An Anti-Noise Measure.

Washington, D. C., June 5.—Rubber heels at the expense of landlords for flat dwellers is the latest innovation of renting agents here. It seems that the landlords have come to the conclusion that something must be done to stop the nerve shattering noise caused by the walking over hardwood floors with heavy shoes. They talked the matter over and reached the conclusion that it would be necessary either to furnish carpets or rubber runners for each flat or rubber heels for the tenants. As it is undoubtedly cheaper to supply rubber heels than carpets and rugs, it was decided to make the wearing of rubber heels by the tenants compulsory. As a result there is a clause in the more recent leases of apartments that every member of a family must wear rubber heels on shoes while in the apartment.

Much merriment was manifested at the depot by the tags and labels placed on the baggage of Mr. and Mrs. F. D. Thielsen, who leave this evening for their honeymoon trip to Shasta Springs, Cal. On one side of the trunk was a placard upon which was drawn the picture of a bird, intended to be a stork, but the artist's drawing looked more like a sea gull. On the four corners of the placard were tacked leather postal cards with inscriptions such as these: "I want to come back to you," "I want to bring my clothes back home," "Worn out tan shoes were securely tied to the handles of the trunk. On another side of the trunk were several large cards with all sorts of humorous saying. "We are just married, and don't care who knows it," "Mr. and Mrs. Thielsen, newly married." The young couple were expecting that their friends would play all sorts of pranks upon them, and for that reason had checked their baggage ahead of their own departure, but even this strategic move was anticipated, with the aforementioned result. They got all that was coming to them in the way of advertisement, but—well, they are happy, anyhow.

Big Meet Saturday.

Everybody should set aside Saturday afternoon for the big field and track meet. The University of Oregon bunch, having won the Columbia indoor meet, the dual meet with O. A. C. and the triangular meet at Seattle between Oregon, Washington and Idaho, is coming down with the expectation of victory. While "Dad" Trine is not saying much about O. A. C.'s prospects, yet rumors are afloat from that direction that he expects to have some surprises, and that along with the aid of P. U. and W. U., he expects to win by a small margin. Those who are speculating on the matter figure that W. U. will win the high jump and something in the broad jump, the discus throw, the shot put and half-mile. Most of these points will detract materially from Oregon's score. P. U. will probably win something in the quarter and half-mile runs and in the hurdles. The points that P. U. will win in the runs will subtract from O. A. C.'s score, and shut Oregon out of the events entirely. In the hurdles P. U.'s points will all come from Oregon.

After all these considerations Trainer Haywood, of Oregon, still figures that he can win the meet by a small score, and says that, unless Trine has some good surprises, which he does not expect, Oregon is on the safe side.

After all has been said the meet promises to be one of the closest ever held in Salem, and besides several of the events promise to be the fastest ever pulled off on the coast. Among these will be the 100-yard dash in 9.4-5 seconds, the 220-yard dash in less than 22 seconds, the mile run down in the 30s, and the half below two minutes. In the field events the broad jump will probably be over 24 feet, the pole vault over 11 feet, and the shot put over 45 feet, the hammer throw about 135 feet and the discus over 120 feet. These records have never been equaled in Oregon before this year, and in Saturday's meet Salem people will have a chance to see a performance by some of the best athletes on the Pacific coast.

STAYTAN GOES ARID

The precincts of Horeb, Sidney, Jefferson, Stayton, Mehama, Marion and Breitenbush, in which the question of saloon or no saloon was to be decided, went "dry" by a vote of only 17, it is reported. Breitenbush has two liquor dispensaries, under government license, and Stayton had four saloons. Stayton went wet, but it will have to be dry for two years, as the precinct was included in the whole district.

Horeb also voted upon the question separately, but even then the "dry" element won out.

It is rumored that the election was not entirely legal in some respects, and it may be possible that the election will be contested.
