THE LATE JUDGE BONHAM.

The death of the late B. F. Bonham removes from this community a man who was an ornament to his profession, and who possessed many lovable qualities. In all his record as a public servant, first as a judge, then in the consular service, and then as postmaster, he made a record of honesty, intelligence and signal devotion to public duty.

Judge Bonham began life in humble circumstances. Beginning as a school teacher, he educated himself for the bar, and made his way by his own exertions to the first rank in his profession.

But it was in the more intimate relations of private life that his virtues and real character became best known and appreciated. He was loved and admired by his friends and highly respected in his profession. He did not pursue the law with the sordid zeal and commercial greed of a mere money-maker, but united a high sense of professional honor with thorough scholarship and native integrity of character.

In literary ability and polished force as an orator at the bar, B. F. Bonham had few equals in Oregon. He was a man who always bore himself with dignity becoming a gentleman.

And so, without murmur or complaint, he has laid down his burdens, resting his cause with the Giver of all Good, and the community as well as the profession he honored, mourn his departure.

A MONSTER MEETING.

(Medford Daily Tribune.) June 9th bids fair to be a day that

will be long remembered in the history of southern Oregon. On that day the Rogue River Development league propose to do things. The members of the league and their friends, and the latter category includes most of the population of the valley, are going in a body to attend the monster mass meeting at Grants Pass. It is proposed to close every business house in Medford, Ashland, Jacksonville, Central Point, Gold Hill, Rock Point, Woodville and other places and give everyone a chance to attend. All of the merchants and professional men, who have been interviewed on the subject, have expressed themselves as being heartily in favor of this feature, and promise to arrange their affairs that the roll call of boosters may be complete. Several hundred members will be clothed in khaki uniforms and will be provided with musical instruments in the shape of tin horns. Special trains will leave Ashland and Medford in the morning and will bear the boosters northward, stopping at way stations to allow the faithful to get on the band wagon. That it will be the biggest turnout ever witnessed in the valley on any similar occasion is already assured, and every man living in Rogue River valley that has the welfare of this community at heart should make up his mind to go.

S. P. THREW OPEN ITS GATES.

Carried Passengers at the Rate of Seventy a Minute.

(Reprinted from San Francisco Examiner, May 5, 1906.)

Never has the railroad passenger traffic from San Francisco reached the enormous figure of the past two weeks.

The details of the transportation history following the headlong rush of the people on April 18 and subsequent days are now becoming available. The subsequent influx of supplies in its relation to transportation presents in its detail many interesting facts.

The Southern Pacific threw its gates wide open to passengers and carried the destitute to local points without tickets during the ten days after the disaster; therefore the number of passengers must be estimated from the number of cars placed in service.

The day of greatest outgo was not the 18th, but the 19th, when the railroad moved out of San Francisco 70 passenger cars every minute—a total of 1073 cars, equivalent, say, to a train ten miles in length. On the 20th nearly as many passengers left the city, and the movement was continuously heavy until the morning of the 26th.

From the 18th to the 26th of April, inclusive, over 6000 cars of passengers were moved from San Francisco. Careful estimates made by the superintendent of the Southern Pacific to the general superintendent and checked with the traffic department figures show that the road carried free to interior California points 67,000 people; in sleepers to other states free, 7684 people, and to suburban points around the bay—Oakland, Alameda, Berkeley and other places—226,000 free.

The total free passengers carried during the nine days surpass the figure of 300,000. The value of the free transportation furnished passengers, according to the official report of the company's officers, was \$456,000 up to and including the 26th. This comprises only the movement from San Francisco. The free transportation from San Jose, Santa Rosa, Vallejo, Sacramento and Stockton, etc., has not yet been made the subject of calculation.

Passenger Traffic Manager Fee said yesterday that he considered the most encouraging feature of the situation to be the fact that not only were the people staying in California, but three-fourths of them were not going far from San Francisco bay. The inbound trains locally during the past few days have carried a great many people back to San Francisco and many more are expected to return.

Of the people who have paid fares out of the city during the nine days referred to (numbering about 185,000), the great majority were to points around the bay, only about 50,000 leaving the bay territory. Those were largely people traveling on regular business, and from an careful investigation as can now be made, the traffic officials of the road declare it to be their opinion that the San Francisco bay cities have lost permanently

a very slight percentage of their population.

The railroad company handled the immense traffic thrown unexpectedly upon it without accident to a single passenger, without a mishap to any of the hundreds of extra trains, and almost without delay. On the night of the 20th Oakland pier was clear of people and fumigated by 1 a. m., and the succeeding night found the pier cleared before midnight. Free lunch counters were operated for the delayed passengers, and an improvised hotel was opened in the temporary general passenger office in the large waiting room upstairs.

The rush from Third and Valencia street stations of the Southern Pacific was more melodramatic. With a sea of flame driving them southward, the passengers swarmed in and over the cars, riding out of town on the roofs and steps or wherever a foothold could be secured anywhere. At the very beginning trainmen and conductors were advised that all rules were suspended in favor of one—the people must be moved from the city, whether or not they had tickets.

Overfed Chicks.

In case you have overfed chicks on too much starchy foods till diarrhea has resulted, the following ration has been found beneficial in correcting the trouble:

Bran three parts by measure, corn meal two parts, cut clover two parts, meat meal one part. Let the birds have access to this at all times. Feed roots and cabbage, all they will eat, and one full feed of whole grain an hour before they go to roost. Let this be wheat one night, barley the next, corn the third, and then go over the list again. Give no medicine. Deep litter for exercise in getting the grain, with fresh water several times a day. When the animal supply of food has been too small the birds fill up constantly on starchy foods, overtaxing the liver and digestion. Diarrhea and breakdown the are natural outcome of this method of feeding. Growing birds will stand high feeding, but when a bird has reached maturity more careful feeding is required.
