CHAMBERLAIN IS RE-ELECTED

REPUBLICAN CLEAN SWEEP

WITH POSSIBLE EXCEPTION OF GOVERNOR

Democrats Claim Re-Election of Chamberlain by Two to Five Thousand

Republicans Elect the Whole Thing in Marion County

Gearin and Galloway Running Ahead of Their Ticket but Both Defeated

Complete returns of the state election held Monday show Republican Chamberlain elected, with Democratic state committee claiming Governor Chamberlain re-elected by small plurality. The vote on the woman suffrage amend-

ment and the amendment to the local option law are in doubt. The rest of the proposed amendments to the constitution are adopted by a large majority, and the legislature is Republican. Sheriff Word, in Portland, is probably

elected, and Senator Brownell, in Clackamas county is defeated. Jonathan Bourne is elected United States senator by five to ten thousand majority. He carried Washington county by 411.

The election returns are very incomplete, owing to the great length of the ballot, and will not be fully reported for several days. The remote country precincts show up uniform Republican gains over four years ago, and the factional fights in the city precincts show scratched tickets, to the detriment of Republicans. Jonathan Bourne, for United States senator, will have a large plurality over Gearin, and will probably lead the ticket over both Republican candidates for congress. Present returns show both Ellis and Hawley elected to congress, the latter not having the full Republican vote. The Democratic campaign managers put up a surprising fight for the entire ticket, and have more to their credit, in some respects, than the Republicans, so far as accomplishing results is concerned.

Chamberlain Probably Elected. (Special to Journal.)

Portland, June 5.—Partial returns indicate the re-election of George E. Chamberlain, Democrat, for governor by a plurality in excess of 2000. Republicans elect Jonathan Bourne United States senator for the long term by reduced majorities. In Multnomah county Tom Word, the Democrat reform sheriff, who suppressed gambling, is probably defeated by a small plurality.

Democrat, for congress, in the first congressional district, but both are defeated.

Salem No. 1.

This precinct is the home of the Republican city chairman, Robert Downing, and State Committeeman Waters, and gave a good majority for the entire Republican ticket. It has often been close, and even a Democratic ward. Here are a few: Withycombe 98, Chamberlain 85; Galloway 69, Hawley 107; Bourne 81, Gearin 76. Suffrage 84, anti 90; amendment to local option law 63, against 105.

Salem No. 2.

The counting of ballots is still on. By the count last evening Withycombe led by 26 votes. The vote counted since morning is Chamberlain 54, Withycombe 76; Hawley 80, Galloway 44; Bourne 49, Gearin 69. In this precinct more than 400 votes were cast.

REMARKABLE DISCREPANCY APPEARING

Between the Ordinance Grade and the South Commercial Street Improvement

Chairman Downing, of the street committee, has discovered a big blunder on the part of the city council in adopting an ordinance establishing the grade of South Commercial street. The ordinance prepared by the ordinance committee shows differences between the present grade of the improvement and the grades established by the city council ranging from four-tenths of an inch to over ten feet. There has been incompetency somewhere and the whole matter was to be threshed out at the city council last night. Owing to election excitement there was no meeting, and the city council adjourned over to Friday evening, when the disclosures will be officially made public and the blame located. It will be necessary to pass a new ordinance establishing the grades somewhere near the present grade that the street may have to be torn up and rebuilt.

The Two Grades.

Following figures show the two sets of grades, the first column being the grades above the base at Willamette hotel from which all street grades are taken, the second the grades given by City Engineer Byars to Superintendent Bushey, who is in charge of the improvement for the city, and the third column being the differences between the two sets of grades in feet and frac-

tions of a foot. These figures are from the official records:

The above figures have caused great excitement in city hall circles, and disclose a remarkable blundering state of affairs, that may lead to serious difficulties and may put the city to great expense, as well as the abutting property owners. The ordinance establishing the grades was drawn by Alderman Bayne under the direction of the ordinance committee, and was afterwards amended by order of the committee, Mr. Bayne drawing the amended ordinance, and having the figures inserted in the ordinance handed to him by the committee.

Claim Chamberlain's Election. (Special to Journal.)

Portland, June 5.—Governor Chamberlain has carried the state by a decisive majority. His list of counties include Multnomah, where, in a count of 11,000 votes, he has a lead of 468, and at the same ratio means 800 majority. Clatsop, 200 majority, Malheur and Baker, 600; Linn, 400; Yamhill, 250; Grant, 150; Marion, 100 to 500; Union, 600; Wasco, 250; Umatilla, 100; Josephine, 100; Douglas, 200.

Late returns show that Word is in the lead for sheriff. Indications point to his election. All Republican candidates in the county, except Stevens, for sheriff, are elected by big majorities. The Republican legislative ticket won by a vote of three to one.

"Chamberlain is re-elected by a vote of from 2000 to 5000," says Chairman Sweek, of the Democratic committee.

"The vote was far heavier than expected, exceeding our estimates. Many counties we had conceded to Withycombe have been carried by Chamberlain." Gearin ran far ahead of his ticket, but the popular endorsement has gone to Jonathan Bourne. The Republicans have elected both congressional candidates, Ellis by a large majority in the second district, and Hawley by a greatly reduced party vote in the first. The entire Republican state ticket, with the exception of Withycombe, has been elected by a large majority. In some precincts Benson, for secretary of state, got two votes to Withycombe's one. Women's suffrage is defeated, as is the local option amendment.

Portland, June 5.—The returns show an increased majority for Chamberlain. Word, for sheriff, is probably elected. The equal suffrage amendment and local option amendment are defeated. Senator Gearin, Democrat, is running far ahead of his ticket, as is Galloway,

frage 68, anti 58. Constable, Johnson 69, Jory 78. All the rest is Republican.

Butteville. Chamberlain has 64 votes, Withycombe 45; Hawley 55, Galloway 54; Gearin is a little ahead of Bourne.

Boia.

This county precinct of Polk county went about 30 Republican on the whole ticket, giving about that majority against woman suffrage, against prohibition, and for the local option amendments.

Aurora.

Chamberlain made a big gain of Republican votes here. He received 49 to Withycombe's 70, Hawley 76 and Galloway 43. The whole county ticket received good safe Republican majorities. At the primaries there were only nine Democrats voted, but today's vote showed 40 more.
