WORK RESUMED TODAY

Warren Construction Company Placing Rock on South Commercial Street

Work was resumed this morning on the improvements on South Commercial street by the Warren Construction Company. The work that is being done today is on the southern part of the thoroughfare, and consists in finishing that part of the street, that has nearly reached completion. The northern part of the street, where there has been some contention and some objection to the grade will be left in its present condition until a settlement is reached regarding the grade. Charles L. McNary, attorney for the contractors, said this morning that he confidently expects an amicable agreement will be reached this week that will permit the work to proceed without interruption. He has found that it is the unanimous opinion of the property owners to agree to anything reasonable that will allow the work of improvement to be completed.

It is likely that another meeting of the council will be called within a few days, and some steps will be taken to put an end to this tempest in a teapot.

BRING LOTS OF LOGS

The first logs from the Santiam belonging to the Spaulding Logging Company are beginning to come into the mill in this city. About 1,000,000 feet passed Beuna Vista Saturday. There will be about 5,250,000 feet from the Santiam. These logs will be boomed just below the old rapids. The Spauldings will begin the drive of the McKenzie river this week. This drive will bring into Salem 12,000,000 feet of logs. They have just completed towing the logs from the Luckiamute river, where the mill gets all of its heavy milling logs.

The logging company is preparing for a heavy summer campaign, and within a few days will be working 85 men at Salem. This by no means represents all the people that the industry employs. The Spauldings have 25 logging camps, and in some of these they employ as many as 40 men.

Much work of improvement has recently been done in the plant. New pipes for the kilns have just been laid and other improvements have been made.

Both the company's boats, the "City of Eugene" and the "Gray Eagle," are at work towing logs.

The price and the demand for lumber this season are good.

The recent great disaster in California has opened up an almost limitless market for lumber at San Francisco, which the Oregon mills will take advantage of as soon as their present contracts are filled.
