## Republicans Have Almost Entire Legislature, Will it Keep Its Pledges

The personnel of the next legislature, indicated by the returns, shows that the Republicans have won an overwhelming victory, the like of which has never been known in Oregon history. In the house there is not a single democrat, while in the senate there will be six Democrats, namely M. A. Miller, of Linn; O. P. Coshaw (holder of Douglas; L. L. Mult, of Jackson; F. H. Caldwell, of Yamhill; J. E. Edges, of Clackamas, who defeated Howell, and C. J. Smith, of Umatilla. The Telegram says: "The new legislature will be made up of seven senators who signed statement No. 1 and who pledged themselves to vote for the Republican choice; of 39 representatives pledged to statement No. 1 and six who promised to vote for the public choice.

Forty-six votes are necessary to a quorum and the next legislature will contain 54 members pledged to the Republican nominee. Of the hold-over members several are known to be opposed to Jonathan Bourne."

### ENGINEERS' OFFICE IS MENACED

Development in Oregon Threatened by Congressional Action.

The congressional appropriation of \$2,000 for gauging streams and as-

certaining water supplies is cut down one-half, as intended, it will mean the abolition of the office of state engineer in Oregon.

Such is the problem facing the residents of the state, and which the commercial bodies are trying to solve. Information was given the chamber of commerce yesterday that such a scheme was afoot, and members of the irrigation committee were hurriedly summoned to gather and take action looking to the saving of the appropriation.

At the same time the board of trade was informed of the crisis in the irrigation development of Oregon, and requested to join in the movement to avert it. A telegram was sent to Senators Gearin and Fulton and Congressman Herman, as follows:

"Reduction of \$100,000 in sundry civil bill appropriation for stream gauging, etc., a serious blow to Western interests. Use of reclamation fund for this purpose illegal. Unless amount is restored in senate work must stop. Confer with the Western representatives. Letter follows."

### West Deeply Concerned.

It was shown by those interested that the proposition was one in which the entire West is deeply concerned, particularly Oregon, in view of the irrigation projects under way. Telegrams were dispatched by the chamber of commerce to Senator Fulton, and commercial organizations at Seattle, Tacoma and Spokane, in addition to those at Baker City, Pendleton, Boise and Lewiston. The wire to Senator Fulton was as follows:

You are urgently requested to cooperate with Senators Gearin, Ankeny, Piles, Heyburn and Dubois to oppose the reduction contemplated in the usual appropriation for stream gauging. We deem the continuance of this work of paramount importance to our own and sister states."

This message was sent to the three Washington bodies:

"The co-operation of your body is requested in asking Washington senators to actively and urgently oppose the proposed reduction from \$200,000 to \$100,000 in the usual appropriation for stream gauging. Please wire your senators immediately."

The board of trade members instructed the acting president and secretary to inform every commercial body on the coast of the urgency of keeping the fund intact, and soliciting support from all. It is said the reduction was advised under the terms of the reclamation act of June 17, 1902,

### Indiana Democratic Convention.

Indianapolis, Ind., June.—The Democratic state convention of Indiana, which met at Tomlinson hall this afternoon, is not a very exciting event. Everything is quiet and peaceful and not a trace of excitement and interest caused by Democratic state conventions in this state is noticeable. The preliminary arrangements, like the selection of members of the state committee, etc., were made yesterday afternoon, and the love feast which was held in the evening passed off without a hitch. The result of it all is that the convention is devoid of any particular interest, as everything is practically cut and dried. Everybody feels that everything, from the personnel of the various committees to the platform and even the nominations for the state ticket has been pre-arranged under the direct influence of Wm. Jennings Bryan, and that the convention is merely a matter of form.

Benjamin F. Shively, of South Bend, Ind., was made chairman of the convention and his address at the opening of the convention sounded the keynote of the Democratic campaign in this state. The convention consists of 1371 delegates and 686 votes are necessary for nominating a candidate. The nominations will be made this afternoon. The following places on the ticket are to be filed. Secretary of state, auditor of state, state treasurer, attorney general, clerk of the supreme court, superintendent of public instruction, state geologist, state statistician, one judge of the supreme court for the first district, one judge of the supreme court for the fourth district, two judges of the appellate court for the first district and three judges of the appellate court for the second district.
