

TWO HUNDRED SALOONS WILL CLOSE

Benton, Linn, Lane, Tillamook, Wallowa and Yamhill Went Dry--Partial Returns From Gilliam, Lincoln, Crook and Coos Indicate a Prohibition Majority Except in the Larger Towns

Portland, Or., June 8.—As a result of the election 200 saloons will be closed in Oregon through the operation of county prohibition. The returns show Benton, Linn, Lane, Tillamook, Wallowa and Yamhill counties went "dry." Partial returns indicate the same result in Sherman, Gilliam, Lincoln, and Crook counties. Multnomah county.

No Bankruptcy Law in Army. Mattheburg, N. Y., June 8.—There is trouble brewing for Major Francis Fremont of the 5th infantry, on duty at Plattsburg Barracks, but now on account of absence. That officer is the son of General John C. Fremont, the Pathfinder, and is well known in the army. He recently filed a petition for bankruptcy in New York, acknowledging liabilities of nearly \$12,000, of which he had only \$28 in cash assets. The fact that an army officer should be asked to be declared a bankrupt and obtain relief from his financial obligations in that manner is altogether without precedent. The war department authorities are surprised that an officer should proceed, and instructions have gone out to have the case thoroughly investigated, with the chance that Major Fremont will be tried by court martial. His debts cover many transactions in banks in all parts of the country, as well as personal indebtedness for medical services, household supplies, lawyers' services, uniforms, etc. Army officers do not sympathize with any such appeal to the law as a protection to an individual of the service who owes money. The practice is by no means viewed with favor, and it is not understood in Washington just how an army officer may, with his assurance of income, be admitted into bankruptcy. The case possesses elements which, it is said, call for some drastic proceedings. Whatever action is necessary will be taken by General Grant at Governor's Island.

Old Nevadans Will Wake Up and Smile Over Old Mule Days

The remainder of the officials are Director Harriman and Senator Clark's representatives. The building of the road is guaranteed by the Nevada-Utah mines and smelter corporation.

(Four O'Clock Edition.) Walla Walla, Wash., June 8.—A. A. Armstrong, an aged man, was hanged at the penitentiary this morning, protesting his innocence, for the murder of Robert Patton, a neighbor of his in the Wenatchee valley. Patton was cutting wood on disputed premises.

Southern Conference Y. W. C. A. Asheville, N. C., June 8.—Hundreds of members and delegates of the various Young Women's Christian association of the south are assembled here to attend the twelfth session of the southern conference of the Y. W. C. A., which opened here today. The purpose of these summer conventions is to deepen the spiritual life of the delegates, to train them for leadership in the Christian work of their colleges or associations and to show them opportunities for Christian service. There will be mission study classes, Bible study classes, city conferences, students' meeting, etc. Many distinguished workers and speakers from all parts of the south are in attendance and will address the delegates during the twelve days of the conference.

PACKERS MUST PUT UP

Spending a Million in Advertising to Show Their Products are Clean

Chicago, June 8.—It is estimated the packers will be forced to spend \$1,000,000 stemming the indignation aroused by the recent expose. "Advertising contracts" are being made with newspapers. Already \$50,000 has been spent here in page advertisements asking the public to visit the plants. This morning advertisements appeared in the Eastern papers. Local publications which attacked the packers have not been given advertisements.

Washington, June 8.—James B. Reynolds testified before the house agricultural committee, stating the matter in the Neill-Reynolds report was observed by him. Chairman Wadsworth denied the published reports. Wadsworth, who is friendly to the packers, in asking questions yesterday, said he only wanted to find out the truth. Reynolds said the inspection for the foreign trade was satisfactory. But there was a disagreeable odor about the Chicago packing houses, which the New York houses did not have.

STRIKE WAS NOT A SHAKE

San Francisco Sits Up to Take Notice of Conditions Confronting Her

(Four O'Clock Edition.) San Francisco, June 8.—The strike situation is quiet, and arbitration hovers over the water front today. While the shipping situation is still at a deadlock, and no conferences have been held between the sailors and ship owners, neither side displays the bitterness so noticeable yesterday. There was fear that a general strike would accomplish what the quake and fire could not—the loss of San Francisco's commerce.

TRYING EMMA LE DOUX

(Four O'Clock Edition.) Stockton, Cal., June 8.—The trial of Emma Ledoux for the murder of A. McVicar was resumed today. Attorney Fairall, for the defense, challenged the entire special venire of 75 men, on the ground that Sheriff Sibley was biased against the defendant, and had expressed an opinion as to her guilt. The sheriff admitted that he had an opinion, based on evidence, but said he had not personally summoned the veniremen. Judge Hutter denied the challenge. Eight veniremen were accepted and sworn in.

Automobile Races. Vienna, Austria, June 8.—Drabon, driving a 90-horse power Mercedes, arrived in the Harkomer automobile race from Frankfurt Prince Henry arrived at 11:30 an hour later. Pierce, the American, finished at 12:13. One hundred and fifteen of the 150 starters finished. One driver killed a peasant in the run.

INSURANCE COMPANY LETS GO

Refuses to Pay San Francisco Losses Amounting to More Than Half a Million

San Francisco, June 8.—The local agent of the Eagle Insurance Company issued a statement today to the effect that he had been notified by the New York office that the company had cancelled all existing policies in San Francisco. The company's liabilities in San Francisco are \$673,344, and its capital is \$300,000. It has a surplus of \$376,073. This is the first company to repudiate the result of the recent disaster since the Traders failed. It is feared that other companies will follow.

Sent Back the Papers. (Four O'Clock Edition.)

New York, June 8.—Wheeler Harvey, who disappeared with \$200,000 in checks and cash, today returned by mail to the bank all the papers taken by him, but only returned cash amounting to \$200. There is no information as to his whereabouts.

PRESIDENT TALKS OF CHICAGO

Says He is not Entirely Satisfied About Condition in Packing Houses

Washington, June 8.—The President has sent to the house agricultural committee two reports of the inspection of the Chicago packing houses by the agricultural department, before the Neill-Reynolds investigation. The President, in a letter, comments on the immediate and extraordinary improvement in the packing house conditions, following the Neill-Reynolds report. The latter states the investigation in the packing town is unfinished, and he is not prepared to make a final statement regarding complaints against the bureau of animal industry or "graver charges in connection with the adulteration of meat products, as well as other matters."

He quotes a letter from a Chicago friend, who describes the packers' haste in cleaning up as being "amusing, were it not so nearly tragic."

About the Coal Trusts. (Four O'Clock Edition.)

Philadelphia, June 8.—James Aiken, the Pennsylvania railroad clerk, who admitted owning \$50,000 worth of coal stock was dismissed. Comptroller Reibenack testified that the Manor Trust Company, which the Pennsylvania company controls, owns the coal lands. Robert K. Cassatt, general manager of the Keystone Coal & Coke Company, took the stand, and denied partially the statement of the independent operators.
