In his address to the class Dr. Coleman spoke thus in part: "You have won the greatest battle of your lives. I congratulate you on your successes, on the strong influences by which you have been surrounded; on your pleasant relations and kind associations with your teachers and fellow students; that you live in the best day the world ever saw."

"They tell us competition crowds out young people from the professions and avenues of business. Remember, young men and young women, there's always room higher up. The intellectual force predominate in the world. Mind is enthroned and controls."

"May you be successful in years to come. Find out early what success means. A kind act, an inspiring word will live longer than yourselves. May God's richest blessing rest upon you. God will watch over you."
