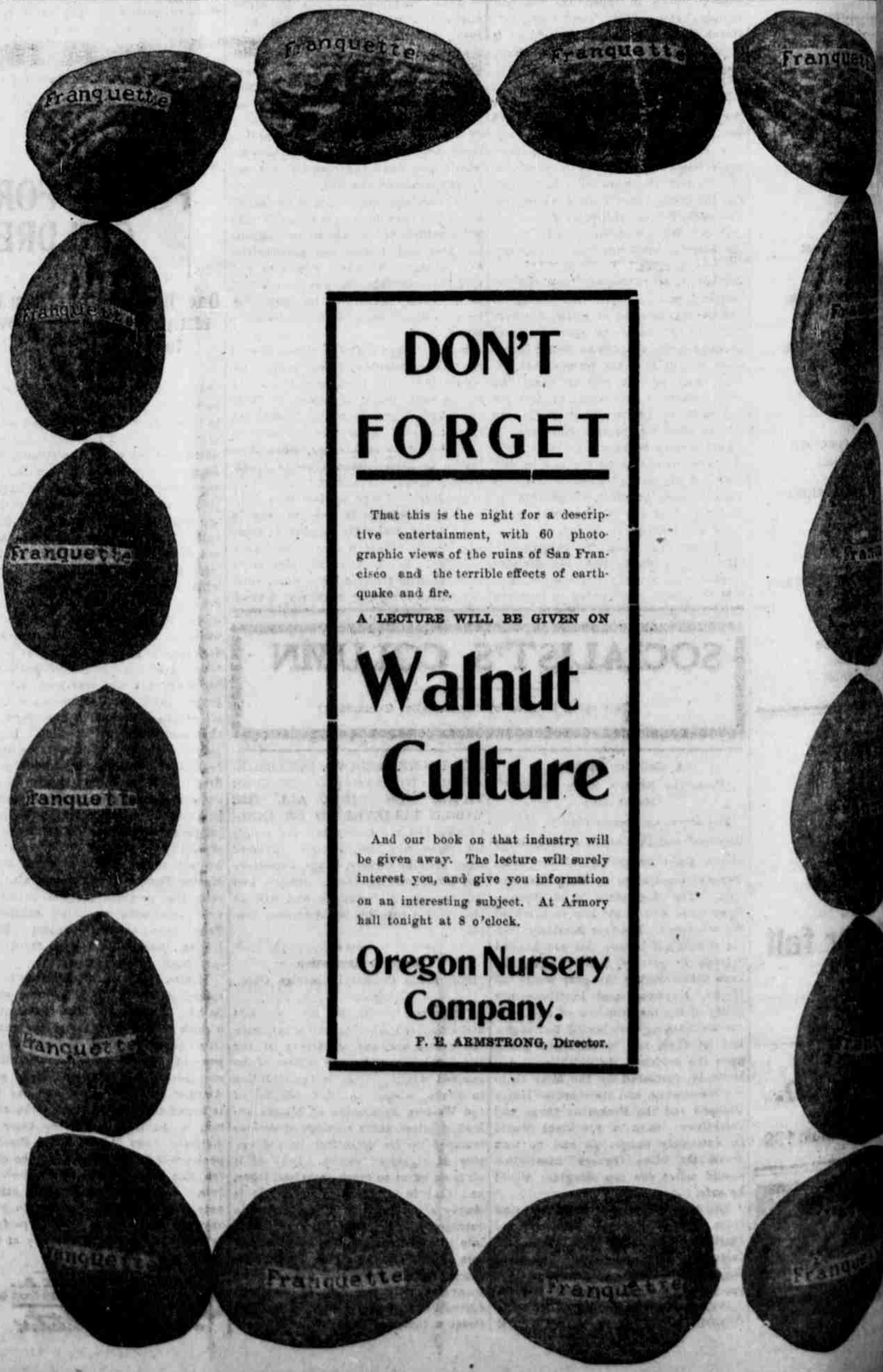
