DOWN AT
CHEMAWA

During a recent visit of the Indian
department inspectors to the Chemawa
Indian school, they discussed the rail-
way situation. The Southern Pacific
tracks run in front of the school
buildings, and between the dormitory
building and the class room. While
there has never been an accident, the
inspectors deemed it dangerous to the
students to have to cross the railway
so often, and have recommended an ap-
propriation for a viaduct. This will
shortly be available, and Supt. Chal-
craft will put two tunnels under the
tracks, one from the girls' gate and
one from the boys' side. Every approp-
riation asked for by Mr. Chalcraft
for the coming year has been granted,
except a portion of the repair fund,
which, it is understood, was cut from
\$10,000 to \$5000.

Baseball at Woodburn.

In a splendid game of baseball
played at Woodburn Sunday afternoon
the Woodburn boys won from the
Powers' Blues, an aggregation from
Portland. The final score was 7 to 6.
It was a great contest, and there was
a jubilant crowd to witness it. Wood-

the wresting of victory from the jaws
of defeat, and, by bunching their hits,
pulled in four tallies in the fourth in-
ning, and from that moment victory
was assured.

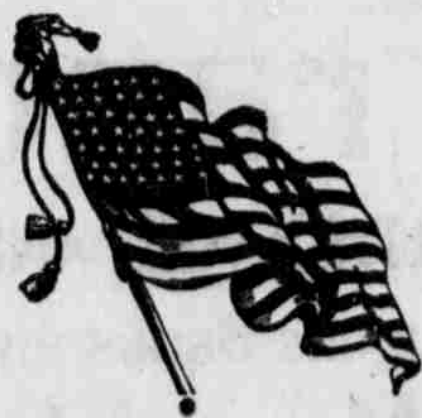
