HOW SCHOOL FUND LOANS WERE MADE

Chamberlain Not at Board Meeting When Nearly \$700,000 Was Put Out

Dunbar and Moore Acted and the Credit Claimed by the Governor Is not His Due

Ever since the campaign began the
governor of Oregon, a Democrat
(though he has apparently been
ashamed or forgetful of it), has stated
in all parts of the state that "he loaned
the \$750,000 in the irreducible school
fund" found by him in the fund when
he came into office, the preceding ad-
ministration having "neglected" to
put out the money. Now as a matter of
fact, the state land board consists of
the governor, Secretary of State Frank
I. Dunbar and State Treasurer Charles
S. Moore, the last two men being
known from one end of the state to
the other as two of the best business
men in the state, and as men of the
very highest integrity.

An examination of the records of the
chief clerk in the state school land
office yesterday afternoon, made by a
representative of the Herald, discloses
a condition of affairs that makes the
governor's statement regarding the
loaning of the funds by him laughable.
The board meets regularly on the sec-
ond and fourth Tuesday of each month,
though sometimes the meetings have
to be adjourned on account of other
business, and adjourned or special
meetings are held. The records or
minutes of the board for the past four
years show:

First—That Governor George E.
Chamberlain from January 27, 1903, to
the present date has been recorded ab-

sented from the board meeting 20 times,
and the records are not signed by him
on those 20 dates, while the signatures
of the two other members appear signed
to the minutes. On the contrary the
records show that the governor was not
in attendance.

Second—During the 20 meetings of
the board at which the governor was
absent applications for loans were
made on the part of citizens of the
state aggregating \$680,285 and ap-
proved by the two other members of
the board, Secretary of State Frank I.
Dunbar and State Treasurer Charles
S. Moore.

In addition to the loans made by the
board without the governor's presence
and presumably without the governor's
club swinging over the heads of the
two audacious members compelling
them to approve the applications,
many loans were made and approved
by the two officers mentioned without
the formality of meetings, and the ap-
plications of the borrowers are on file
showing the approval as made by the
two gentlemen named and that the
governor's signature is missing.

This is the record as it can be seen
in the books of the chief clerk of the
state land office in Salem. The gov-
ernor has appealed to the record. He
has made. There is the record. Since
he has appealed to Caesar, let him go
to Caesar.

OF COURSE IT WAS A SURPRISE

As a hen gathereth her chicks under
her wings so did Physical Director
Burden gather about him the van-
quished baseball tossers of the Uni-
versity of Oregon and exclaimed,
"They've licked us and we are
their'n."

The result of the game, with the
score of 9 to 1 in favor of Willamette,
was a surprise to the most sanguine
supporter of the cardinal and old gold.
Willamette's victory was complete,
decisive and overwhelming. If U. of
O. had ever fond aspirations for the
state intercollegiate championship,
they have vanished as vapor.

The man of the hour was Jerman,
Willamette's pitcher, who twirled the
spheroid in splendid style. His work
was the best seen on the local diamond
for many weeks, but, to the credit of
his team mates it must be said he was
given strong support. Every player
on the Willamette team was in the
game to win, and they won.

Not till the ninth inning did a
wearer of the lemon colored "O" see
the home plate, and that only after a
pass ball. Never has the U. of O. re-
ceived such a drubbing at the hands of
Willamette diamond devotees.

Necessarily, the game was uninter-
esting and one sided. The contest was
slow. In the first inning Willamette's
superiority with the willow was plain-
ly shown. Rhodes was the first man to
hit Oregon's pitcher and to reach first
base. The twirler allowed Coleman to
walk and Nace swatted the sphere on
a side hill and on an error by the
left fielder, Rhodes and Coleman came
matching home. Then Nace was brought
in by a safe hit by Rader. Thus did
the fireworks for Willamette start off.

In the second inning Willamette
scored once, thrice in the fourth and
twice in the eighth. Another pretty
play was when the bases were full and
Jerman sent a drive among the weeds
in the center garden and thereby
placed two tallies to Willamette's cred-
it, and then in an error by Catcher
Kelly Coleman came pacing home amid
frantic cheers.
