

JOHNSTOWN GETS A FLOOD

River Gets on a Rampage and Gives Pennsylvania Town a Bath

Pittsburg, Pa., June 7.—The weather bureau has received a telegram from Johnstown stating that, owing to a cloudburst along the Conneaut river, the stream rose 13½ feet between 8 and 9 o'clock this morning.

The cloudburst occurred at Hooversville, on Stony Creek, 18 miles above Johnstown. Many houses were damaged, and the pleasure resort wiped out. So far as is known no deaths occurred. People fled to the hills. A woman watching the flood from the edge was struck by a train and killed, and her infant thrown from her arms and drowned.

The wild animals in the park at the top were carried down the river on the debris. The railroad and wagon roads were washed out.

Washington, June 7.—On account of Gorman's funeral the senate did not meet until 2 o'clock this afternoon.

Oakland, Cal., June 7.—Luxuriant auburn curls caused a child to be kidnaped yesterday and puzzled the police. Genevieve Fuller, 3 years old, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John Fuller, was playing with her sisters in front of the family residence yesterday afternoon, when suddenly she was missed. Diligent search failed to disclose her whereabouts.

Shortly after midnight the distracted father reported the matter to the police. This morning at 7 o'clock Patrolman Mulgrew found the child sitting on a bench in the Seventh street station, and she was taken to the police station.

When found she was attired in a boy's brown sailor suit with a red and white cap. Her head had been shorn of its wealth of auburn curls. She said a man who gave her candy induced her to go with him. No other reason for the kidnaping could be assigned than that the thieves wanted the child's curls.

Every train brought several hundred delegates of whom many are accompanied by their ladies and by noon the vicinity of the Capital Hotel was crowded with visitors. One of the bands gave an open air concert in front of the hotel.

The first session of the convention will be opened at 3 o'clock this afternoon. The mayor of the city and the president of the board of trade will welcome the delegates, and in the evening a concert will be given. The toastmaster at the banquet will be the Hon. Harry H. Myers, selected by the board of trade, and the "toastmaster" will be Congressman Jos. T. Robinson, of Loneke, who has been named by the Travelers. No intoxicating liquors will be served at the banquet, in accordance with a custom established by the Travelers.

Tomorrow morning a business session will be held at the Majestic Theater, at which officers will be elected. In the early afternoon the Travelers will give a dress parade in full uniform. There will also be a parade of automobiles. United States soldiers and militia, as well as policemen and firemen, will take part in the parade. Colonel A. S. Fowler will be the grand marshal. The parade will disband at the corner of Fifteenth and Main streets, where the Travelers will take street cars for West End Park, to witness the game of baseball between the Little Rock and Nashville teams of the Southern League. In the evening a ball will be given at Old Concordia hall.

On Saturday there will be a fancy dress parade in the morning and a grand special performance at Forest Park at night.

Another Ocean Race.

New Rochelle, N. Y., June 7.—Seven yachts of the New Rochelle Yacht club started from the club this morning on an ocean race for the Brooklyn Yacht club challenge cup. They intend to sail around Montauk Point, to and around North End lightship, thence to finish line off the Brooklyn Yacht club Bensonhurst, L. I. In addition to the challenge cup there will be several special prizes, awarded to the winners and the second third. This is one of the most interesting yachting events in this vicinity and is attracting considerable interest, as the course is considered quite difficult and requires seamanship and considerable experience in sailing.

Binger Hermann's Trial Is Postponed.

Washington, June 6.—Justice Gould today granted the motion of District Attorney Baker to postpone the trial of Congressman Binger Hermann, of Oregon, indicted for destroying public records while commissioner of the general land office, set for June 18th, until after the trial of the Hyde, Diamond and Benson cases. Mr. Worthington, counsel for the defense, agreed to the postponement. This practically means that the case will go over until fall.

EIGHT THOUSAND VISITORS

Twenty Five Bands in the Parade at Ogden When the Travelers Meet

Ogden, Utah, June 7.—Eight thousand visitors are here this morning attending the convention of the United Commercial Travelers, holding a three-day session. Twenty-five bands will be in the parade tomorrow. Delegates are here from Montana, Idaho, Nevada and Wyoming.

