STOCKMAN DEFENDS PACKERS.

Says Conditions in Chicago Are Not as Bad as Painted.

T. A. Rhea, a well-known stock drover, of Heppner, who has been in the stock yard and packing houses of Chicago a number of times, thinks injustice is likely to be done as a result of the present agitation on the part of the government.

"So far as the killing of animals and the shipping of meats is concerned, I never saw unsanitary conditions there," he said today. "Thousands of cattle, sheep and hogs are killed hourly at the yards, and everything moves along like clockwork. The animals are not subject to cruelty, and an abundance of water is used in keeping carcasses and floors clean."

"Most of the dissatisfaction seems to be with canned meats and sausages, but for these purposes only inferior grades of meat are used. Prime beef, pork and mutton are shipped in frozen condition. None of this class of meat is canned."

"Canners," as inferior animals are called in the market reports, consist of poor steers, animals that have been injured en route, or bulls and stags. This class of beef is used for sausage and for canning, and this is well-known in commercial circles.

"I notice that the use of tobacco is forbidden in many of the packing establishments of Chicago. This is a good thing. People who handle meat intended for food should not use tobacco."

To Abolish Death Penalty.

St. Petersburg, June 8.—The debate on abolishing the death penalty threatened to get beyond bounds in the Douma, and the sitting was almost broken up. The labor party opposed postponing its consideration, and violently attacked the ministerial party.

The Dalles Portage Road.

The May report of Superintendent Cook, of The Dalles portage railway, was filed yesterday with the board of portage commissioners. It appears that the earnings of the road for the month were \$48.80, while the expenses of operation amounted to \$548.10. Among other things the report says: "The survey of the extension of the portage road into The Dalles, which was recently completed, is estimated to cost to build an independent line some \$56,000, while to build and connect with the Great Southern road would not cost to exceed \$35,000. This probably is the most feasible plan, and should be given particular attention, as without the line into The Dalles we



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are badly handicapped, as present, the boat being unable to reach the portage, business is at a standstill.

"We have completed loading rock at the long trestle, but the weeds at the west end of it are getting very bad, and a little later on will be dry and liable to set it on fire. They should be cleaned out, considerable of which work we will do at once, together with other track work. After every sand storm it is necessary to rearrange the sand boards, as they are always being blown out of shape."

TO BUILD A MILE OF ROAD

Government to Give Oregon's Citizens an Object Lesson

The rains have greatly hampered the work on the road building experiment now being conducted on the Salem-Silverton road, near the fair grounds. A carload of machinery is still here at the station, and it will probably be taken to the scene of work tomorrow. Today a small crew is busily engaged in sloping the ditches, as the large crew had to quit work on the grading on account of the heavy rains.

A large crew is employed on the S. P. near this city, in the replacing of the old rails with the new 85-pound steel. The work is now in progress a few hundred yards from the depot. Everything is done systematically, and it takes but a little while to take out the old rail and have it supplanted by the new. Many were watching the work this morning.
