## AT END OF HIS STRING

Take the Punishment the Law Provides for His Crimes

Printed about him, he said, that a denial or refutation of all the stories would take even more time than he had. He says that there is no truth in the statements that he attempted to injure Detective Burns in making his escape in Boston, and that no one knows the fact better than Burns and himself.

"I made no effort to injure Mr. Burns," he said, "and the newspaper stories that I flashed a gun and made my escape are untrue. I had a hard tussel with him—an encounter that I will never forget—but I made no effort to hurt him. I was merely trying to get away, and I succeeded."

**Thinks McKinley Will Return.**

He also expresses confidence in the voluntary return of Horace McKinley, his confederate in the land fraud operations that embraced the greater part of the United States. McKinley said to have gone to China, but his captive friend insists that he will return to surrender himself to the authorities.

"I have known McKinley for many years, and I believe he is just the kind of a fellow to come back and give himself up," said Puter. "He will know that it won't do him any good to stay away, and he knows what it is to be a fugitive."

"And speaking of being a fugitive—it's a difficult proposition. Of course, you can never fully appreciate it until you have been one. But it's a hard game, especially if there is any one who is dear to you and you are trying to look after them while trying at the same time to escape a bunch of detectives who dog your tracks like fate."

"If I had had only myself to look after I could easily have got away—that is, if I had wanted to get away. But I never really tried to. I had plenty of opportunities, and if I had been trying to escape, California would have been the last place to which I

would have gone. I knew Mr. Heney was there, and I also wanted to see my people. The confusion following the fire prevented my seeing Mr. Heney, and my failure to see him finally led to my arrest. I made no effort to hide myself while there, but went from Alameda and Oakland to San Francisco almost every day."

Puter believes that he may yet escape final punishment for his crimes.

It is his purpose, he says, to set himself right before the people of Portland and Oregon, if it is possible to do so. He expresses regret that his friends in Portland should read so much about him as a criminal and a fugitive from justice.

"This is a deplorable condition for a man, but it shall be my endeavor to fix it up the best I can," he said.

Puter was convicted of conspiring to defraud the United States of public lands in December, 1904. At the same time McKinley, Mrs. Emma Watson, Dan Tarpley and Frank Walgamot were also convicted of the same charge.

Sentence was postponed and Puter became an important witness for the government in a number of land fraud cases. He was placed under bonds of \$4000, but was later permitted to substitute with two residents of California as bondsmen. The document was never filed in this city. It was largely through Puter's testimony that Senator Mitchell was convicted.

Shortly after the trial of Senator Mitchell, Puter went East, and did not return until today. Some eight or nine months ago rumors were circulated of wholesale frauds in state school land certificates, and investigation traced the operations to McKinley, Puter and confederates. Puter and McKinley are said to have realized over \$100,000 in a few months by means of forged and counterfeit land certificates.

According to United States District Attorney Bristol, Puter will be brought before the court for sentence at once.

**End of a Famous School.**  
Canandaigua, N. Y., June 8.—The Granger Place School for Girls, one of the best known institutions of learning of that character in the country, will be closed forever after the closing exercises, which are held today.

The school was organized by Miss Caroline Comstock, Miss Harriet Hasbrouck, Mrs. Charlotte Crocker and Miss Jane Sloenn in 1876, and has had a prosperous existence ever since that time. The Misses Granger, who gained control of the school about ten years ago, have decided to retire from school work. They have decided to go to Europe for the summer, and when they return here in September they expect to remodel the school building into a modern dwelling house, in which they propose to live. The building was erected in 1814 by their grandfather, Gideon Granger, who was postmaster under Jefferson and Madison, and was later occupied as a residence by their parents, until the school was established.

The excellent faculty, headed by Samuel Cole Fairley, the principal, Miss Parmelee and others in the different classical departments, will be dispersed. Mr. Fairley, who has been the head master for 13 years, has become closely identified with educational and church interests here, and will probably remain here in some capacity.

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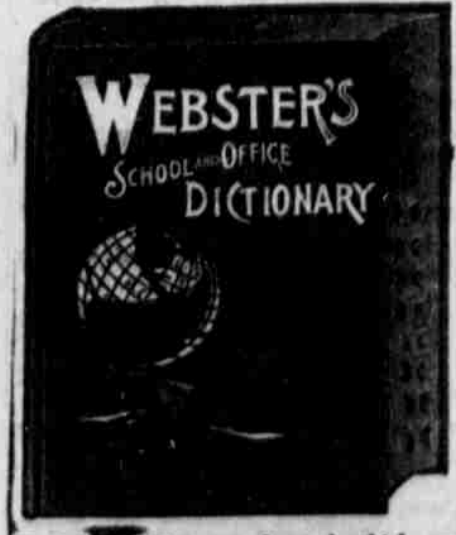