BRIBERY PREVALENT EVERYWHERE

Philadelphia, Pa., June 7.—Joseph K. Aikens, for 27 years chief clerk of the Monongahela division of the Pennsylvania railroad, testified in the interstate commerce commission hearing today that he had received \$100,000 in bribes from the Pennsylvania coal mine stock, which cost him \$50,000. He received a small amount of additional stock as a gift. He admitted sending Boyer the \$46,000, which the latter admitted yesterday. The money was sent as a commission, and was a business matter. Boyer looked out for Aikens. Aikens' wages ranged from \$30 to \$123 monthly during his 30 years' employment. He bought stocks through investing his wages. Once he was given \$300 by an operator, and he also received \$50 a month for "intermediate interest" in the company store.

Carload of People Have Narrow Escape

Pasadena, June 7.—A disarranged flange on the Mount Lowe electric car nearly caused one of the worst accidents ever noted in this vicinity. Just as a car bound for the summit left circular bridge with a crowd of pleasure-seekers the inner rail spread, and the car was thrown from the track against the side of the cliff.

At this point passengers can look down 270 feet to the bottom of the gorge, and had the car not stopped after jumping the track nothing could have prevented it from rolling over the cliff.

Westminster Handicap Today.

Brooklyn, N. Y., June 7.—To make the opening day of the second session of the Brooklyn Jockey Club's spring meet at Gravesend more interesting and attractive to sportsmen, the Westminster handicap has been added to the list of races for this afternoon. The race is worth \$10,000 to the winner, and it is expected that there will be a lively contest, as a large field has been entered for the event. Some of the best Eastern and Western horses have been entered for the race. It is to be over the regular handicap distance of one mile and one-quarter.

The Czarina's Birthday.

St. Petersburg, June 7.—The whole city is decorated and beflagged today in honor of the birthday of the empress. There was no attempt to make the celebration a state event, although the czarina received the members of her household and the members of the cabinet who offered their congratulations. There was the customary review of troops and the firing of a salute, but no popular demonstration.

TORNADO DOES ITS STUNTS

Blows Baby From Mother's Arms and its Clothes off but Leaves it Unharmd

St. Paul, June 7.—A tornado about 5 o'clock this morning did great damage to property, killed one man and injured many others in the vicinity of Wyoming and North Branch, small towns about 15 miles north of here. It is feared that other lives may have been lost.

The storm seems to have formed near Lindstrom, Minn., and swept in a north-easterly direction, cutting a path about 500 yards wide for a distance of 15 miles. Everything in its pathway was laid bare, even the grass being cut as though mowed with a scythe.

Ben Legoo and three men were in the direct path of the storm, and took refuge under a bridge crossing a small stream, where the water was three feet deep. The wind took the bridge from over their heads and sucked all of the water out of the stream, leaving the bed perfectly dry. All four of the men were hurt, but none fatally.

All the buildings on the farm of a man named Magnusson were razed, but he and his family escaped injury by taking refuge in the root cellar.

The Engdahl residence on Pine Island, three miles from North Branch, was destroyed, and Mr. Engdahl, Sr., is reported dead. The other members of the family received serious injury.

At Wyoming much damage was done, small buildings being razed, and larger ones moved from their foundations. The house and barn of Henry Funk were completely destroyed, and his wife and son severely injured. Mrs. Funk had her 15-month-old babe in her arms when the storm came up, and though she tried to cling to it, it was blown away. Later it was found some distance away, unharmed, but without a stitch of clothing on it.

At Liewood the LaDuke stock farm buildings were destroyed and much valuable machinery damaged.

Grand Masonic Centennial.

Wilmington, Del., June 7.—Prominent men in Masonry from all parts of the country are assembled here to take part in the celebration which will be held here today in honor of the 100th anniversary of the establishment of the grand lodge of Delaware, Ancient Free and Accepted Masons.

The centennial exercises will be held this afternoon at the opera house, which forms part of the Masonic temple. Nearly all master Masons in the district will be present. Past Master Howell S. England, of Wilmington, will read the Centennial Ode, written by himself for the occasion, and addresses will be delivered by United States Senator Dooliver of Iowa, City Solicitor John L. Kinsey of Philadelphia and Grand Master Handy.

Norway's Independence Day.

Christiania, Norway, June 7.—Today is the anniversary of the dissolution of the union between Sweden and Norway, which was proclaimed by the Storting as a result of King Oscar's refusal to sanction a bill passed by the storting and creating a separate consular service for Norway. The anniversary is celebrated throughout Norway with great enthusiasm. All public buildings displayed the Norwegian flag and there were parades, mass meetings, special entertainments and countless banquets.
