

AMERICAN MEDICAL ASSOCIATION

Boston, Mass., June 5.—For the first time in 41 years the American Medical Association, the largest medical association in the world, is holding its annual convention in this city. This is the 57th annual convention of the association, which numbers many thousands of the best physicians in the United States among its members. A great many of the members arrived here Sunday and yesterday and some preliminary work was done yesterday, when also the opening session of the American Medical Association was held.

The opening session of the American Medical Association was called to order at 10:30 o'clock this forenoon at Mechanics' hall, where all the general meetings will be held. At the opening session the delegates were welcomed by the mayor of the city and Dr. Herbert L. Burrell, representing the physicians of this city. President Dr. Lewis S. McMurtry, of Louisville, Ky., responded and then read his annual address. There will be another business session in the afternoon.

Besides the regular general sessions, which will be held on every forenoon and afternoon of the four days of the convention, there will be special meetings of the twelve sections into which the work of the convention will be divided. At these section meetings much important work of a technical character, including the practice of medicine, obstetrics and gynaecology, surgery and anatomy, hygiene and sanitary science, ophthalmology, nervous and mental diseases, therapeutics, etc., will be considered.

One of the most important features will be the clinical exhibits which will be presented daily at the Massachusetts General Hospital, Boston City Hospital, Carney Hospital, Children's Hospital, and probably at the Good Samaritan, the Infants' and Corey Hill hospitals. There will also be a special clinical exhibit given daily at Mechanics' hall. Special committees for each hospital have been appointed and their programs will embrace the showing of interesting cases, the exhibition of specimens, special processes, apparatus, instruments and the demonstration of operations by surgeons at the hospital.

tals. In order that there may not be an overcrowding at any hospital clinic the bureau of information will only issue a limited number of tickets every day to each one of the clinics.

At the same time commercial and educational exhibits are displayed at the Mechanics' building. Among the special exhibits is a display of motor cars for physicians, motor ambulances and a large exhibition of drugs and medical preparations.

The headquarters of the general officers is at the Vendome hotel; the Brunswick is the headquarters of the section of surgery; the Copley Square for the section of obstetrics and gynaecology; at the same hotel is also the headquarters for the section of pathology and physiology; the Lenox is the headquarters of the section of ophthalmology; the Nottingham for the section of diseases of children as well as for the section of cutaneous medicine and surgery; the Oxford for the section of pharmacology; the Somerset for the section of medicine; the Thorndyke for the section of hygiene and sanitary science and for the section of laryngology and otology; the Touraine for the section of nervous and mental diseases; the Westminster for the section of stomatology.

An elaborate program for the entertainment of the seven or eight thousand delegates has been prepared. The president's reception will be held on the evening of Thursday in Mechanics' hall. Besides that there will be numerous other receptions, teas and other entertainments for the delegates and their ladies. The headquarters of the ladies is at Paul Revere hall.

The new building of the Harvard Medical school, which will be placed in commission in September will be open for the inspection of the delegates during the four days of the convention.

The American Medical Association was founded in 1847 and has now more than 20,000 members, among them nearly every prominent physician in the United States. Most of the previous conventions of the organization were held in New York, Philadelphia, Saratoga and Chicago, where the headquarters of the association is located. The last time the convention met in Boston was only a few months after the assassination of President Lincoln.

opened here today for a three days' session. The school of instruction, as provided by the Masonic code of Iowa, was opened here last Friday and continued through Friday, Saturday and Monday.

This morning the delegates formed in line at the corner of 7th and Locust streets under the direction of the grand marshal and marched to the auditorium, escorted by the Temple Commandery No. 4.

The public exercises at the auditorium began at half past nine and included addresses of welcome by the mayor and other prominent citizens and responses by the officers of the grand lodge. At the conclusion of the public exercises all excepting the master masons present retired and the session of the grand lodge was opened. The ceremony was performed by grand master Norris, assisted by the other grand officers. The grand master read his report and then the reports of the various grand officers were submitted. Shortly after 2 o'clock the session was closed to enable the members to go to Fort Des Moines and attend the battalion drill. This evening the visiting members of the grand lodge will be the guests of the local Masons at a theater party in the Empire theater.

The grand lodge will hold another session tomorrow morning and afternoon and in the evening they will be given an opportunity to inspect the capitol building, which will be thrown open for that purpose.

Arkansas Democrats in Convention.

Hot Springs, Ark., June 6.—The Democratic state convention of Arkansas opened here today at noon with a full delegation representing every county in the state. It is expected that the convention will remain in session three days. Contesting delegations are present from Hempstead, Cross, Mississippi and Polk counties.

The principal contest will be over the nomination for commissioner of mines, agriculture and manufactures, as none of the five candidates has enough instructed votes to insure his nomination at the first ballot. Guy Tucker leads with 208 votes. The nomination for railroad commissioner in the northwestern district will have to be settled by the district convention, as none of the candidates has a clear majority.

To Form National Organization.

Buffalo, N. Y., June 5.—Representatives of the wholesale grocery trade in 44 states have come together here for a national convention, the principal object of which is the formation of a national organization of the wholesale grocery interests of the United States. The local grocers have made extensive preparations for the reception and entertainment of the delegates and a highly successful convention is expected. The headquarters of the grocers is at the Froquois hotel, where the sessions of the convention will be held. The opening meeting will be called to order this afternoon, and the convention will remain in session three days.

Pure food and the proper enforcement of the pure food laws in the different states will be one of the principal subjects of discussion. It is expected that a committee of the retail grocers' association will appear before the convention to urge concerted action in the matter.

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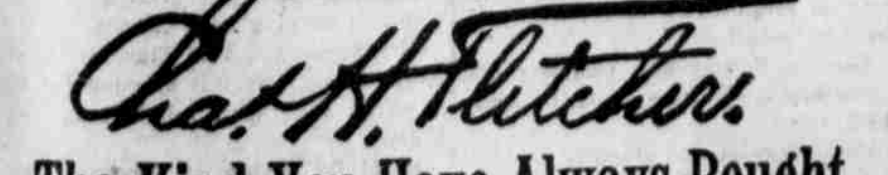
